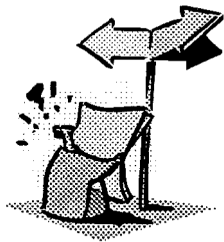
The Board of Directors meetings are held prior to each monthly meeting beginning at 5:45pm at the library. All members are invited to attend the Board meetings.

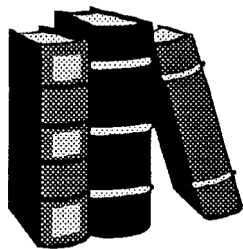

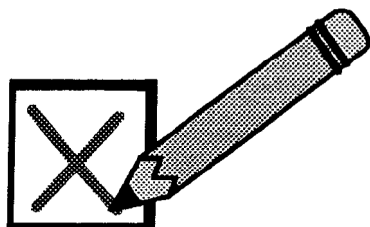

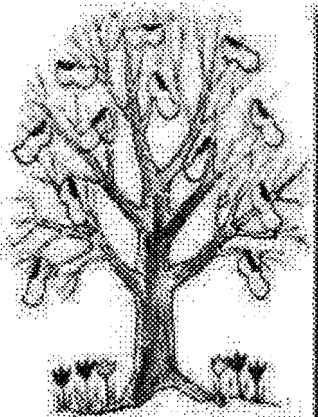

Lloyd Bockstruck: Freedman's Bank Records provide insight

Coinciding with Black History Month, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints released its every-name index of the more than 480,000 individuals named in the Freedman's Bank Records. The church has presented a copy of the compact disc to the Genealogy Section of the Dallas Public Library.

These federal records are among the treasures of our National Archives in Washington, D.C. The bank records are contained on 27 rolls of microfilm, which will be found in major genealogical collections of public libraries.

The Freedman's Bank was an outgrowth of a plan to provide banking services to the United States Colored Troops and Freedmen after the Civil War. Blacks could deposit their military pay and savings in the bank.

The bank accepted deposits from individuals as well as institutions such as churches and schools. It had 37 branch offices in 17 states and the District of Columbia. Fortunately, the records of all but eight branches survive. The only bank outside of the southern and border states was located in New York City. No records, however, exist for Texas. Little Rock, Ark., Shreveport, La., and New Orleans were the nearest branches to the Lone Star State.

Frederick Douglass observed, "The Freedman's Bank was the black man's cow but the white man's milk." Because of mismanagement and fraud, the bank collapsed in 1874. Out of the 64,144 accounts, there were 31,000 depositors who never requested or received a dividend.

Because these records are some of the earliest to document blacks after emancipation, and because they often furnish data on three generations of families, they are particularly valuable in researching black genealogy.

Today, a depositor selects a pin number known only unto him or her as the access tool to a new account. In the Freedman's Bank, a depositor not only gave his or her name but also such biographical information as place of birth, place reared, residence, age, name of employer or occupation, spouse, children, parentage and siblings. The earlier records also gave the names of former owners. These responses were kept private and used to verify that a depositor was the rightful owner of the account.

Until this index became available, it was necessary to know the names of depositors and their whereabouts between 1865 and 1874 in order to search the pertinent records with any success. If your ancestor's sibling was the one who opened an account and that individual's whereabouts was unknown to you, you had little likelihood of knowing where to look. The compact disc index removes all of these obstacles.

The compact disc does not contain the images of the records themselves. It is necessary to use the microfilm of the records to recover the full data. The CD links the approximately 480,000 names into pedigrees.

In the case of Charles Miller Coleman, you will learn that he opened his account on Oct. 2, 1867, and that he was born in Brunswick County, Virginia. His parents were John and Cutchina, his wife was Susan, and their children were Corenna, John Wesley, Martinie, Charly B., Freling Hyson and Motty. His brothers were Ben, Jack, Aleck, Moses, Robert and William. His sister was Susan. He indicated that Aleck was the first child sold away. Charles Miller Coleman was literate, and his signature concludes his file.

If you find your ancestor's bankbook among family papers, check the balance. If it's zero, then your ancestor was not defrauded and would not appear in these records. Even though the bank failed in 1874, the last payment was not made until 1918, so the paper trail may extend to the end of World War I.

