

#### BODIES REMOVED FROM THE OLD CEMETERY TO GREENHILL

In the month of February 1890 the new cemetery, east of town, called the City Cemetery and later Green Hill Cemetery, was ready for those who needed to bury their dead. The old graveyard on the hill just northwest of the city (6th & Fondulac) had been the city cemetery since the beginning of Muskogee (1872-3), and was ill kept with grass growing high and wooden markers decaying. In one article it had been referred to as "boot hill", but to others it was simply the City Cemetery.

Even with the new cemetery ready many continued to bury their dead at the old graveyard, so as quietly as possible the city began the removal of the bodies to Greenhill. In as many cases as possible the markers were kept intact and placed over the respective bodies. A 1931 newspaper article stated that conservative estimates placed the numbers removed at 350 to 400; and was placed in the extreme eastern boundary, which is marked by about thirty headstones, all dated prior to 1900.

No burial records were kept by the city and in most cases the matter was left to the families, to be handed down verbally or registered in the family Bible.

The matter of markers was not urgent as a tombstone had to be ordered, in most cases, from St. Louis. As a result many of Muskogee pioneers were laid to rest with a sturdy pine board for a head marker.

November 8, 1888 Muskogee Weekly Phoenix:

Edward NEAL died Thursday morning last, son of S.W. and Mary R. Neal. He was an employee of M.K.& T. He died at Sedalia, but was buried here at the city cemetery.

November 3, 1892 Muskogee Weekly Phoenix:

Mr. S.W. NEAL, the old gentleman who formerly resided with his daughter, Mrs. CRAIN, at this place, died Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock at the residence of his son-in-law, Mr. I.T. LIPSCOMB, near Checotah. Funeral services will be held in Muskogee at the Presbyterian Church today. (Mr. Neal had received the death notice of his father, Gen'l Wm. H. NEAL at Charlotte, N.C., 90 yrs. old, which was mentioned January 10, 1889's newspaper article).

December 1, 1892 Muskogee Weekly Phoenix:

Wm. LAMB, proprietor of the Commercial House, died Sunday, Nov. 27th, at home. He was born at Morgan Co. Illinois February 1859 [See the tombstone date!]. He has been living in Indian Territory for seven years. He was the watchman at the Arkansas River bridge four years, then moved to Wybark where he held the position of postmaster in connection with a small store...He moved to Muskogee two months ago. He leaves a wife and two little daughters; a brother and sister. Mrs. Lamb and Mr. M.J. Lamb, brother of Wm. Lamb, thank those in Muskogee for favors.

Mellane GRUNWALD, was the daughter of John A. Grunwald who came to Muskogee with the Katy Christmas day, 1871. He had been working for an uncle in Ft. Scott Kan. to repay him for furnishing passage to America from Germany.

# ALABAMA'S ONLY REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIER by Peter A. Brannon

A few years ago as the sun went down on those unchosen lands allotted to his people, there passed to the other shore, a character linking old Scotland and new Alabama - yes, linking the ever present here with the long past in a way which only life's romantic turns can decide.

George Washington Grayson died at his home in Oklahoma, December 3, 1920.

But a few days after the young Virginian whose name Mr. Grayson bore, had saved Braddock's little force from disaster, France gave to Great Britain those of her possessions east of the Mississippi. Then the government of her Southwestern Colonies decreed that the mother country's native who sought to trade in the Indain nation must be licensed by the government and the Council of the Georgia Colony was accordingly directed to issue these.

To Augusta came a Scotch family of four brothers and a sister, and Robert, one of these Griersons, was assigned to trade at the Hilibi town on the waters of a stream of that name and in the present Clay County, Alabama. Fortune smiled and thrity years later, we find him comfortable, surrounded by a wife and five children, and, too, Pinkey and Sam, grandchildren had arrived to add pleasure to his declining years. The young trader had early married Sinnugee of the Spanalgee clan of the Hilibis, and Sarah, Walter, David, Liza and William were, with Sarah's husband, Stephen Hawkins, a sub-trader an interesting family in this wilderness country of the Tallapoosa Valley.

