OBITUARY

CAPTAIN G.G. TYSON, OLD CONFEDERATE SOLDIER IS DEAD

Was Familiar Figure About City Streets, Wearing Old Gray Uniform

G.G. Tyson, Confederate soldier and resident of Muskogee for thirty five years, died at 10:25 o'clock last night at the Physicians and Surgeons hospital. Death was caused by Bright's diseases.

Captain Tyson, as he was called by his friends was severty-five years old but his soldierly bearing made him appear much younger and he was a familiar figure on the streets of the city until recently when he became ill.

He was one of the few men who continued to wear his uniform of gray and refused to lay it aside.

He was born in Haywood County, Tennessee, and enlisted in the Confederate army at the outbreak of the war.

Entering the cavalry branch of the army he served as a first lieutenant and captain under General John Forest during many of the battles of the Civil War and was wounded twice. He regained his health however, and came to Muskogee with the early settlers of Oklahoma.

During the past few years, since the death of his wife three years ago, he has been living by himself and taking his daily march through the streets, "talking the battles over again" with his friends.

He is survived by three daughters and two brothers: Mrs. Fannie Stevens and Mrs. W.D. Buntin, of Muskogee, and Mrs. H.O. Treath who lives in Arkansas, George Tyson and Benjamin Tyson of Jackson, Tennessee.

Word was sent his brothers and sister and they are expected to arrive within a few days to make arrangements for the funeral. The Daughters and Sons of the Confederate will have a part in the services.

"Captain Tyson was one of the few representative old Confederate soldiers in this part of the country," Morton Rutherford said last night, "and one of the best loved."

OBITUARY

WALTER S. AGNEW, INDIAN LEADER, DIES Cherokee Statesman and Soldier Succumbs at Muskogee Home, 88 Years Old

Walter S. Agnew, aged Cherokee Indian statesman, soldier and schoolteacher, died yesterday afternoon at 1 o'clock at his home in Muskogee, 927 North M street. He was 88 years old.

As a member of the Cherokee senate, a tribal councillor, (sic) and judge of the Canadian district in Indian Territory days, Agnew was one of the best known members of his race in this part of Oklahoma. Up until the time of his death he was active in district democratic circles as well as in his tribal politics.

His life history teems with incidents typical of the opening of the west by the white men. Agnew was born in Flint District in the Cherokee Nation, Indian Territory, May 16, 1842.

He had barely grown to manhood when the Civil war began, but he immediately enlisted in the ranks of the Confederate army, serving in the famous Cherokee Brigade under Gen. Stan Watie, the only American Indian who ever reached the rank of brigadier general.

After the close of the war he taught in the public schools of the Cherokee nation. Many people of his tribe who since have risen to prosperity received their education under Agnew.

He entered public service for his tribe during middle life and was elected to the office of Cherokee councillor, (sic) Cherokee senate. Later he was made district judge of the Cherokee Canadian district for two terms.

Following admission of Oklahoma to statehood and dissolution of the Indian territory government, Agnew maintained his interest in state politics through active participation in democratic party circles.

He had lived at his Muskogee home for many years. He leaves a widow, Mrs. Mary Agnew and four children, Mrs. Laura Robinson of Sperry, Walter L. Agnew of Pawhuska; Ellen Agnew, Robert Agnew, and Cephus E. Agnew of Muskogee: many grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 4 o'clock this afternoon from the Calvary Baptist church here, with Rev. Thomas Smith officiating. Burial will be in Greenhill cemetery under the direction of Lescher funeral home.

Note: The Lescher Funeral Home record shows the father of Walter S. Agnew was John Agnew and his mother was Nellie Martin. The funeral home has his birth date as 26 May 1842. No stone was located at Greenhill. Mary Agnew died 13 November 1940, age 90, and is buried at Greenhill.

Robert Agnew died 30 April 1933, age 54, and is buried at Greenhill.

Ellen Agnew died 28 January 1956, age 84, and is buried at Greenhill.