Mrs. Quinton to Commemorate Birthday

MRS. QUINTON TO COMMEMORATE 113th BIRTHDAY TODAY AT HER HOME IN TOWN WHICH BEARS HER NAME SAYS SHE'D LIKE TO LIVE 125 YEARS

Serene Old Lady Smokes Clay Pipe, Relates Stories of
Civil War Period and Before

STIGLER, Nov. 24, 1938--The Declaration of Independence had not been signed quite 50 years when Mrs. Martha Quinton, now living at Quinton, the town which bears her name, was born.

Mrs. Quinton, who opened the door herself when a reporter in quest of her story knocked at her door, will celebrate her 113th birthday anniversary tomorrow. She was born November 25, 1875 near Tchula, Miss.

She is a little woman hardly more than five feet in height and to see her moving about, or sitting and rocking while smoking her clay pipe and carrying on an interesting conversation, one can hardly believe it possible that she was 35 years of age at the outbreak of the Civil War.

For 50 years after 1839 her home was in the vicinity of Fort Smith, Ark. and about 1869 she moved to the Indian Territory and settled in the vicinity of the present town of Quinton with her second husband, and she has resided in that locality since.

Mrs. Quinton has been married twice. Long before the beginning of the Civil War she married to Beverly Young who became a captain in the Confederate army. She does not remember the exact date of her marriage, but thinks it must have been about 15 years before the outbreak of the war. She said that Captain Young was killed in one of the last battles of the Civil War because he rode an educated horse.

The serene old lady relates many interesting stories of the Civil war period, telling how she stayed in hotels and rooming houses just back of the lines where Captain Young's regiment was engaged in battles with Union forces. Young always rode a horse that had been trained to dash forward when he hear the command of "charge." And in one of the last battles of the war someone unexpectedly shouted the word, causing the horse to carry its master into sight of the enemy, where Young was riddled with musket balls.

Mrs. Quinton, whose maiden name was Jacobs, is one-eighth Choctaw Indian, and seems proud of her ancestry. She was married to Samuel Quinton in 1868. Mr. Quinton died in 1901 and is buried near the town which was named for the family.

She says that no children were born of her first marriage, but nine were born to her and Mr. Quinton, three of which died in childhood. She now has three sons and one daughter living. Two of the sons, William and James, live near Quinton.

When asked how many direct descendants she had, Mrs. Quinton replied: "I can't answer that. I kept track of them till there got to be over a hundred of them, and then they got to popping up so often it was too much trouble. I know of about 15 of the fifth generation.

The withered old lady is a very interesting conversationalist, being indeed very quick witted. She attended the Newhope academy, near Fort Smith, and says her education almost equals that of a high school freshman.

"I was reared in plenty," she said in speaking of her youth. "I never knew what it was to want for anything when I was a girl. My father had plenty and always bought the best for his family." She said that before the Civil War her father owned considerable land and many slaves. Now Mrs. Quinton says almost all she has is the \$11 she gets each month from the state as old age assistance.

She says she can remember things that happened the first 75 years of her life better than I can yesterday. Her health is reasonably good yet and she is active and spry. Her eyesight began failing years ago and she sees only the bulk of objects now. Her hearing is splendid and her wit seems to have been sharpened with the passing of the years.

She has never read a novel and has seen only one picture show. She says she doesn't disapprove of picture shows, but can think of better ways to spend money. She has read the Bible through a number of times, and has been a devout Christian and a member of the Baptist church for about 85 years.

"I like the old time hymns." Mrs. Quinton explained in speaking of music "they have more inspiration and music in them than these new-fangled songs." Her favorite is "How Firm a Foundation."

Mrs. Quinton says she has smoked a pipe every since as a girl she would slip out her father's pipe and go to the tobacco shed to "enjoy a pipeful." She has been smoking a clay pipe for 25 years--one hat a son found at the bottom of an old well he was cleaning out in 1914. She says cigaret smoking is harmful to one's health, but pipe smoking is a tonic.