When Colonel Benjamin Hawkins, one time of General Washington's staff and the friend of LaFayette, visited him in his official capacity as agent of Indian affairs, he found Mr. Grierson quite a business man. He was cultivating a farm of thirty acres and he produced corn, cotton, rice, peas, beans, squashes, watermelons and artichokes; his cotton planted in drills four feet apart and the stalks reaching eight feet in height. Again, forty negro slaves, three hundred cattle and thirty horses made up his other property. Indian labor was readily obtainable and he was able to hire cotton pickers for the wage of half a pint of salt for each bushel basket of cotton gathered. Sometimes, however, he gave three strands of glass beads instead. Salt was not an expensive commodity with this Scotchman as he had on his own land one of the few "salt-licks" in the Indian country and it was to this site once every year, in the early winter, that the settlers came to "round up" their stock which gathered here at that season.

During the month of December 1796 he ginned his fall crop with a tread gin which had reached him by pack-horse from Providence, Rhode Island, and sold his lint cotton in Tennessee at thirty-four cents the pound. Colonel Hawkins noted in his journal that he wrote Mr. Crierson as of Nov. 9, 1797, that "he had females enough to make 1000 yards of spun cloth annually", and offered to help him by furnishing cards and having looms constructed. Again he had other duties in addition to his agricultural and domestic ones. He was paid \$600 for four loads of iron, presumably hauled to the "public smiths"

(blacksmiths paid by the Government) in the nation.

But, in the years gone by, Mr. Grierson had been active in many other ways. He served in the American Army in the Revolution and history records that he made pecuniary contributions thereto. A careful search of the records indicates him as the only white man serving from our Alabama of today in that little Army of Patriots - Alabama's only Revolutionary soldier. 'Tis true that there were only a few white settlers in this Indian country, but these either served with the British or very carefully stayed with their families in the woods. Mobile, it must be remembered, was in British West Florida. Again 'twas "at Robert Grierson's house among the Hilibis" that Colonel Marinus Willett met Alexander McGillivray when he brought his secret message from George Washington, first president of the new United States of America.

And it was the "aged Scotchman Grierson" who influenced Andrew Jackson in 1813 to agree to allow the Hilibis to make a friendly treaty, but, alas, General White had burned their town, murdered sixty and took fifty prisoners before the news could be brought back.!

James his brother, whom he left at Augusta twelve years before coming into the country, was a Colonel in the Bristish forces commanding Georgia Torie and was killed at the siege of Augusta. General Thomas Woodward tells us that it was to his relief that Colonel John Tate hurried with his Alabama Indian force on that ill-fated expedition when Tate died at Cusseta on the Chattahoochee.

Thomas, another brother, joined the American forces and lost his life during the first year of the war. Of William, the youngest, we know nothing. But Sandy, the son, did not follow in the footsteps of the parent as we find numerous references in the Indian agent's journal like this: "paid Sandy Grierson for carrying dispatches to Cusseta, \$5.00", or "paid Sandy Grierson, half breed, for express from Upper Creeks, \$4.67', and once he was paid "one guinea for express dispatches". Stephen his brother-in-law, once received \$3.00 for taking up some horses belonging to the settlers in the Cumberland Valley.

During March 1830 a delegation of Upper Creek Chiefs visited Fort Mitchell to consult the agent, Colonel John Crowell, who sought to quiet their anger over the attempted arrest of Tuskena, son of Big Warrior, who had succeeded his father as head chief. James Stuart, a celebrated traveler, thus describes one of the party: "Robert Grierson, a fine jolly looking young fellow not unlike a Leadenhall-street butcher, son of a Scotchman by a Creek Indian woman." As Robert, of Hilibi, had no son of the name, it was doubtless his grandson.

The Upper Creeks went west to Arkansas Territory in 1836 and were settled on the forks of the Canadian River in which was later Indian Territory, to become seventy-five years still later, Oklahoma. Here they perpetuated in their new lands, their old customs, carried out their old traditions and called their settlements by the names of those old places they loved in their native country of the East.

Here in 1843, near Eufuala, George Washington Grayson, the son of Robert, whom we last saw at Fort Mitchell in 1830, was born. He attended the Asbury Methodist Mission School - an institution perpetuating one his father knew at "home" - and was one of five boys chosen from his tribe to attend Arkansas State University.

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During the War between the States he served in the Creek Confederate Volunteers and surrendered as Captain of Company K. Like his old grandfather pioneer in far off Alabama country, he contributed his services over to his people. He served for a time as Treasurer of the Nation, and was Principal Chief during his last years. He was of the Katcalgi or Panther Clan of Coweta town and represented it in the Council House of the nation for forty years. Mr. Grayson married Annie Stidham, daughter of Judge George Washington Stidham, a Hitchiti Indian. The Steadhams of the Tensas country of Alabama today, perpetuate the Clan which that other Scotchman planted among Alabama's aboriginal natives years ago.




