# MATTHEW MOORE

This article is a tribute to a man for whom not much is written, but to whom genealogists and historians of Muskogee County should be indebted... Matthew R. Moore, founder of the Muskogee City Directory.

Mr. Moore not only published a city directory from the years 1903 - 1918, but chronicled a bit of early Muskogee County history and its people of Indian Territory within its pages.

Mr. Moore came to Muskogee in the spring of 1893, from Arkansas, leaving the employment of a large publishing firm due to poor health ("blood oozing from his lungs"). His grandfather had been a pioneer to Indian Territory and he proceeded to venture into that same land. During his convalescence he learned the Creek language and was able to set the type for publication of the Creek Constitution and Code.

In 1897 Mr. Moore managed a printing office and weekly newspaper, purchasing the plant in 1899. The following year he began the Muskogee Daily Phoenix with the first wire press, Associated Press, being introduced to Muskogee readers. It was while he was editor of the paper that the Century Edition was published, which was regarded as the most comprehensive and authentic history of Muskogee published up to that time (1899). After four years, ill health again plagued Mr. Moore and he eventually lost interests in the property.

Gaining strength, Mr. Moore put into action the Muskogee City Directory, a project that he had desired to do earlier, but postponed until streets were named and numbered.

"It's just like trying to provide trouser, shoes and hats for a growing boy!", exclaimed Mr. Moore about directory making in the growing city of Muskogee, 1906 edition. Each year he hustled about the streets to houses, tents, businesses and schools trying to give accurate and truthful information about the citizens for their own benefit, oftentimes meeting with resentment from people who had no concept of what a city directory was for.

Mr. Moore had vision, or "air-castling" as he called it, of what Muskogee might be, and despite the set backs of three fires and transient influences he saw "what an empire this Indian country would be in the not distant future."

In the April 4, 1917 Muskogee Times Democrat newspaper an article was written on Mr. Moore in defense of his great work for the benefit of Muskogee, and a scathing "editorial" to the competition, the Muskogee Phoenix Directory Company, in conjunction with the R.L.Polk & Co., who were beginning to publish another city directory.

Mr. Moore died July 11, 1918 at 10 o'clock at his residence, 109 South Cherokee. He was 59 years old and was a Mason. His obituary states that his father was a prominent Methodist minister. The only known relatives were Mrs. J.B. White, of Coweta; and Mrs. H.C. Warren, of Muskogee.

Matthew Moore wrote an interesting paragraph in his 1911 city directory concerning names in the directory, which can be helpful to genealogists in using directories in general:

About the hardest and most up-hill work yet attempted is that of giving one full Christian name, begun with this issue. It is just next to impossible to make a certain individual understand that "J.W." is hardly enough of his name, for according to his understanding of the matter the Almighty created but one of that kind, and when he gets mail and bills and other interesting things belonging to some other "J.W." he is surprised at the information thus casually borne in on him that there may be other "J.W's" of the same name. One of the best features of giving the name in full is that the errors common in printing and writing single initials are almost wholly eliminated. This work is not as complete as desired, but a real good start has been made. The publisher of this book began his work by inserting the wife's name with that of her husband, against the opinions of directory and other people of this western country, but it has been adopted now by practically all of them. It is justice to the wife and it helps wonderfully in identifying individuals of nearly alike names. It is regrettable that families do not have access to the directory as much as they should, for then there would be more care in giving the names of the female members of the family. It is not a difficult matter to show some people that according to the record they have had five separate wives in the nine books, although they may not be conscious of any change whatever. There is, so far as this scribbler can see, no way of combatting the female tendency to "follow the fashions," so if it is "May" one year, "Mai," "Mae," "Maye," etc., in succeeding years, just use the discrimination which you must make each spring and fall as the new bonnets come in. It is unfortunate, of course, that the husband will almost surely give the name dearest to himself, often a "pet" name, while the wife gives that portion of her name which she likes best or which happens to come handiest.

# THE GREAT-HEARTED PRESIDENT - Continued

Concerning Bert T. Holderman b: ca 1872 - d: 19 Dec 1898 By Pearl Holderman

Returning to U.S. soil Bert adds in his journal, August 15, "Pulled into dock at 11 A.M. amid much cheering and a hearty welcome by all. Our camp is about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles from Montauk Point in a beautiful place and elegant surroundings." On August 20, "Colonel Roosevelt's wife took dinner with us today."

September 3, "The greatest thing today for us was the visit of President William McKinley this morning at 10 A.M. We received him heartily and were glad of this opportunity of seeing him. Col. Roosevelt also gave us some splendid advice."