When asked what would be her advice to young people getting married, she said: "I would advise them to both 'pull together' on the same end of the rope, and do all they can to live happily, if they would do that there would be fewer divorces. (A few lines here were illegible)

Mrs. Quinton says she has ridden in cars a number of times, and enjoys an occasional ride. "If I know there isn't a fool at the wheel, and the roads are smooth, I like to go fast." she said.

She said she would like to live to be at least 125, if it is the Lord's will. "But I am ready anytime He calls," she said.

A Guide to Understanding and Using Federal Census Records

My Background

I have Thirteen years' experience in genealogical and family research. I am currently conducting a Single Surname Study having extracted more than 46,000 census records of the surname Ernst, Ernest, Earnest and its variations. Genealogical Aid at the Pacific-Alaska branch of the National Archives in Seattle. Graduate of the Univ. of Washington. Graduate of the National Genealogical Society's "American Genealogy: A Basic Course." Conducted Federal Census as a Field Operations Supervisor (FOS) for the 1990 Census year. A lecturer at the Fiske Genealogical Foundation (beginning and advanced Census Research). Published articles include "We Are Cherokee - A Case Study," "George M. Dempsie - Pioneer Photographer" and "A Murder in Lena."

Before You Begin - What information Do You Need?

As a Genealogical Aid at the Seattle Branch of the National Archives, we encounter many patrons who arrive with only a vague notion of what they are looking for and unprepared to use our resources. One of the many problems facing the beginning researcher is where in the census do I need to look to find my ancestor. Where was the person I am looking for in 1920? Some preliminary research is necessary. There are many kinds of records that can be obtained such as obituaries, death certificates, Social Security applications, marriage records, a family bible, city directories and county histories. All of these records will contain names, dates and places. This information allows the researcher to focus on a particular person and place.

Working Back Through Time

The most efficient and effective method to research family history using census records is to begin with latest Census Records (1920) and work backwards, census year by census year. This then provides the researcher with a picture of his family as it evolved and as the composition of a family changed over time. In 1920 as example, the family may contain a mother-in-law, and uncle or Aunt, brother or sister, cousin or nephew, and sons and daughters in-law. This then can provide other surnames related to your family.

Why Were Census Records Created?

Census records were created primarily to count the people living in the United States to determine representation. Secondly, they can be used for allocation of Government moneys and for statistical analysis. Census records were not created for genealogical purposes. There was no attempt at accuracy or verification of information obtained. There are records that contain conflicting information but such information does not appear to have been a major concern to the census taker. The primary objective of the census taker was to complete the census form. The information contained in census records must therefore, be verified.

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Some Prospective on Census Records

Life is not perfect, and neither are Census Records. The creation of a census record is the result of the verbal interaction between two people. There is the "census taker (enumerator) whose task it is to gather specific data from each household and enter that information on a specific form. The enumerator may or may not understand exactly what was required or how to ask each question correctly. The "informant" is the person in a household that provides the information based on questions asked by the census taker. The informant may have various levels of knowledge concerning each family member in that household. The informant may be the husband or the wife, and older child, or a relative. Sometimes it could be a neighbor, a house sitter, a landlord or other person loosely connected to the household. The enumerator's job is to determine the credibility of the informant to determine the acceptability of the information.

The Informant

Using my own family as an example, I would start by looking up my mother in the 1920 Census. I know that my mother lived in Mason City, Iowa in 1920. From this census record I note that my grandfather, Jess Bell was 45 years old and he and his parents were all born in Iowa. My grandmother, whose given name is not listed was 38 years old and she and her parents were all born in Iowa. My mother Margaret is listed with the record indicating that she was nine years old. Except for Margaret's name and age, the rest of the record is incorrect. None of the people mentioned in the Census record were born in Iowa. My grandfather Jess was born in Delavin, Wisconsin, in 1870. Mary Bell, his wife, was born in Herkimer, New York in 1872. My mother Margaret, was born in Minneapolis, Minn.

