TERMINUS TOWNS

The real opening of Indian Territory came with the all important "laying of tracks" by the M.K.& T. Railroad. The towns that sprang up over night were called Terminus towns, some short-lived, while others became the cities of today.

The riff-raff that followed these frontier outlets, such as at Gibson Station (not to be confused with Ft. Gibson), coupled with delays in track laying by an Irish brigade, caused no little trouble. Large gambling tents fourished, while prostitution and killings mushroomed in the lawless territory.

Katy traffic manager, H.D. Merrick, was greatly concerned over the "hordes of parasites" in the form of drunkards, robbers, terminus men and gamblers who collected at the end-of-the-track, and as things grew worse, Merrick urgently requested help from the War Department:

There is an intense animosity among the Cherokees and Creeks, existing and demonstrating itself in various forms, between the full-bloods and the half-breeds. Naturally at the end of our Road there congregates a large number of white people -- some well disposed, and others not so well disposed. There being no force to preserve order between the Indians and the white men, it leads to collisions constantly. Ft. Gibson at night is dangerous, and halfbreeds and whites are drinking, gambling and shooting all night long. Women of bad character are also in full force.

After the railroad bridge was completed over the Arkansas River in December of 1871, the muddy bottom-land slowly rose and leveled out, enabling the track laying to quickly progress.

Col. R.S. Stevens, agent and attorney in charge of purchasing the track road, wrote the vice president of the Katy R.R.:

I send you herewith tracing showing the line of our road from the Arkansas River down a little over three miles to a point where I propose to establish a station to be called *Mus-ko-gee*. It will be the end of an operating² division first below Parsons [Kan.], being 113 miles or thereabouts.

Locating Engineer F.O. Marvin, wrote:

I myself located Muskogee. One afternoon about four o'clock I picked out a place for a new siding and drove stakes marking the railway's

reservation for depot and wagon ground adjacent.

The town literally sprung up in a night. In the case of Muskogee, the first morning after I drove my stakes, there were several tents and board shacks up and ready for business. Before breakfast, one man was dead and the murderer was being chased over the prairies by a lot of men. So Muskogee was born in blood.

R.P. Vann, grandson of the famous Cherokee, Joe Vann, was in Muskogee when the first train went through:

It was a construction train and no station had yet been built. In front of where the station now is there was a little shack between the tracks in which the people waited. In this shack was a little eating place. I was working for Tom Hutton as a cowboy. There were lots of people in Muskogee that day. Mr. Strokey, a big old fat Dutchman kept a little restaurant just across from where the station is now. The cowboys always stayed at Strokey's place as they did not like to go to Mitchell's hotel because Mitchell did not like to have them go to bed with their boots on. Strokey was not so particular and there they could get drunk and sleep with their boots on. I never did though as I never drank. Muskogee was a very rough town then. I have seen a great many fights there and killings were very frequent.

Muskogee's first citizens were the same "terminuses" who had infested Gibson Station and Ft. Davis, although some of the legitimate suppliers for the railroad workmen along the railhead came to settle in Muskogee such as J.S. Atkinson and James L. Barnes.

Edward King, a Scribner's Magazine reporter, reported what a "little hell" Muskogee was and how dangerous it was to even walk through the canvas town without getting shot at. Mr. King mentioned the boot-hill cemetery where eleven men were buried with their boots on.

The reason Muskogee didn't dry up and blow away like some of the other Terminus towns, was due to the government ordering the consolidation of the Five Civilized Tribes, to be known as Union Agency, which located itself at Muskogee in January of 1876.