Illustration from Frank Cunningham's "General Stand Watie's Confederate Indian"

#### INFORMATION ON THE 4 MICROFILM ROLLS OF STARR'S UNPUBLISHED NOTES

Compiled by Mary E. Rogers, February 1986

These rolls comprise the surviving manuscripts and papers of Emmet Starr that were used in the preparation of his book "History of the Cherokee Indians," published in 1921. The first 3 rolls concern the genealogy of 21 "Old Families," and the final roll appears to be "working notes and papers." The families have been assigned a Roman numeral designation. "A" is missing from the Index. The following "Old Families" are not included: Blair, Butler, England, Hendricks, Hildebrand, Raper, Ratliff, Reese, Rogers (NOT Grant-Rogers or Cordery-Rogers), Seabolt, Smith, Springston, Thompson, Timpson, Wilkerson, and Woodall.

The manuscript is valuable because it contains many dates of birth, marriage, death, and additional biographical notes that do not appear in the book. It also contains some additional generations for some lines.

The researcher needs to be able to use Starr's genealogical numbering system. (A brief description of his system has been attached at the end of this article.) It is also suggested that attention be given to the first three rolls before resorting to the fourth.

#### ROLL NO. 1:

This is purported to be a "comprehensive" index of names found in the manuscripts, from B thru Z. (The volume for surnames beginning with A is missing.) Many of the names are cross-referenced to the family line(s) as follows:

#### ROLL NO. 2:

This contains the genealogies of 10 "Old Fami,lies." There is a "header sheet" for each family. (The Grant family is in two sections.) Each handwritten page for a family is numbered and the applicable Roman numeral for the family is placed at the top of each sheet. Pages are wide and two photocopies will be needed to reproduce the full width on the library reader.

I--GRANT: Book contains 6 generations. Manuscript has 10 generations for some lines. (Alphabetical/numerical footnotes are explained on Roll 3.)

II--DOWNING: Book contains 5 generations. Manuscript has 8 generations for some lines. (Alphabetical/numerical footnotes are explained on Roll 3.)

III--GHIGAU: Book contains 5 generations. Manuscript has 9 generations for some lines. (Alphabetical/numerical footnotes are explained on Roll 3.)

IV--FOREMAN: Book contains 3 generations. Manuscript has 7 generations for some lines. (Alphabetical/numerical footnotes are explained on Roll 3.)

V--SEQUOYAH: Book contains 5 generations. Manuscript has no additional generations. (For alphabetical/numerical footnotes, see Roll 3.)

VI--OOLOOTSA: Book contains 6 generations. Manuscript has 9 generations for some lines. (For alphabetical/numerical footnotes, see Roll 3.)

VII--BOWLES: Book contains 5 generations. No additional in manuscript. (For alphabetical/numerical footnotes, see Roll 3.)

VIII--SANDERS: Book contains 4 generations. Manuscript has 7 generations for some lines. (For alphabetical/numerical footnotes, see Roll 3.)

IX--RIDGE-WATIE: Book contains 4 generations. Manuscript has 6 generations for some lines. (For alphabetical/numerical footnotes, see Roll 3.)

X--WARD: Book contains 4 generations. Manuscript has 7 generations for some lines. (For alphabetical/numerical footnotes, see Roll 3.)

#### ROLL NO. 3:

XI--CORDERY: Book contains 4 generations. Manuscript has 7 generations for some lines. (For alphabetical/numerical footnotes, see last part of this Roll.)

XIV--CARTER: Book contains 4 generations. Manuscript has 6 generations for some lines. (Alphabetical/numerical footnotes on last of this Roll.)

XV--ADAIR: Book contains 5 generations. Manuscript has 8 generations for some lines. (Alphabetical/numerical footnotes on last of this Roll.)

XVI--ROSS: Book contains 6 generations. Manuscript has 8 generations for some lines. (Alphabetical/numerical footnotes on last of this Roll.)

XVII--GOSADUISGA: Book contains 5 generations. Manuscript has 8 generations for some lines. (Alphabetical/numerical footnotes on last of this Roll.)

XVIII--CONRAD: Book contains 4 generations. Manuscript has 7 generations for some lines. (Alphabetical/numerical footnotes on last of this Roll.)