I attended one of their conferences several years ago at Fort Wayne, Indiana and it was excellent. A plus for this one is that it is in Salt Lake where so much research material is available.


The article's are enclosed I am not too late for the June publication.

WE ARE CHEROKEE!'

by John E. Ernest

When I was growing up, I remember my dad, Edward William Ernest, saying "We are Cherokee" whenever it seemed appropriate. His father, Thomas Henry Ernest (1884-1970), said the same thing, whether it was appropriate or not. However, that was all that was ever said. Not who, not when nor where.

Some clarification came in 1965 when my grandfather Thomas Henry told his daughter, Clara Ernest Melcher, that "great-grandmother was half Cherokee." In addition, Thomas Henry provided Clara with a list of his siblings,1 some of whom were unknown to the rest of the family. Our grandfather was a man of few words.

The only other thing that we knew then was that Thomas Henry Ernest was born 4 Dec 1884 in Eufaula, Oklahoma, and that his father, Ed Earnest, had died in 1888. Thomas Henry also had said his brother, Lewis Edward "died." What an understatement! Actually, Lewis Ernest was murdered in Lenna, Oklahoma, 17 Apr 1911 by his wife's boyfriend.2 It was with this discovery that I started my research.

Lewis Edward's death date enabled my brother, Frank, to get a death certificate for Lewis. The certificate indicated his mother was Maude Williams.3 As I began questioning my aunts in Oklahoma City about this, I found out that Maude Williams Earnest remarried in 1892, several years after the death of her husband, Ed. 4 Her new husband was a Creek Indian, Chatman Riley.5 In addition to the six Earnest children, Maude had four more children by Riley.6

Now that I had some names to work with I went to the 1910 census records

'where I found Mauday Riley with husband Chatman and their children.7 This record showed Mauday as a white person, born in Arkansas and age 55 on her most-recent birthday. At that time they were living between Hanna and Dustin in McIntosh County.

The next step was to verify that Maude's maiden surname was indeed Williams. I sent for and received Thomas Henry's social security application.8 Much to my surprise, he had indicated that his mother's maiden name was Amanda Griepenkirel. How could he be mistaken, or was he?

The death certificate for Thomas Henry's murdered brother, Lewis, had the usual information—place of death, cause of death, name of the doctor, etc. However, some of the information on the death certificate could only be supplied by an informant. Who was the informant for this certificate, and how credible was this person?

Well, Lewis was dead and his wife, Ada Belle(Kannada) Ernest, was in jail, suspected of being involved in his murder. Brother Thomas Henry was living in Stratford, Garvin Co., Oklahoma,9 more than 100 miles away. Their two sisters, Nettie and Bettie Earnest disappeared after the 1900 federal census.10 Grandmother, Lizzie Williams Moore (Amanda's mother) had died in Shawnee, Oklahoma ca 1901. The brothers' sister, Myrtle Earnest Smith, was living in Yeager, Hughes Co., Oklahoma,11 about 40 miles southwest of Lenna.

However, Maude Earnest Riley was living with her husband Chatman and children near Hanna, only about 10 miles to the west of Lenna, where Lewis was shot.12 Maude Williams Earnest Riley was the most-likely informant for the death certificate.

Who, then, was Amanda Griepenkirel, listed on Thomas Henry's social-security application as his mother?

In the 1860 Indian Territory (Oklahoma) federal census, I found a Dr. Ferdinand Griepenkirel, a single male.13 According to the LDS International Genealogical Index, he was born in Brilon, Westfalia, Prussia in 1826, the son of Johann Christian Christian Griepenkirel and Elisabeth Johanna Linde.14 Dr. Griepenkirel left for New York City from Hamburg, Germany on 15 Jul 1850.15 He was married in 1862 to Mary Louise Raper,16 daughter of John and Annie Raper.17 In 1865 he and Mary moved to Texanna, Indian Territory (Oklahoma),18 where he died in 1898.

