



## ··· HOTEL ADAMS. ···

John Adams, in conjunction with others, built the magnificient Hotel Adams in 1889 on the site of the extinct Mitchell House, a popular & successful hotel which faced the M.K.T. tracks on Okmulgee Avenue.

Mr. Adams managed this first-class hostlery until 1898, a short time before the February 1899 fire which destroyed it. The Hotel Adams had 60 elegantly furnished rooms, electricity, equipped with steam, bath rooms, and barbershop. The depot and ticket offices were also roomed in a portion of the hotel.

The Day Clerk, in 1897, was Milo E. Adams, son of John Adams; and Bert Peterson [Peterman] was the night man. Milo began his cigar business by opening a stand in the lobby of the hotel. His cigar business later expanded.

#### GENEALOGY GEM

When searching for further information on a particular town, keep in mind the larger cities of that time -- case in point -- the Wealaka Mission School, Creek Nation, I.T, 1881-1907; (near Bixby, Tulsa County today) was approx. 40 miles from Muskogee, but was the largest town then and news was submitted to the Muskogee newspaper from Wealaka.

# SCHOOLS IN INDIAN TERRITORY By Sheri Siebold

One of the interesting challenges of doing school research in eastern Oklahoma is one must always remember that this was Indian Territory. All rights and privileges were granted unto the citizens of the Five Civilized Nations. Each nation had their own school system, school buildings, teachers and officials. They had been in operation for over fifty years without Federal Government intrusion, but by the turn of the century, big changes were underway in Indian Territory. The railroad was established, and over a quarter of a million white "non-citizens" were settling in a land where they had no rights and where their children had no educational opportunities.

Educational changes for the Indian came about due to the Curtis Act (Section 19, 30 Statutes, June 28, 1898), which by a long stretch of the imagination, gave authority to the Secretary of Interior over competentcy of school superintendents and teachers; and control of schools in general. John D. Benedict was appointed U.S. Superintendant of Schools in Indian Territory in 1899 and under his careful and considerate authority the Indian schools in all nations greatly improved.

In Mr. Benedict's travels over the Territory he saw a terrible plight toward the illerate white children and set about improving that situation. At a "Free School" convention at Purcell in 1900 Mr. Benedict stated:

....This territory is peculiarly the home of the Indian, but the white man has been lawfully admitted here. He has paid no license to transact business here. He has built homes and cities and developed farms, and they have vastly enhanced the value of the Indians' allotments. He has built railroads, school houses, churches, erected hotels and business houses. He has created a market for the native products, and if he proves true to his Anglo-Saxon characteristics, he is here to stay. Since he has been admitted as a neighbor to the Indian, far better for the Indian to have him educated. An educated, intelligent white population can be of great benefit to the Indian, but an ignorant degraded white man is the Indian's worst enemy. The American common school is the greatest civilizing force in our midst.

A clause attached to the Indian appropriation bill finally allowed some money to be used for white schools whereby they maintained 445 rural schools, which enrolled 5,170 Indian children, 20,995 white children and 78 negro schools which had 4,034 negros. Each year saw an improvement, which was the beginning of free schools in Indian Territory.

Incorporated towns, such as Muskogee, could legally establish a public school system, which Muskogee did in 1898. By 1900, Muskogee had three public schools with over 1200 students. School directors were Pleasant Porter, W.C. Trent and J.B. Torrans.

## MUSKOGEE SCHOOLS Abstracted from Moore's Muskogee Directory - 1903

Muskogee's schools have long been one of its chief features. The influence these have exerted in preparing the material for a new state can hardly be estimated. These four outrank any other schools of the Indian Territory.

Although Indian University is a mile or more outside the corporate limits, and has a postoffice (Bacone) its interests are so closely linked with the town's that it is placed in the Directory.

#### HENRY KENDALL COLLEGE

#### Muskogee, Indian Territory For The Year Ending May 22, 1899

The Henry Kendall College was established in September of 1894 in honor of Rev. Henry Kendall, D.D. who served for 30 years as Secretary on the Board of Home Missions of the Presbyterian Church.