LAWSON

C. M. and Sarah M. (Sims) Lawson

C. M. LAWSON - b. 1810-1820, probably in Wayne Co., TN; d. Jun. 1848 to Jun. 1850, probably in Itawamba Co., MS. Very little is currently known of C. M. LAWSON, not even his given name. Dates, locations, given names of children, and other evidence strongly suggest he was the brother of Amos B. LAWSON of Itawamba Co., MS, son of Mordecai and Frances (STEPHENS) LAWSON of Itawamba Co., MS, nephew of Amos, Thomas and John LAWSON, and grandson of Thomas LAWSON, Sr. of Wayne Co., TN. There is a strong family resemblance seen in photos of C. M.'s grandson James Martin LAWSON and his supposed great uncle Amos B. LAWSON. The Pariss Henry Sims Family history, by Almon J. Sims (1948:Knoxville), gives the family bible record of Robert and Frances Howard (MERRITT) SIMS, including the marriage of their daughter Sarah M. SIMS to C. M. LAWSON, and states, "They had 4 children. One died in infancy, the others Mordicia <sic>, Amos and Martin <sic> Jane Lawson lived and died at Muskogee, Oklahoma." C. M. LAWSON and Sarah M. SIMS were married Mar. 21, 1839 in Wayne Co., TN. The only Census record of C. M. LAWSON is the 1840 census of Wayne Co., when he and his wife were in the 20-30 age bracket and had one son under age 5. The next record found that names him is dated Jun. 7, 1847 in Itawamba Co., MS: C.M. LAWSON signed a deed of trust, together with Mordica <sic> LAWSON and wife Francis <sic>, William C. CYPERT, Elijah B. HARBOUR, and others. Those named here are all found in the 1840 Census of Wayne Co., TN. The land described in the deed (S24 T10S R8E Pontotoc Meridian), sold by Mordecai LAWSON to E.B. HARBOUR, was located about 5 miles SSW of Fulton, just west of the Tombigbee River, near Van Buren. On Jun. 5, 1848 at the post office at Van Buren, Itawamba Co., MS, C.M. LAWSON, Mordecai LAWSON, and others signed a statement that one William R. BRUNDINE was an idiot. Land (1n S3 T11S R8E), known as "the Lawson Place", is located about 4 miles SSW of Van Buren, a village organized in the 1830s and no longer existing by 1860. It is concluded that C. M. LAWSON died between Jun. 5, 1848 and the Jun. 1850 census of Wayne Co., TN, since his wife (widow) is listed as the head of the household composed of his three surviving children.

Sarah M. 'Sallye' SIMS - b. Jan. 9, 1814, Stokes Co., NC; d. Apr. 27, 1885, Creek Nation, Indian Territory; bur. Greenhill Cemetery, Muskogee, OK. Sarah was the daughter of Robert and Frances Howard (MERRITT) SIMS, and granddaughter of Pariss Henry SIMS, a soldier of the Revolution in NC (NSSAR National Number 127981). Her middle name is reported as Merritt, although the family bible records Martin. The 1850 Census of Wayne Co., TN lists Sarah M. LAWSON as head of household, and age 35. She is listed as Sarah LAWSON in 1860 and 1870 censuses of Wayne Co., TN. In the 1880 Census of "Suburbs of Bells," Grayson Co., TX, she is found in household of A.M. LAWSON as his mother, together with her daughter Martha Jane, and living next door to her son Mordecai's family. By 1882 Sarah moved with her children to Siloam Springs, Benton Co., AR, and in late 1884 or early 1885, to Muskogee, Creek Nation, Indian Territory. Sarah was buried in the old cemetery at Muskogee, and about 1890, her remains and those of about 30 others were removed to the new cemetery, known as City or Greenhill Cemetery. Though broken, repaired, and again broken, her grave stone is still readable: Sarah Lawson - wife of C.M. Lawson - 71 yrs. (3) mo. 18 days - d. April 27, 1885.

C. M. and Sarah M. LAWSON had four children: 1) A son was born about 1840 and died in infancy. 2) Mordecai S. LAWSON was born in 1841 in Itawamba Co., MS. 3) Martha Jane LAWSON was born in 1844 in Itawamba Co., MS. 4) Amos M. LAWSON was born in 1846 in Itawamba Co., MS.