Dr. Griepenkirel's wife, Mary Louise, appears on the Dawes Roll as a half-blood Cherokee, born in Indian Territory in 1840.19 According to her Dawes application, she had always lived in Indian Territory, and her mother, Annie Raper, was a full-blood Cherokee married to a white man. Was she Amanda's mother? Mary

Louise Griepenkirel died in 1902, and in 1910 there was an official inquiry into her death date. Her friend, Rachel Thornberry, gave the following testimony:20

"Q: Are there any children or are there any relatives of Mrs. Mary L. Griepenkirel

A: There never was any children of their own; they raised three orphans."

Mary Louise Griepenkirel also had stated in her Dawes application that she was born in Indian Territory and had lived there all of her life. Maude Riley, Lewis' mother per his death certificate, was born in Arkansas, according to the 1910 census.21

So far, then, I had a conflict: one mother for Thomas Henry, and another mother for his brother, Lewis.

I found a Lizzie [Williams] Moore22 living in Forest Twp., Pottawatomie Co., Oklahoma Territory, in 1900.23 In her household were her granddaughters, Nettie, Bettie and Myrtle Earnest,24 and a great-grandson, James H. Earnest.25 According to that census record, Lizzie Moore was born in August 1835 in Indian Territory, was Indian and her native tongue was Indian. Lizzie therefore was born in Indian Territory <u>prior</u> to the main removal of the Cherokee Nation from the east in 1838/39 (the Trail of Tears).

In the early 1850s two enrollment records were created for those living in the Cherokee Nation. Those who came to what became Oklahoma prior to the main body in 1838/39 were listed on the "Old Settler Roll," created in 1851.26 Lizzie Williams does not appear on this roll. Those who came in 1838/39 as a result of the treaty of New Echota (1835) were on the "Drennen Roll," created in 1852.27 Two later enrollment records were the Dawes Roll of 1898 and the Guion Miller Roll of 1909.28 Neither Amanda Williams(Griepenkirel) nor Lizzie Williams Moore appear on any of these rolls.

There are also the Cherokee Emigration Rolls of 1817-1835.29 These were the Cherokee living in the east who filed to immigrate to Arkansas Territory30 and, after 1828, to Indian Territory (Oklahoma). In these earlier documents are Hannah, Tom and Jonathan Williams but, again, no Lizzie Williams. The 1860 census of the Indian lands in Indian Territory Oklahoma) lists several Williams families, but no Lizzie Williams.31 In that same census Dr. Griepenkirel was listed, living at or near Fort Gibson in the Illinois District of the Cherokee Nation.

In checking the various Indian rolls I discovered that Mary L. Griepenkirel was on the Dawes Roll.32 It was in her application file that I discovered a truth about Indian research which eventually led me to our Indian(?) ancestor.33 As noted above, Mary Griepenkirel died in 1902 and in 1910 the US Department of the Interior found it necessary to determine her exact date of death. Her friend, Rachel, further testified:

"Q.: Are you a citizen of the Five Civilized Tribes of Indians?

A.: Yes, a Cherokee by blood, but I have forfeited my rights. You see my hus band, when the war34 broke out, left for the army and I went to Texas and stayed until '66."

It suddenly occurred to me that Lizzie Williams was not on any of the Indian rolls because she had not been born in or had lived continuously in Indian Territory either in the former Cherokee Tract in Arkansas which was terminated in 1828 or Indian Territory in Oklahoma. In that she was born in Arkansas in 1835, she was therefore a citizen of the United States. The following, obtained from a website, clarifies this issue:

"Some people may never be able to prove Indian heritage. The Indian law usually dictated that 'when any citizen shall remove with his effects out of the limits of the Indian Nation, they automatically become a citizen of another government, therefore all his rights and privileges as a citizen of this nation shall cease, provided nevertheless that the National Council shall have power to re-admit any such person who may at any time desire to return to the nation, but no one is entitled as an inherent right to re-admission to citizenship." The translation of this is: if an applicant proved that at one time they were a recognized citizen of the nation, but had forfeited that citizenship, there was no law by which they could have demanded readmission to citizenship.