The aim of the institution was to offer young people a thorough education at very low rates instilling a higher Christian education. The principle was that education must be moral and spiritual first, intellectual secondly.

In the year of 1899 the school moved to a beautiful site of 26 acres outside of town. The site consisted of five buildings. Later on this college moved to Tulsa, which became Tulsa University.

#### JOHN GOLDEN ROSS

by Hubbard Ross

(Mr. Hubbard Ross, of Ft. Gibson, Ok., is a grandson of John Golden Ross)

Born in Scotland, 1787. When he was a small boy his parents sailed for the United States with their two children, John G. and his sister. Far out at sea a great storm arose, during which Ross, the father, was swept overboard by a billow and was seen no more. His wife fell dead from shock. The captain of the ship cared for the children and brought them to Baltimore. There, a citizen of the city gave the orphans a home. The little girl grieved for her parents and soon died. John G. Ross grew up in Baltimore. He received schooling and learned the trade of cabinet maker. Upon attaining his majority he went south and located in Tennessee. He saw military service in the War of 1812 and served under Gen. Andrew Jackson, performing hazardous service as mounted messenger or express rider, and was present at the Battle of New Orleans. After the war ended he returned to Tennessee, and in 1819 married Elizabeth, or Elisa Ross, one of the six sisters of John Ross, later principal chief.

John G. Ross followed mercantile pursuits in the "Old Nation" and at one time maintained a large warehouse at Gunter's Landing on the Tennessee River. He owned a beautiful home in Will's Valley, northern Alabama, which he gave up when the Cherokees removed west in 1838.

John G. Ross, his wife and their children: Daniel H., Eliza Jane, John A., Eleanora C., and Lewis A. Ross, reached the mouth of the Illinois River in April 1839, on the steamboat "Victoria". They then traveled overland to Park Hill. The oldest son, William P. Ross, was then in college in New Jersey.

John G. Ross and wife lived in, and cared for the home of Chief John Ross at Park Hill, during a number of years. Successful as a fruit culturist, John G. Ross planted, cared for and brought to production the large apple orchard of Chief John Ross.

When John G. Ross, during the fifties of the last century, removed to his own home, he again operated a store, probably engaging in that business until near the date of his death.

John G. Ross died in June 1858, after a rather brief illness, although he had long been afflicted with rheumatism. On the same night that he died there also closed, the life of Miss Ermina Nash Foreman, daughter of the Rev. Stephen Foreman, Presbyterian minister of Park Hill. A double funeral was held in the brick church of the Mission. Services were conducted by the Rev. Samuel A. Worcester, D.D., and burial of John G. Ross, 71 years of age, was made in the family burying ground, now the Ross cemetary. Himself and wife were members of the Methodist church.

In the closing years of his life, John G. Ross was usually referred to as "Uncle Jack" Ross.

John G. Ross was a small man, physically, but is said to have been absolutely fearless.

John McDonald, born Inverness, Scotland, 1747 when 19 years came to Charleston, S.C., in 1756. He went to Augusta, GA., then to Fort Loudon, Tennessee. Married Anna Shorey, ½ blood Cherokee, in 1770, and settled at Chickamauga. Their daughter, Mary (or Mollie) McDonald, was born November 1, 1770.

Daniel Ross, from Sutherlandshire, Scotland, left an orphan, came to America before the outbreak of the Revolutionary War. He landed at Baltimore, Md., where he lived for some years. Why he came to America does not appear in recollections of members of his family. He married Mary McDonald in 1786, presumably at the home of her parents in Chickamauga. She was of ½ blood Cherokee. John McDonald conducted a trading post at Chickamauga, and was for sometim a Superintendent of Indian Affairs in the southern jurisdiction by appointment of King George III of England. It is not known that Daniel Ross had any military service. He removed to the foot of Lookout Mountain, Tenn. in 1800, where he established a trading post established the first school in the old Cherokee County. His wife, Mrs. Mary McDonald Ross, died October 5, 1808, and Daniel Ross died May 5, 1830. Descendants in Oklahoma have usually believed the two were buried near the home below Lookout Mountain, but within recent years Georgia writers have contended that burial was made near Rome, GA. No tombstones or markers have been found, although so far as known, the graves were at one time marked.