By some special privilege of mustering out, Bert was given some of the Headquarters mess equipment, Col. Roosevelt's blankets, his knife and fork, the granite ware sugar bowl & cream pitcher, soup bowls, and two Springfield rifles, all of which he brought home. When the old home burned, much was lost, but I still have one old blue army blanket which warmed Col. Roosevelt in the Cuban rains.

During the campaign Bert was suffering from the deadly malignant malaria. He was in a Montauk Hospital for some time. Later he was with Col. Roosevelt at his Oyster Bay home for several days. From this close association through battle and hardship, there grew a friendship between these two men, differing so vastly in their origins, that was deeper than mere commander and soldier.

Colonel Roosevelt's constant care for his men had his appreciation of their loyalty and devotion, their real heroism and patriotism was shown daily in this feeling of responsibility for their welfare. Their response was a wholehearted love for their leader which even today still lives in the heart of every Rough Rider.

After his return home, Brother Bert was not with us long. On Dec. 19, 1898, from the effects of the malaria, he passed away in Muskogee (Okla.). Miss Alice Robertson wrote Colonel Roosevelt of Bert's death. We had a very kindly letter from him in which he said, "He gave his life to his country as truly as though he had died on the battlefield."

In Roosevelt's Rough Riders can be seen the deep interest the Colonel had always in the Indian. After mentioning an "Adair" in the Regiment, he further says, "I don't know that I ever came across a man with a really

sweeter nature than another Cherokee named Holderman. He was an excellent soldier and for a long time aacted as cook for Headquarters mess. He was a halfbreed and came of soldier stock on both sides and through both races. He explained to me once why he had come into the war; that it was because his people always had fought when there was a war and he could not feel happy to stay at home when the flag was going into battle."

On the back of Bert's discharge were these words in Colonel Roosevelt's handwriting: "Bert T. Holderman, in all the fights of the Santiago campaign, enlisted at Muscogee, I.T., one of the best soldiers and one of the most loyal, honest and hard working men it has ever been my good fortune to meet." Signed: Theodore Roosevelt, Col. U.S.V.

During his campaign for Vice President, Col. Roosevelt wrote father where he would be in Oklahoma City, so father took mother and me down to meet him. We saw him in his special car for a little visit. Later when in Washington he kept track of us through Phil Campbell of Pittsburg, Kansas, who was in Congress at that time.

In September 1917, Theodore Roosevelt came to Kansas City to make a speech. The papers were filled with the story of the visit. At that time I had lain in the Research Hospital for six months with a leaky heart. Father was gone, so Mother wrote to Col. Roosevelt telling him she regretted not being able to get to the Auditorium to hear him speak.

The next morning, Sunday, a nurse brought in a telephone saying "you are wanted on the phone." In astonishment I heard a voice saying, "This is Kirkwood of the Kansas City Star, Pres. Roosevelt is now going to church and will return by way of the hospital if you care to see him." I managed to gasp out of my great pleasure...Finally Mother came in with a stocky man with a beaming smile and eyes of kindness. "How are you child, and what can I do for you? What does your doctor say you need?" asked Pres. Roosevelt.

While the tears dropped off my chin, my troubles rolled from my shoulders onto him. He was a great friend, stooping down to answer a human need. He was a strong soul giving strength to a weak one. Dr. Hoxie, my doctor, had said months in Arizona or New Mexico would be necessary before I could be on my feet. So the Col. said, "Leave it to me.: In farewell he stooped and gently kissed me on the cheek. The nurses washed around the spot for a week! Speaking to Mother he said, "You have a heritage of blood - your Cherokee Indian blood - which I would be proud to have in my own."

After a time letters came from Rough Riders in New Mexico and Arizona. In January Mother and I went to Phoenix where we were met by a courtly gentleman who took us to a small hotel in a village in the desert. During the months there, Rough Riders called upon us, offering their kindness and help if needed. All of whom had been told by their Colonel to rally round the sick sister of a fallen comrade.

So to me, Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, President Roosevelt, is also the man called Greatheart, the eiptome of human kindness.

# ROUGH RIDERS -1898

Patriotic excitement was running high in Indian Territory, in particular, Muskogee, when Allyn K. Capron opened a recruiting office for the First U.S. Voluntary Cavalry in the summer of 1898. Many eager applicants crowded the streets in front of the office to serve President McKinley in Cuba.

Muskogee townspeople erected tables at the fairground's where a banquet was served to the volunteers. There were speeches, music and "patriotic airs" given by a glee club. Young ladies gave flowers to the young heroes and motherly christian women gave them little Testaments.

Before the waiting train, the long line of men swore their allegiance to their country. All of Muskogee was there to bid them good-bye and "God Speed". The train took the raw recruits to San Antonio for camp, then on to Tampa, and finally San Juan, Santiago and other such spanish names.

