# From the President

### Members and Friends

To say we are in times we've never seen in our own lifetimes is, at the very least, an understatement. We even have a new set of phrases and words to describe how we are to slow down the spread of this novel virus and "flatten the curve". Why am I telling you all this? Because I recall that experience vividly, just like current generations will recall current experiences with the COVID-19 world-wide pandemic. These days will live in our minds and in the memories of our children and grandchildren. Hopefully, as family historians, we will take this time we have so much of on our hands right now, and document our current circumstances, experiences, and reflections.

Currently, we have no idea when the health care professionals will give us the "all-clear" and we can start living openly and restoring our physical connections. With that in mind, new video-conferencing technologies have become the latest tool in our communications toolbox! Our genealogy society leadership has embraced this technology. Our board meetings are now virtual. We've had our first virtual general meeting and are planning more. At a virtual lunch this week we crowd-sourced a research request using the resources of our own libraries. the internet, and our website because the public library is closed.

I and all the members of the board of directors, hope that you and yours are taking all the recommended precautions to stay safe and healthy. Yes, these are difficult and challenging times. But they have the potential to present us with new opportunities to try new things, even as we fall back onto relying on some of the basic things that make our lives more simple and fulfilling.

Remember: reflect, share, communicate, and document. Future family historians will be glad we did.




# Looking for Other Free Research Resources? They are right in your "Back Yard"!!!

### Some of the resources you can find there:

**Newsbank** -A comprehensive collection of news sources covering a wide array of topics and issues **Credo Reference** - Quick reference specialty encyclopedias and dictionaries on topics such as art, biographies, business, geography, grammar, history, legal, medical, music, psychology, quotes, religion and science

**EBSCOhost** - Full text scholarly magazines and journals, covering nearly every area of academic study including: technology, education, engineering, physics, chemistry, language, arts and literature, psychology, religion and more.

**Explora -** Search full-text articles for a wide range of subjects including art and music, literature, geography, history, world cultures, science, technology, engineering, mathematics, health and sports.

**Fold3** - Provides access to military records, including the stories, photos, and personal documents of the men and women who served.

**HeritageQuest** - Revolutionary War, Civil War, and US Congressional Serial Set, US Census reports, birth, death, and marriage records.

**History Geo** - Displays original landowners of the continental United States according to state and federal records. At present covers 21 states and contains over 9 million records. Ever expanding collection of antique maps and atlases. Access in library only.

**Hoonuit** - Provides on-demand computer training needed to develop technology skills. Learn to use Microsoft, Apple, Adobe and Google software like Prezi, PowerPoint and more.

**Digital Archives of Eastern Oklahoma** - Collection of digitized microfilm from local newspapers across our six counties. Content is very limited but ranges from late 1800s to 2012. Newspapers are fully searchable by keyword and date, making it easy to quickly explore.

**Oklahoma Digital Prairie** - Unique digital content spanning more than 100 years of rich, vibrant history from our State. Includes documents, photographs, newspapers, posters, maps and more.

**ProQuest** - Historical archives of the Chicago Defender, Nashville Tennessean and The New York Times.

**ProQuest History Vault** - Digitized letters, papers, photographs, scrapbooks, diaries and more primary sources from the University Publications of America (UPA) collection.

**ProQuest Statistical Abstract of the U.S. 2017** - Comprehensive summary of statistics on the social, political and economic conditions of the United States.

**World Book** - Timelines, science and biography articles, science fair projects and Spanish language section.