Wm. P. Ross received the lieutenant-colonelcy of the First Cherokee Confederate regiment in 1861. He went with the regiment to the Battle of Pea Ridge, or Elkhorn Tavern, in Arkansas. The action of the Confederate military authorities in marching the Indian regiment out of the Indian Territory invalidated the treaty, which among other things, specifically stated that the regiment should not be required to perform military service outside of the Territory. The majority of the First, or "Drew's Regiment" soon returned to allegiance with the United States government.

Notable in connection with the administration of Wm. P. Ross as principal chief, was the enlargement of the Cherokee National high schools and their reopening. He also began legislation looking to the establishment of the Cherokee Orphans Asylum, which was later to become a notable institution. The new code of Cherokee laws also was adopted while he was principal chief. He constantly sought the advancement of his people, seeking to interest them in education and urged and advised attention to agriculture, fruit tree culture and stock-raising.

He respected Judge Parker as an official of ability and integrity. He was fair toward whites and intermarried whites, treating them with consideration and courtesy, and with the United States and federal officials he enjoyed cordial relations.

#### How We Trace Our Fullblood Ancestry

Ghi-goo-wee was a fullblood Cherokee who married William Shorey; some claim he was Scotch, others English. Anyway he and the King of England were such friends that the King presented him with a gold-headed walking came.

They had two children, William Jr., and Anna. Anna married John McDonald, a Scotch trader, who, beloved by the Cherokees was adopted into the tribe.

Daniel Ross, a Scotchman, coming to the Cherokee country, with Maberry the trader, was arrested. Someone carried the news to McDonald that one of his countrymen was in danger of severe penalty and he hurried there, giving his pledge for the good behavior of Ross. Ross clerked in McDonald's store and married his 16 year old daughter, Mollie.

Daniel's sons - Lewis and John, had a store and the ferryboat landing which came to be known as Ross's Landing. So they founded the city of Chattanooga, as it came later to be known. John Ross was the first postmaster there.

Old Agency -- Stone buildings on a hill about two miles west of the city, where Union Agency was formerly located. [Today: Honor Heights, Five Civilized Tribes Museum]

Hyde Park -- Amusement grounds of the street railway company, on the Arkansas River, five miles northeast of the city. [Today: Industrial park]

Benson Park -- Baseball grounds south part of Garrett Heights. [south 21st Street]

Sturgeon-McRae Park -- Ball grounds of colored people a little south of Benson Park.

Chimney Mountain — Peculiar ridge and detached cone about three miles southward of the city.

Fern Mountain -- Favorite picnic resort three or four miles westward. [private acreages]

Brushy Mountain -- Summer camp and religious meeting place of the summer eight miles southeastward. Famous springs of chalybeate water. [Today: a private homeowner owns the springs and sells the spring water]

Gum Spring -- Picnic grounds toward Fern Mountain. [Today: farm land]

Fort Gibson -- Frontier military post of the United States, seven miles eastward. [Today: rebuilt and open to tourists]

National Cemetery -- Located near Fort Gibson.

Fort Davis -- A temporary fortification of the Confederate forces, on the Harris farm, east of the city; now completely obliterated. [Today: a private homeowner]

#### THE GREAT-HEARTED PRESIDENT

Concerning Bert T. Holderman b:@ 1872 - d: 19 Dec 1898 By Pearl Holderman, b: @ 1883 - d: 27 Jun 1956

On this trail of tears we call life, at times there do occur high points of experience, of which at the moment we do not recognize nor realize the value, nor even the blessing of such contact.

In the subconscious mind of my memory beneath the accumulated silt of every day living lied unforgotten the great goodness of Colonel Teddy Roosevelt to me, to whom he owed no debt of kindness. To do him honor, at request, I share it with you.