How could it be that the errors as described, could be made? The informant in this household in 1920 was a teenage servant girl. In her experience, the Bell family had always lived in Iowa. She assumed therefore that the Bell family had been born there including their parents. The enumerator probably had no reason to doubt the informant. Relying on this Census information would lead the researcher to look in the wrong place for Jess and Mary and their parents. It is also noted that Margaret is the daughter of Jess and Mary Bell. This is also incorrect in that Margaret E. Bell was the adopted daughter of Jess and Mary. The relationship code in column 6 of the census form should have been "AD" for adopted daughter. It is understandable that the informant did not know this.

Family Clusters

It is common in rural areas to find allied families living nearby. It is important therefore, to check for related families possibly living next to or near your family of interest. I found my grandfather Thomas H. Ernest in the 1920 Oklahoma Census living in Garvin County. His wife is Willa and children are Edward (my father), Clarence, Mary, Lucy and Thomas' mother-in-law Mary Sliger. At some point we want to find Mary Sliger with her husband in an earlier census. My grandfather's marriage certificate indicated that he was married in December 1909 in Garvin Co., Oklahoma. We find him and his wife Willa in the 1910 Oklahoma Census for Garvin County, family # 76. We also discover on this same census page, family #78 which has Mary C. Sliger and her husband William D. Sliger along with their two children, Hattie and Olgrnian F. (Uncle Ott). My dad often spoke of his Uncle Fred and Aunt Lucy Keiner. We

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also find them on this page also, family #72, with their Father Frederick W. Keiner. We know from oral family history that Mary C. Sliger is the daughter of Frederick W. Keiner.

Verifying information

Even though the Census record may appear to be correct, it is necessary to verify the information you are relying on in your research. Census Records can be misleading because these records contain only limited information concerning the household.

The 1920 Census record for William Rosenberger, living in Lynchburg, Virginia, lists himself, his wife Maud V., age 37, and their four sons, William, Jr., Joseph, Paul E. and Bernard. In addition, Nanny Earnest (a widow), William's mother-in-law is also living in this household. This would lead one to believe that William's wife maiden name was Maud Earnest, Nanny's daughter. However we should verify that this is correct. We would therefore look in a prior Census to find Nanny Earnest living with her husband. Because Maud (Earnest?) Rosenberger was born in Virginia, we would first look at earlier Virginia census records.

In the 1900 Virginia Census for Amherst County, we find William Earnest with his wife Nanny. However this Census record indicates that Nanny is William's second wife. According to this record, William and Nanny have only been married for three years. In this household are what appears to be Nanny's children who bear the surname of Watts. Therefore, Maud V. Watts, who is 17 in 1900, is the wife of William Rosenberger in 1920.

In that we have this discrepancy, further verification is required. We note that William and Maud's sons are all born between 1909 and 1914. One would think that at least one of their children may have lived to collect Social Security. In checking the Social Security Death Index, we find Paul E. Rosenberger. The Social Security application for Paul E. Rosenberger, which he filed on 30 November 1936, indicates that his mother's maiden name was Maud Watts.

Expect the Unexpected

"I can't find my ancestor in the Census, but I know he was there." This is one of the common problems we experience with our patrons at the National Archives. It is always possible that a person was missed by the enumerator. However, I always take the positive view that the person is somewhere in the Census. My namesake John Edward O'Grady was a dentist in northern Iowa. He practiced in several Counties and was in Schaller (Sac Co.), Iowa in 1917. John Edward and his wife Clemence were well known and were quite popular. In that he lived in town, it is unlikely that he would be missed in the Census. However, John Edward O'Grady does not appear in the 1920 Iowa Census. In that he did not die until 1926, where would he have gone? A line by line search of Schaller and Sac County, failed to reveal the presence of the O'Grady household. In addition, the Soundex for 1920 Iowa does not show a John E. O'Grady household.

A search of the Soundex Records for nearby States, particularly Minnesota, where he owned several farms did not show a John E. O'Grady. The surprise came when reviewing microfilm copies of the Schaller Herald in which the September 4, 1919 edition indicated that on September 5th, the following day

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dalgo Co. indicates that J. E. O'Grady and his wife Carrie were living in Mercedes, Texas.