XIX--RILEY: Book contains 4 generations. Manuscript has 6 generations for some lines. (Alphabetical/numerical footnotes on last of this Roll.)

XX--DUNCAN: Book contains 4 generations. Manuscript has 7 generations for some lines. (Alphabetical/numerical footnotes on last of this Roll.)

XXI--HALFBREED: Book contains 4 generations. Manuscript has 8 generations for some lines. (Alphabetical/numerical footnotes follow.)

ALPHABETICAL/NUMERICAL FOOTNOTES: Footnotes are numbered from A1 thru L309. They are not in alphabetical order. They give dates of birth, marriage, death, and biographical information. A sampling is as follows:

A4 William Penn Adair, born October 26, 1890

A5 James D. Wilson, born February 2nd, 1861, married April 1st, 1883; Letitia M. Fields born September 13, 1860

A6 Spencer Foreman Stephens, born June 10, 1896

A7 Indianola Stephens born March 2nd 1898

A498 John Ross, an eighth blood Cherokee of the (Bird inserted) clan was born at Turkeytown on the Coosa river on October 3, 1790. He was educated privately by George Barber Davis of Marysville, Tennessee, and later at Kingston, Tennessee. He was deputed by Cherokee Agent Return Jonathan Meigs to visit the Western Cherokees who then lived near Dardanelle Rock on the Arkansas river; with presents in order to procure their neutrality in the threatened struggle with Great Britain. This trip embraced four months: from December 25, 1812, to April 1813. Shortly after his return from this trip he married Quatie, a full blood of his own, the Bird Clan. She was born in 1791. He was Adjutant of Morgan's Cherokee regiment in the Creek War of 1813-14. (Etc.)

ROLL NO. 4:

This Roll appears to contain his working notes and papers. They are not in any particular order. Information should be used with caution, as some of the data appears to have been corrected when it was incorporated into his book. In particular, note the comment on the Ghigau, Nancy Ward, where it contains incorrect years of birth and death and name of husband. A sampling of material at the start of the Roll is as follows:

(Note: 1st few pages are numbered; many are not.)

Page 1--description of Cherokee government.

Pages 2 to middle of 6--officers of the Cherokee Nation 1844.

Page 6 (middle) -- deaths

Page 7--general notes, such as: 1st Cherokee Advocate published September 26, 1894 at Tahlequah, Wm. P. Ross editor.

Page 8--Bean Starr was shot three times and captured, etc.

John Fields signer of treaty of 1835 was killed on (?Corr) Skin prairie presumably by Degahtusky and Samuel Foster and three others—they were tried & acquitted.

Bluford West died at Washington Apr 2 1845

Page 12--John Ross elected honorary member of Pa Hist society

Page 14--Nancy Ross m. Otterlifter B Dec 23, 1833 D Apr 4 1890

Page 20--Charles Renatus Hicks was born in 1767. Was at different times principal chief, assistant chief delegate and treasurer of the Nation--bears the distinction of having been of more good for his people than any other Native of his time. In 1799 he leant very material aid to the Moravian missionaries, Stin\_\_\_\_ and deSchwinitz in establishing the first school in the Cherokee Nation--this church he joined in 1813 being the second convert

to Christianity among the Cherokees. He died in 1827 and was buried at his own request at the Spring Place mission.

page 23--Margaret Hicks nee Ross B 7-5-1803 M D - - 62

Mollie Ross nee McDonald 11-1-1770

page 27--Lewis Rogers born at Grand Saline 11-14-40 married Josephine Landrum & Helen Ross

page 29--Nancy Ghigau a full blood Cherokee of the Wolf Clan born in 1695
married Kingfisher & John Ward died in Spring of 1824 at Womankiller Ford of Ocowee River in east Tenn. buried near. [NOTE:
Nancy Ward is believed to have been born ca 1738 and died in the
Spring of 1822. She married Bryan Ward. John Ward was Bryan
Ward's son by a prior marriage, with whom Nancy Ward had business
dealings, and who came to Cherokee Country in 1765 where he
married Catherine McDaniel, a 1/2 blood Cherokee. John and
Catherine McDaniel Ward are the ancestors of the Ward family
among the Cherokees. MER]

#### WEBBERS FALLS

#### By Sheri Siebold

Webbers Falls, part of the Cherokee Nation, but in Muskogee County today, was named after Walter Webber, who settled in the region in the early 1830's. Prior to that date, the Indians ascending the Arkansas River always camped near the foot of the falls and their favorite place was the site of the present town. Later the steamboats navigating the Arkansas found the business good.