My oldest brother, Bert Turner Holderman, enlisted in Troop L, 1st Volunteer Cavalry in the Spanish American War in May, 1898. At the San Antonio training camp, where Col. Teddy Roosevelt joined them, the public dubbed the Regiment "Roosevelt's Rough Riders." While in camp there, Bert was made orderly for Adjutant Hall. This continued until in Tampa, where later he acted also as orderly for Col. Roosevelt and after a Headquarters Mess was formed he was in charge. In a brief diary which he left, I find this entry:

June 5, 1898 - at Tampa, Headquarters Mess formed in evening and a cook hired. Have Col. Leonard Wood, Adjutant Hall, Dr. Lamott and Col. Roosevelt in my mess.

After being on boats for several days awaiting orders, he says, June 14, 1898 - "Pulled across the bar about noon - 30 transports and 4 gunboats. Staying by Headquarters Stuff."

Bert's diary is too brief a statement of happenings without much comment. However, in camp again in Cuba, after a battle, on June 27, it reads: "A Spanish spy was this morning captured in camp and hung and throat cut. May they all be served the same way."

On July 12 I find, "Rained nearly all night and good part of day.

Col. Roosevelt's hammock fell down with him about 2 A.M. and he came up to
my tent and I put him to bed. Had time keeping mess in order in wet weather."

On July 13, "Moved camp again. Rained out for dinner. Got pretty well fixed
in the afternoon. Colonel seemed real pleased with things."

The diary continues -- battles, deaths, burials & wounded, much visiting at Headquarters Mess, ambassadors, officers and newspaper men.

In the Roosevelt Rough Riders, the Colonel says the food for the campaign was very poor. He would not accept the special food for officers, but used

the same food as the enlisted men got, chiefly, hardtack, salt pork and dry beans. Even that was not always available at the front. Whenever possible he bought outside food for his regiment. So in the diary Bert says: July 21-"Went to Santiago today with Col. Roosevelt. Purchased a lot of stuff for the regiment. It is indeed a very old and antique place."

P.S. 45 Colts have been chosen as the weapon, 10 paces apart at 7:30 p.m. sharp.

Editor's reply: We leave out the names in the above letter which reached us Monday because we do not care to frustrate in any way the forth coming duel. We want the affair to come off, and all we desire is that the duelists be careful to not shoot no one besides themselves. We are liberal in our views about duels, and believe that every fool who wants to fight a duel ought to be satisfied. It takes great nerve, great courage, and a great lack of brains for a man to make a target out of himself. There are the three requisites: So fight her out boys; you possess the necessary requisites, except the nerve and courage. Our experience goes to show that it is not safe for editors to be present at duels. The moral influence is not the best, and then duelists usually hit everybody in the neighborhood, except the man they are shooting at. Hence, we cannot be present, but we'll give a word of advice: toe the line promptly at 7:30, shoot below the belt, and don't get scared at the first blood. Remember that if you're killed, you've escaped the asylum and your loss is the people's gain!

#### Research tip

When writing to people listed in phone books that have the same name you are researching, and you want to know if they have any information, send them a letter outlining the information you need, and include a POSTCARD with this "form":

Yes, I am related to the (name) family but I cannot provide you with any genealogical information. I suggest you contact:

Yes, I am related to the (name) family and can give you genealogical data. Please write again with the data you need.

No, I am not related.

This will not only save you postage because you won't have to send an envelope

and a 22 cent stamp, and hopfully you will have a better chance of receiving an answer if the addressee doesn't have to actually write a letter.

National Archives Separate from General Services Administration

Effective April 1, 1985, the National Archives and Records Administration will be an independent agency within the Executive Branch of the government. An Archivist of the United States will be appointed by the President with the advice and consent of the Senate. The separation from the GSA should help safeguard public papers and other materials which are precious and irreplaceable and of special interest to genealogist. The genealogical community long supported this action.