As a matter of course, the same laws and usage's governed the Dawes commission in their consideration of claims to citizenship. These laws, however, are not unique just to the Indian tribes or even to the United States. It was (and normally is) the universal Common Law— that if a person leaves the country of their nativity in establishes themselves in another country, their citizenship in the country of their origin is not guaranteed. Further, the children born in the new country to those emigrants are legally citizens of the country of their birth. This means that if a person, for whatever reason, had been separated from the country of their birth ("the Indian Nation") and had settled in another country ("the United States"), they forfeited not only their own rights to citizenship in the country of their nativity, but that of their descendants—— forever.

These laws have been challenged in the U.S. Supreme Court and on the floor of the Congress of the United States---- and each time they have been affirmed". (Native American Research, Cherokee Tribal Membership; http://www.rootsweb.com/~cherokee/n are sea.html)

It suddenly occurred to me that Lizzie Williams was not on any of the Indian rolls because she had not been born in or had lived continuously in the Indian Territory which became Oklahoma.

If not Oklahoma's Indian Territory,35 then what "Indian Territory" did the 1900 census record for Lizzie [Williams] Moore refer to? Given that her daughter, Maude Williams Earnest Riley, was born in Arkansas I now believed I was looking in the wrong place.

According to the 1900 Oklahoma Territory census, Lizzie [Williams] Moore was born in August 1835. In the 1850 Arkansas federal census taken in December, I found a Joel Williams in Dutchess Creek Twp., Yell Co.36 In his household was his wife Nancy, and daughter Elizabeth, 15, and her siblings.37 38 That 1850 age coordinates with the August 1835 birth date of the 1900 census.

What about Lizzie Moore being born in "Indian Territory?" Dutch Creek is just a few miles south of the Cherokee Tract,39 an area once occupied by the Cherokee Indians. The History of Yell County [Arkansas] states, "regardless of the Treaty of 1817, Cherokees were established south of the river [Arkansas River] in great numbers, on Dardanelle plain, Checkalah, Dutch and Shoal Creeks. . . . "40

It would be helpful if the 1850 and 1860 censuses had indicated Nancy Williams, wife of Joel, was an Indian but, alas, no. The census instructions to marshals41 directed: "Under heading six, entitled 'color,' in all cases where the person is white, leave the space blank; in all cases where the person is black, insert the letter 'B'; if mulatto, insert 'M'."

So if Nancy Williams were a Cherokee Indian, the census taker left the space blank, as there was no instruction for "Indian," and she was neither black nor mulatto.

Joel Williams came to Scott Co., Arkansas, sometime after 1830; he is not in the 1830 Arkansas federal census. Presumably he was there in 1835 when his daughter, Elizabeth, was born there. He was in Scott Co., Arkansas in the 1840 census42 and in Yell Co. in the 1850 census.43 (Yell was created from Scott in 1840 and in both he is living on Dutch Creek, Dutchess Creek Twp.).

By 1860 Elizabeth was no longer in his household.44 A substantial number of marriage records for Yell Co. have survived, but none for an Elizabeth Williams was found. Nancy Williams, Joel's wife, presumably died sometime before 1864, when he married Caroline Owens; both he and Caroline died in January 1876.45 A letter of administration, filed 9 Apr 1877 at the Yell Co. courthouse, was in effect until 12 Jan 1888 when the administrator was discharged, without a mention of estate disposition or heirs.46

Could there be more than one Williams family in Arkansas, with a daughter Elizabeth born in August 1835?