The Post Office was established on July 15, 1856, with John McDaniel as postmaster.

Nearly every farm and business was burned during the Civil War, but by 1867 the people began to return and rebuild the old site. New people came in with visions of conducting trading posts.

The correspondant from Webbers Falls wrote this description of the 1892 Webbers Falls:

Webbers Falls is one of the oldest, if not the oldest town in the Cherokee Nation. Like some fashionable ladies, however, it's age is effectually concealed by a liberal use of paint and keeping generally in good repair. It is located on the south side of the Arkansas River, 50 miles from Ft. Smith by wagon road. Our railroad station is Illinois, on the opposite side of the Arkansas, on the K.& A.V. R.R. A hack line is ran from Webbers Falls to connect with the trains.

Our town is surrounded by rich bottom lands, caused by the confluence of the Durdeen and Canadian streams with the Arkansas River. They produce annually a bale of cotton, or 50 to 70 bushels of corn to an acre.

We have in our town seven substantial business houses, carrying good stocks of general merchandise; two drug stores, four physicians; one hotel; three blacksmiths & one wood shop; four carpenters, two house painters; one picture gallery; a brass band; two notaries; one lawyer; a Cherokee circuit & district court, & a U.S. Commission court for civil business. We have two good churches, a Masonic Hall and three church organizations. There are two good schools in operation.

Our people are clever and sociable, with the handsomest women and children and the ugliest men to be found anywhere in the B.I.T.

This is not all, we have 2 or 3 mud holes in our roads near town that reaches nearly to China... "B"

By 1894, on the prairies south of the Durdeen, several veins of coal were located and stripped. The population of Webbers Falls was around 1,000 citizens.

Webbers Falls shared more than just the railroad & the river with Gore (Illinois side, Illinois Station, Campbell), it also shared the cemetery. Many of it's citizens had relatives who lived across the river, as well, which bonded the two early towns. The other cemetery the W.F.'s citizens used, on their side of the Arkansas, is the Vaught Cemetery, situated on higher land.

Some of the streets in Webbers Falls are named after prominent families: LYNCH, HAYS, RAYMOND, McCORKLE, BLACKSTONE, and McDANIEL. Gore also has a HAYES St.

From gathering data out of the Muskogee Weekly Phoenix we have the name of some of the merchants: two cotton gins, owned by J.W. HAYES; T.J. LACY, boot & shoemaker; J. McDANIEL, livery & feedstable; J.A. HUTCHINS, blacksmith shop; Jeff MAPLES, barbershop; Charlie VANN, clerk at the Cherokee Court; P.J. SCALES, mercantile; McDANIEL, hotelkeeper; Drs. W.H. HARRISON & J.L CHAPPEL; Wm. VANN, District Sheriff (1891-1893).

#### Amusing Anecdotes of the Dawes Commission

Major McKENNON of the Dawes Comm., tells of many amusing anecdotes of application for Indian citizenship in the various nations. One man appeared for Cherokee citizenship on the grounds that he was a descendant of Pocahontas. Another man said his wife looked like an Indian, acted like an Indian and in his opinion was an Indian and he wanted to be put on the rolls in consequence. He wasn't particular as to the nation, but merely wanted citizenship. Still another had been engaged to a Cherokee girl and had planted a peach orchard on the strength of the engagement. The girl had jilted him and he wanted citizenship to soothe his lacerated feelings. All these and many more like them are of actual occurrence and the applications were really filed in good faith. A drummer claims to have met a bedbug in Vinita which declared it was on its way to Wagoner to Jeff WATES about proving up it's rights. The bedbug, says the drummer, had spent the night previous in bed with a Cherokee and was of the opinion it had Indian blood in it. We can't vouch for the truth of this story but maybe Mr. Watts can. - Indian Journal, submitted in the Muskogee Weekly Phoenix, Oct. 1, 1896.

#### Interesting Death

Pin HARJO, Indian living a few miles from town (Holdenville) died recently from continued hiccoughing...several days continuously. Medical attention was called, but members of the family pinned their faith in the "Alabama Prophet", an old blind Indian who came west with the Creeks from Alabama, and who is reputed to perform almost miracles...Pin Harjo died.