The 1910 Federal Census

A Guide to Understanding and Using Federal Census Records

A major problem with this Census is that many of the northern states were not indexed (soundex), Minnesota being one of them. My grandfather, George Dempsie and his family lived in Minneapolis, Minnesota in 1910, the year my mother was born. How then can we locate the Census record for George Dempsie in Minneapolis in 1910? In checking the City Directory for Minneapolis, we find that George Dempsie, a professional photographer, lived at 316 Nicollet Avenue. Enumeration district (ED) descriptions are contained on microfilm series T1224. We need then to make a list of those Enumeration District's that contain any reference to Nicollet Avenue and the streets bordering Nicollet Avenue, such as Washington and Hennepin Avenues.

On Roll Number 33 of series T1224, we find a description of the Enumeration Districts for Minnesota, including Minneapolis. We find that Nicollet Avenue is referenced in ED 79, 80, 84, 85, 91 and 99. Each one of these Enumeration Districts was checked with no results. This is not an unusual situation. Some EDs do not have a complete description. However, we do know that we are in the right range of numbers. In checking ED 87, p. 42, we find the George M. Dempsie household living at 316 Nicollet Ave.

The Role of the Enumerator

It is not generally understood what happens in the field that could cause enumerators to fail to carry out their instructions. One written instruction that you do not see in the instructions to the enumerators is to make sure that each question on the Census form is answered. Understanding why this process sometimes goes awry will give you some understanding of why errors are made in Census records. I call your attention to the 1900 Census record for Theodore Roosevelt. In the course that I teach concerning Census records I use the example of the 1900 Census record for Theodore Roosevelt as it relates to the understanding of relationship codes. My point is to make it clear that those relationship codes only apply to the head of the household. They do not apply to the wife. This census record lists Theodore Roosevelt as head of household and his occupation as Governor of New York. It also lists his wife Edith and six children. The record also indicates quite clearly that Theodore and Edith have been married for 17 years. Their oldest child Alice is 16 years of age on her last birthday. To many this would look like a perfect record. We should also note that if you subtract 16 from Edith's age of 38, this number would fall between 15 and 45 which would be the childbearing years of a female for that time. If Alice were the daughter of Edith, Alice would have been born when Edith was 22. That's OK.

It does however contain an important error, if you are a descendant of Alice (Roosevelt) Longworth. This record would lead you to believe that Alice was the daughter of Edith. The fact is that Edith had not been married to Theodore for 17 years, but only 13 years. We should at this time perform another test. It is easy to misread one number for another. We need to verify that the 7 in 17 is actually a 7 and not a 3 or a 4. We look on this Census page for a number that contains a 7 that we can compare. It just

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so happens that the Enumeration District (ED) number is 723. This 7 is identical to the 7 in the number of years married.

How could this error occur? I seriously doubt that Edith would have told the enumerator that she had been married to Theodore for 17 years. Edith was of course Theodore's second wife. His first wife was Alice Hathaway Lee who married Theodore 27 October 1880 and who died as a result of complications of childbirth on 14 February 1884. Their daughter was named Alice who was 16 at the time of the 1900 Census. Theodore married Edith Carow in December 1886. The Census record, based upon the number of years married (17), would suggest that Alice was the daughter of Edith. Based upon my personal experience, I suggest the following scenario.

The enumerator was John H. K. Oakley, age 49, who was a local Real Estate Broker. When Mr. Oakley visited the Roosevelt residence, I doubt that Mrs. Roosevelt (Edith) would have discussed family business on her front porch. Being the gracious person that she was, Mr. Oakley was probably invited into the home of the Governor, even offered some refreshment. Mr. Oakley was most likely nervous in talking to the wife of the Governor and he forgot to ask Mrs. Roosevelt how long she had been married. Enumerators are instructed that before they turn in their completed forms, they are to review the forms to make sure that they are completely filled out. Mr. Oakley, in checking his census forms later, discovered that he failed to ask the question as to the number of years married. Understandably he did not want to go back to the Roosevelt residence to ask a single question when the answer was obvious. He merely wrote in the number 17(16 + 1) as a logical answer. Who would know the difference? Who would care?