- 1. There was a William E. Williams of Saline Co. who had an Elizabeth, age 16.47 Unable to locate him in 1860 census.1.
- 2. Benjamin Williams of Carroll Co. had an Elizabeth, age 14, but she was born in Indiana.48

- 3. C. P. Williams of White Co. had an Elizabeth, age 16, but she was born in Kentucky.49
- 4. John Williams of Izzard Co. had an Elizabeth, age 14, but she was only 14 by the September enumeration date.50
- 5. W. G. Williams of Madison Co. had an Elizabeth, age 14, by the August count.51 In 1860, W. G. Williams was in Benton Co. and his Elizabeth was still at home, age 25.52 There was no Amanda in that household.

The 1860 Arkansas census index53 does not show an Elizabeth and Amanda Griepenkirel or Williams54 living together. There are three Amanda Williamses in the 1860 Arkansas census:

- 1. In the William Williams household in Johnson Co., to the north of Yell Co., was an Amanda, age 5.55 Also, in this household was William Hendricks, 16.56 However William was in Scott Co., west of Yell Co., in 1860.57 Amanda J. Williams, 15, was still in this household, but no Elizabeth.1
- 2. Honsford Williams was in Crawford Co. with an Amanda, age 4, in his household.58 In 1870 this Amanda was still at home59 but was gone in 1880.60 The 1850 census for this family shows no Elizabeth in the household.61.
- 3. Amanda Williams was listed as head of a household in Prairie Co., but she was 28. 62

Where were Elizabeth and Amanda in 1860? Census indexes for 1860 for Arkansas and Indian Territory (Oklahoma) do not indicate a household with an Elizabeth as head of household and Amanda Williams or Griepenkirel.63

The 1870 Arkansas census index has several Elizabeths and Amandas.64 None of these fit the facts already stated. There was, however, an Amanda Williams in Fort Smith, Sebastian Co., listed in the household of John Schabdach, 38, a barkeeper from Bavaria.65 This Amanda was 15 and born in Arkansas.

There are two questions to be answered: Is Nancy Williams Thomas Henry's great-grandmother, and, is she a Cherokee?

To answer question No. 1:

The naming pattern of Nancy Williams' children suggests that she is Thomas Henry's great-grandmother:

Nancy Williams' children

Elizabeth

Lewis E.

Thomas

Henry

Mary

David

Amanda Williams Earnest's children/grand-children

Bettie

Lewis Edward

Thomas Henry

Mary Ernest (gr.-dau.)

Clarence David (gr.-son)

There are no other families listed in the 1850 Arkansas index that have a daughter of the right name and age.

Amanda (Maudy) was born in Arkansas. Amanda (Maudy) was born in Arkansas.

To question No. 2: Is Nancy Williams a Cherokee? Thomas Henry's statement, "great-grandmother was half Cherokee."66

Lizzie Williams was an Indian per 1900 census.

Joel and Nancy Williams lived in an area occupied by the Cherokee.

Nancy Williams was born in Kentucky, once part of the eastern Cherokee lands.67

There is no evidence to suggest that she was <u>not</u> a Cherokee or an Indian.

Conclusions

- 1. Maude Williams and Amanda Griepenkirel are the same person.
- 2. Joel and Nancy Williams are Thomas Henry's great-grandparents.
- 3. Ferdinand Griepenkirel and Elizabeth Williams probably were never married.
- 4. Nancy Williams is an Indian and possibly Cherokee.

Further Research

Thomas Henry Ernest's Social Security application also stated that his middle name was "Hendrix". This is in conflict with all other family records, which indicate that his middle name is "Henry". His wife Willa Sliger Ernest was always known as Mr. Henry Ernest. My father Ed Ernest's birth certificate indicated his father's middle name to be "Henry". Thomas Henry's mar-

riage application of December 1909 indicated his middle name to be "Henry". Sometime between 1909 and 1942 when he filled out his Social Security application, he appears to have been told or discovered that his middle name was or should have been "Hendrix".

In that this is not an Earnest family surname, one could assume for research purposes that it came from the Williams side of the family. One could speculate that Thomas Henry's great-grandmother was Nancy Hendrix Williams. I know that my grandfather was very proud of his Cherokee ancestors. I suspect that he got this information from his mother, Amanda Williams.