The muster-out roll of Troop L is copied from the appendix to Colonel Roosevelt's "Rough Riders." This roll was prepared by Captain Day, the Vinita man who took command of the company after Captain Capron's death. It is correct in that it tallies perfectly with the list of troopers who left here in May 1898.

Troop L lost not a man from disease while in service, although many have since died. Troop L lost more in killed-and-wounded than any other troop of the Rough Riders.

# Salt Mines or Licks

From 1867 to 1870, Dennis VANN, Cherokee Freedman, was appointed one of the Light Horsemen whose job it was to protect the people of the Saline Dist, Cherokee Na., against thieves & outlaws. During that time he noticed salt mines or "licks", as they were called, on land belonging to the following people: Lewis ROGERS, on the Grand River; Lewis ROSS, E. of Grand Riv.; Will ALBERTIE, W. of Grand River; LeRoy MARKHAM, E. of Grand Riv.; and MACKAY's, Webbers Falls. When the waters were high, steamboats would come in and take the salt, but generally all salt made was sold in Ft. Gibson.

The oldest of the group is Mrs. A.B. Chilcoat, of Wainwright, 85 years old.

1891 Comment on Marriage in Indian Territory: Prior to the establishment of the U.S. Court for I.T., there was no law requiring a licence nor the formalities of a minister in order that the marriage be valid & legal; some of our best citizens were not married according to the laws of the State of Arkansas, but resorted to the old common law and consummated the marriage in compliance therewith!

# VARIOUS NAMES FOR DISEASES

You will find unfamiliar diseases mentioned in census mortality schedules (and other records) as causes of death. Not all those diseases have been stamped out and forgotten, but some now are known by different names.

Many were known by two or more names even then, and the mortality schedules use all the variants. Usually the alternate names are easy to figure out. For instance, there are entries for winter fever, lung fever and inflammation of the lungs, and also for the same disease by its more familiar name, pneumonia. Bilious fever is usually malaria, also shown as ague or as chills and fever. Mortification usually meant gangrene or tetanus, and those names also may be found in the record.

Quinsy was what we now call acute tonsilitis, and thrush was an oral infection that usually afflicted infants. One suspects some of these patients may actually have had diphtheria, which is characterized by an extremely sore throat.

Inflammation or congestion of various organs frequently is mentioned, and gives you an idea of the patient's symptoms, if not his disease. For instance, inflammation of the brain, which sometimes is entered as phrenitis, implies delirium. Phthisis was pulmonary tuberculosis, which more often is entered as consumption. Phthisic, a variant of phthisis, is an archaic name for asthma.

If you find mention of a disease you can't identify in modern terms, look it up in a good dictionary, as even the obsolete names of common diseases usually are defined. By Margaret Ross, Arkansas Gazette, Little Rock, Ark. from her column "Grass Roots".

Many of the deaths mentioned in Indian Territory were of consumption. Malaria was also a plaque of the area. Many of those afflicted would go to Colorado, Texas or the Hot Springs in Arkansas to aid their health.

# The Cherokees Passing Through Batesville, Arkansas

The Cherokee Indians passed through Batesville, Independence County, Ark. trying to get to Indian Territory.

A party of these Indians, which left Gunter's landing on the Tennessee River, about thirty-five miles above Huntsville, Alabama, on October 10, 1838, and consisting of about 1200 people when it reached Arkansas, was reported at Smithville, in Lawrence County on December 12. William Byers himself was at Smithville at the time and wrote the report to the News. Byers described them as being in excellent condition-except that measles and whooping cough were killing about four per day. The Indians passed near Batesville December 15,1838, and many of them came through the town to have horses shod and carriages repaired. The News reported many of the Indians barefooted. About fifty had died since leaving Alabama. This second account of the Cherokees was written by G.W. Norris, a Methodist preacher, who had been a missionary to the Cherokees in 1826, and had taught school among them. Norris praised them for their soberiety, culture, and religiosity.

Joseph M. Ross Chouteau Station, Cherokee Nation Indian Territory 1873-4 West of Arks. Via St. Louis Envelope: Bayougoula P.O. W...LA Aug. 17th 1873

Tally Ho. Jan. 21, 1874

My dear Joe,

Your letter came as Christmas gift to me. I was very glad indeed to hear from you. I hope you will not let so long a time pass between your letters, for they are a great pleasure to me.

Tell Ruth I hope she will keep at you about writing to me. I hope Ruth, Spoon and all of you keep well. Tell Spoon I wish he would write to me. I don't want him to forget me as may be some day we will be able to go out to see you all. John has been talking all along about going to see you all next Summer but he will not be able to start the money — It is dreadful times down in this state about money matters. All the planters came out bad enough this year. And ever so many will not go on at all or go on shares, a few will pay wages \$13. per month. Cousin George and family have not reached here yet, but I trust they will come before long. I was so very sorry I could not send you and Oliver some sugar and Syrup. Give my love to Oliver. I would like to hear from him.