Native American Research - 1900 Oklahoma Census

This is a popular census year for those who are trying to "prove" their Indian ancestry. I was very excited when I found my gggrandmother Lizzie Moore in this census. She is living in Pottawatomie County, Oklahoma. In her household are her granddaughters' Bettie, Myrtle and Nettie Earnest. The census record indicates that Lizzie was born in Indian Territory and was "Indian." This record confirmed our oral family history. I immediately checked the Dawes and Guion Miller Rolls for her name (see References Sources). Much to my surprise I did not find her listed on either of these Rolls. If in fact she was born in Indian Territory (Oklahoma) and was listed as an Indian, why was she not on the Rolls? The point to be made here is that census records may appear to be correct, but can be misleading. I think it is generally understood that when we speak of "Indian Territory," we mean Oklahoma. Subsequent research indicated that the informant was referring to a different place.

I found a clue in the census record of her daughter Amanda Earnest Riley who was living with her husband Chatman in 1910 in Hughes County, Oklahoma. According to that record, Amanda was born in Arkansas. In the 1900 Census that I referenced, the informant had indicated that Lizzie Moore was born in Indian Territory. What I believe is that the informant, who may not have been Lizzie herself, was referring to the fact that between 1818 and 1828, part of the northwestern part of Arkansas (Ozark Plateau) was known as the Cherokee Tract. The informant (maybe Lizzie's oldest granddaughter) may not have been aware that the Cherokee Tract had been terminated in 1828. In that Lizzie Moore was born after 1828, in 1835, she could not have been born in that Indian Territory. Lizzie and her daughter Amanda were born in Arkansas. They were therefore, citizens of the United States, even though they are

The Census Taker - Following Instructions

Many researchers assume that census takers always follow their instructions (see Research Sources). An example of this misunderstanding is the 1890 Veterans Census for Oklahoma. The Census instruction as to who would be enumerated is contained on the Census page. This instruction reads as follows:

“Note----- The provision of the act of March 1, 1889, under which this special enumeration of survivors of the war of the rebellion is made, reads as follows: cause to be taken on a special schedule of inquiry..... the names, organizations, and length of service of those who had served in the Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States in the war of the rebellion.....”

Looking at these records, it would be noted that both Union and Confederate soldiers were enumerated. Subsequent to the forms being completed, the records relating to the Confederate soldiers were crossed out (but fortunately still readable). We don't know today why this would have occurred, but based upon my own personal experience of having conducted a Census, I offer the following. It is not unusual for changes to written instructions being made after the forms are printed. At what level of government such a decision might have been made, I couldn't say. I do believe that the enumeration of the Confederate soldiers was intentional at the time the census was made, but corrected later.

Also, in this Veterans Census for Oklahoma there is a record for a Fred Kiner. Fred is shown to have served in the 19th Kansas Cavalry from 19 October 1868 to 10 April 1869. It should have been clear to the enumerator that Fred did not serve in the “war of the rebellion” based on that record. Why did the enumerator create this record contrary to instructions? Why indeed!

The Strange Case of Egbert French

Occasionally there are discrepancies between family history and Census records. Two ladies came into the National Archives one Friday afternoon when I was on duty. They came from across state. They brought with them several notebooks full of family information. The information included birth and death records, family group sheets and some written family history and had been assembled during the early 1900s. They stated that the only thing lacking in their documentation was census records. They wanted to verify that their ancestor Martha French who was born in 1875 was the daughter of Egbert and Susanna French. This should be easy I thought, based on the documents they showed me.

In checking the 1880 Census for Klickitat County, Washington, we find Egbert French and his wife Angeline. The children listed were Susan, age 14, Rebecca, age 11, David, age nine, Annie, age six, Medina, age three and Albert, age one. No Martha. They then stated that Susanna French was Egbert's first wife and the mother of Martha. We then checked the 1870 Census and we found Egbert and Angeline, Susan, age four and Rebecca, age two in Yakima Co., Washington. From this record it appears that Angeline was Egbert's wife in 1870 and in 1880.

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never would be a need for such records to be verified.

Fact vs. Judgment

In the 1850 Census for Bedford County, Pennsylvania we find Michael Earnest, age 25. In his household is his wife Hester and their children, Alexander, Catherine, Mary and Ann. According to the 1860 Census for this family, we find Hester, Alexander, Catherine, Mary and Ann. Michael is no longer in this household. What happened to Michael Earnest? What note should I make for my family records in this situation? You might decide that because Michael does not appear in 1860 Census for Pennsylvania that he is dead. This is a "judgment." The "fact" is that Michael does not appear in the 1860 Pennsylvania Census, and your records should reflect this fact.

Know your History

If you have assumed that Michael is dead, you would spend sometime looking for cemetery records, a death record, an obituary, a probate record or a tombstone inscription to verify his death. However, if you assumed that Michael was not dead, then you might ask "where would Michael have gone?" Why would Michael have left his family? Where might he be in 1860? Consider the historical events of this time period. California gold rush? We might first look in California for 1860. This seems like a long way from eastern Pennsylvania to California at time when there was no train travel. However, we do find Michael, age 36, in Amadore County, California. Michael's occupation is listed as a miner and is living in the household of Paul Shumway, also from Pennsylvania.

Looking for Clues

Many years ago when I discovered that my gg grandfather John Hundley Earnest lived in Hanover County, Virginia, I made a copy of his Census record. This record indicates that his wife was Lucy Ann, age 46, and their children were Harriet Jane, age 18, William B., age 15, Henry Clay, age seven, Charles B., age five and my great-grandfather Edwin, age three. I had this record for several years before it occurred to me that children may be missing from this record. There are no children between William B., age 15(1835) and Henry Clay, age seven (1843). After having looked at many census records, this seemed unusual. Suspecting that one or more children had died, I looked for an obituary. I found an obituary in the Religious Herald (Oct. 26, 1843) which stated that three of John H. Earnest's children had died of Scarlet Fever. One of those was "Charles Whitlock Earnest, fourth son of John H. Earnest and second son of Lucy Ann Earnest, who died on the 17th of October."

Who Was Charles Whitlock?

Could it be Lucy Ann Earnest's father was Charles Whitlock? In the 1810, 1820 and 1830 Virginia Census for Hanover County, I found a Charles Whitlock. Additional research has proven that this Charles Whitlock was the father of John H. Earnest's wife Lucy Ann. In this case the "clue" was something that was not in the census record.

Richard Dempsie was born in Ireland - but where?

A very common problem in genealogical research is determining the exact place of birth for an ancestor. The

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census taker was only required to ask for the State or Country of origin. With respect to foreign-born ancestors, the census taker would indicate only the name of the country, such as in the case of Richard Dempsie, Ireland (1860 Wisconsin, Columbia Co.). But where in Ireland? Ireland has many Counties and it would be difficult, time consuming and expensive to research each County. A possible answer here is to track down each of Richard's children and check their census records for Richard's place of birth. Unfortunately Richard died in 1864 so we have only one census record with him in the household.

The 1880 census record for Richard's daughter Carrie Dempsie Heinze, also indicated that her father Richard was born in Ireland. Richard's son Richard in the same census year indicated that his father was born in New York. However the 1900 census record for Richard's other son, George M. Dempsie, indicated that his father was born in Canada. This was not reaffirmed in the 1910 Census for George where it indicated that his father (Richard) was born in England. The 1900 census record for Carrie Dempsie Heinze indicated that her father was born in England. However the 1920 census record for Carrie Dempsie Heinze indicates that her father Richard was born in Scotland and his mother tongue (Col. 22) was Scotch. I believe there is some element of "truth" in these records. We also have to keep in mind the credibility of the informant.

What to make from all of this? For research purposes only, I can create the following scenario. Richard Dempsie may have been born in Northern Ireland, possibly Scots-Irish decent. He first came to Canada as some of Scots-Irish did. He may have spent some time in New York. I have found no records to indicate that this was a Roman Catholic family, therefore Northern Ireland as Richard's place of birth is more likely. My grandfather, George M. Dempsie was a life long member of the Masonic order. If he had been a Roman Catholic, he most likely would not have become a Mason. I have begun my research in Northern Ireland.