Cousin Mank(?) has named her boy Lewis Edward. What has become of Cousin Carrie's folks. I have not heard a word from them for months? I hope you will see George and Charley once in a while when the Asylum is moved to Saline.

Give my love to Lou Archer. Also to Houston. Will you please tell Ruth to let Houston have my feather bed. I have only one, the one used by Mother, but he can take it. I will write to him soon - I hope he will stay with you.

How are Rena & Flora? Give them my love. Tell Spoon I send him a kiss and his Uncle John sends him his love.

Do you receive the papers John sends you and Oliver every week? We have had a very pleasant winter, every now and then a few days of cold, but not to last long. I was very sorry to hear of your bad luck about the corn.

I shall write again very soon. Love to Ruth and all

Oldest Man in Muskogee County, 1935

Martin RAY, 95 year old man, of Gooseneck Bend and Oktaha, wins the "oldest man in Muskogee Co." golden-cane award. Mr. Ray, born near Christianburg, Floyds Co. Kentucky, March 25, 1840. Is the oldest of a family of three children. His brother, James, who he hasn't heard from in years, & a sister, Mary, who is dead. First 56 years of his life were spent in the hills of Kty., in which he served in the Union Army. In 1896 he migrated with his family to Lone Rock, Ark. When Mrs. Ray died in 1900, leaving him with five children, he packed his belongings in a covered wagon, crossed the river, and came up to the Muskogee area where he settled at Gooseneck Bend. He remained there an active farmer until 1931 when he moved to Oktaha to live with his daughter, Sally and her husband, H.H. HOWELL, also a retired farmer. Mr. Ray never remarried. In 1931 he returned to Floyd County to visit his old haunts, but found it strangely different. Ray has four children living today (1935): Noah, Sallie, both of Oktaha; James, of Alvin; Eadie, of Kentucky, she had married and raised a family before the migration westward. # Vian Man Celebrates Centennial



HAPPY BIRTHDAY JOE MORRIS! Dec. 18, 1985, marked Morris' 100th birthday and Vian town dads celebrated it in style by passing a Proclamation in honor of his centennial. The proclamation, signed by Vian Mayor Herbert Dennis and attested to by Town Clerk Darzella Barnes, was duly published like any other legal act of the Town Council. Joseph Alexander Morris has seen a great many changes in the way people live, work, and travel during his lifetime for he has lived a whole century.

Born December 18, 1885, in Elm Grove Community, Flint District of the Cherokee Nation, the son of John Gideon Morris, part Cherokee, born in North Carolina, and Annie, fullblood daughter of Sar-tah-kah, and Ki-hu-kah, who had traveled the Trail of Tears from Georgia.

John Gideon Morris and his brothers and sisters were brought to Indian Territory by his parents when they accompanied Gideon F. Morris and many other family members in 1867, at the invitation of the Cherokee Nation West. In that year they were made citizens of the tribe by the Council . About 1870 John married Annie Gideon Franklin. Their children were, Mary, George, Sallie, Rufus, and Joseph, born to them by the time they moved into what became Sequoyah County, after the dissolution of the Indian Nations in 1907. Joseph has lived most of his life in Sequoyah County for John and Annie moved their family to the Badger Community soon after 1890.

Joseph was introduced to Rosa Ann Moss of the Sycamore Community by his cousins, the children of William Byers. Rosa Ann Moss was the daughter of William Thomas Moss and Lucie Ada Barry. Joseph and Rosa Ann born in Indian Territory were products of diverse cultures, from many areas, all southern. They were married March 12,1916, in Vian. Rosa Ann died April 21,1968, after a marriage of more than fifty years and eight children. The ancestors of both had a part of shaping their country for between them they have at least nine forebearers who had fought in the Revolutionary War.

All of Josephs' children came home to help make his 100th birthday a memorable occasion. They are Mrs.Earl Boogs(Lulu) of Muskogee, Taylor of Port Hardy, British Columbia, Canada, Mrs. Goodlow(Ruth), of Kayenta, Arizonia, Joseph, of Westlake, Oregon, David, of New Orleans, La., Mrs. Fred Drew(Monta) of Milan, New Mexico, and Mrs.Cleo Leaf(Ada) of Vian, in whose home the celebration was held.

Herbert Dennis, Vian mayor, proclaimed December 18, 1985, Joe Morris Day. The Chief of the Cherokee Nation appointed him an "Ambassador of Good Will" for the tribe. He received greetings from President Reagan, former President Jimmy Carter, Gov.George Nigh, and a host of friends from around the country.

Often the mother was appointed guardian of the child under 14 years, and in most jurisdictions, if the child was over 14, he or she could name his or her own guardian.