Summary

1. Before you start, gather as many family type records as possible, birth and death records, oral family history, cemetery records, city directories, Social Security applications, county histories, newspaper articles and obituaries. This will provide important clues as to where to begin looking and who you should be looking for.
2. Work back through time starting with the 1920 Census. Note discrepancies between census years. Keep notes as to why you think the discrepancies occurred. Verify all census records using other information you have gathered.
3. Understand that census takers were only required to fill out the census forms completely, NOT to make sure that the responses to questions were accurate or even reasonable. On occasion, census takers may have filled out a record for a family that they were unable to locate.
4. Carefully document all census information. Copies of the actual census record is best evidence (a copy of a soundex card is not acceptable evidence). Never rely totally on the research of others, no matter how credible they may seem.
5. Keep a log of research efforts to prevent duplication of effort and expense, particularly if you have to order census films.
6. Read the history of the area in which your family lived.

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7. Never substitute judgment for fact. If you substitute judgment for fact, over a period of years, judgment becomes fact.

8. Most important! Many researchers are absolutely convinced that they are beginning with the correct information even though it cannot be verified with census records. Some Patrons at the National Archives spend many frustrating hours researching with no results, refusing to take any advise. I have always adhered to the following rule:

“Never Be So Absolute That You Are Absolutely Wrong”

“Some people may never be able to prove Indian heritage. The Indian law usually dictated that ‘ when any citi-

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zen shall remove with his effects out of the limits of the Indian Nation, they automatically become a citizen of another government, therefore all his rights and privileges as a citizen of this nation shall cease, provided nevertheless that the National Council shall have power to re-admit any such person who may at any time desire to return to the nation, but no one is entitled as an inherent right to re-admission to citizenship." The translation of this is: if an applicant proved that at one time they were a recognized citizen of the nation, but had forfeited that citizenship, there was no law by which they could have demanded readmission to citizenship.

As a matter of course, the same laws and usage's governed the Dawes commission in their consideration of claims to citizenship. These laws, however, are not unique just to the Indian tribes or even to the United States. It was (and normally is) the universal Common Law-- that if a person leaves the country of their nativity and establishes themselves in another country, their citizenship in the country of their origin is not guaranteed. Further, the children born in the new country to those emigrants are legally citizens of the country of their birth. This means that if a person, for whatever reason, had been separated from the country of their birth ("the Indian Nation") and had settled in another country ("the United States"), they forfeited not only their own rights to citizenship in the country of their nativity, but that of their descendants---- forever.

These laws have been challenged in the U.S. Supreme Court and on the floor of the Congress of the United States---- and each time they have been affirmed".

Dawes Roll 1898-1914 The final roll for allotting the land and terminating the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma. Senator Henry L. Dawes was the commission's chairman. The Dawes Roll became the only means of certifying Tribal membership.

Guion Miller Roll A listing of Eastern Cherokee residing both east and west of the Mississippi river, entitled to participate in a monetary award by the U. S. Court of Claims.

Questions Asked in the 1920 Census

Name of street, avenue road, etc.; house number or farm; number of dwelling in order of visitation; number of family in order of visitation; name of each person whose place of abode was with the family; relationship of person enumerated to the head of the family; whether home owned or rented; if owned, whether free or mortgaged; sex; color or race; age at last birthday; whether single, married, widowed, or divorced; year of immigration to United States; whether naturalized or alien; if naturalized, year of naturalization; whether attended school any time since 1 September 1919; whether able to read; whether able to write; person's place of birth; mother tongue; father's place of birth; father's mother tongue; mother's place of birth; mother's mother tongue; whether able to speak English; trade, profession, or particular kind of work done; industry, business, or establishment in which at work; whether employer, salary or wage worker, or working on own account; number of farm schedule.

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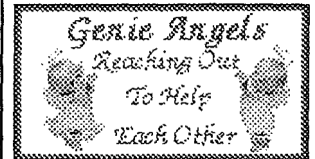
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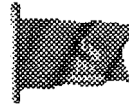