Mordecai S. and Elizabeth Caroline (Turman) Lawson

Mordecai S. LAWSON - b. 1841, Itawamba Co., MS; d. Jun. 23, 1895 (3 p.m.), Muskogee, OK; bur. Jun. 24, 1895, Greenhill Cemetery, Muskogee, OK. Mordecai served in Union Army during the Civil War as 1st Sgt., Co. F, 6th Reg't., Tenn. Cavalry Volunteers. His pension file [WC432868, National Archives] contains documents providing his and his wife's signatures, and extensive personal and family information. Also included is his personal description as 5' 11" tall, with dark complexion, dark hair, and blue eyes. Mordecai entered the service on Sep. 21, 1862 from Wayne Co., TN, and was discharged Jul. 26, 1865 at Pulaski, TN. His application for pension states he was disabled due to "disease of lungs," suffered from dyspepsia, heart burn, measles complications, "diarrhorea", and was hospitalized several months at Bolivar and Memphis, TN while in the service. Affidavits were prepared supporting his claim by Company Captain David I. DICKINSON, and Company Clerk Robert M. Alexander. The latter stated that Mordecai's illness was due to "exposure from army servis and the unwoisom quality of army dyett." His pension application was apparently never approved, but his widow did receive a pension based on his service.

After the war, Mordecai married Elizabeth Caroline TURMAN on Sep. 26, 1867 in Waynesboro, Wayne Co., TN, at the

home of her father. They subsequently lived at Martin Mills, Wayne Co., TN, Bells, Grayson Co., TX, Siloam Springs, Benton Co., AR, and Muscogee, Creek Nation, Indian Territory. The following items are from the Muscogee Weekly Phoenix: Jun. 26, 1890 notice - "M. S. Lawson appointed to arrange for the meat and B.B.Q. for the Fourth of July Picnic at the Frozen Rock Community." Sep. 6, 1894 ad - "Go to M.S. LAWSON & Co. for fresh groceries. Price their goods and see how cheap they are selling." Other ads on the same date say that it was a new grocery on the east side of town. On Sep. 26, 1890, Mordecai became affiliated with the Muscogee Masonic Lodge No. 28. His name is listed in the 1897 Proceedings (page 219) of the OK I.O.O.F. as having died in 1895, being until death a member of Muscogee Lodge No. 25. Mordecai married on Sep. 26, 1867, in Waynesboro, Wayne Co., TN, at home of John C. TURMAN, father of the bride.

Elizabeth Caroline TURMAN - b. Jan. 8, 1846, Bedford Co., TN; d. Oct. 26, 1914, Tecumseh, Pottawatomie Co., OK. She was the daughter of John C. TURMAN and Mary A. NEELY, and was known as 'Carrie', thus signing pension application. After the death of her husband, Carrie moved with her children to Tecumseh, OK by Apr. 1896, and was still there at the time of the 1900 census. The LAWSONS moved to Tucumcari, NM about 1903, where Carrie joined the Tucumcari Baptist Church by 1906. She was still in Tucumcari in Mar. 1909, but returned to Tecumseh by Oct. 1914. Her last pension payment before her death was \$12 paid on Aug. 4, 1914.

Children of Mordecai S. and Elizabeth Caroline (Turman) Lawson

James Martin - b. Jul. 2, 1868, Waynesboro, Wayne Co., TN; d. Apr. 10, 1898, Patton, San Bernardino Co., CA; bur. Lake View Cemetery, Seattle, King Co., WA. On Oct. 22, 1895, at Muscogee, IT, James was married to Mrs. Lucy Jane (FREEMAN) GRAY, by Rev. W. A. Freeman, Methodist minister of Hamburk, AR (no known relation). Lucy was the daughter of Cyrus Scott and Malinda Margaret (SEARS) FREEMAN of Nevada, Vernon Co., MO, and Muscogee, OK. She had previously been married to James T. GRAY of Parsons, KS, and they had a son Clyde Fentless, known throughout his life as Clyde Fentless LAWSON. The GRAYs were divorced Dec. 6, 1893. A notice in the Nov. 10, 1894 issue of the Muscogee Weekly Phoenix reports, "Mrs. Lucy Gray is a saleslady at the Rackett Store." After their marriage, James and Lucy LAWSON moved to Tecumseh, OK, and by 1903 to Tucumcari, NM. There, James began his trade as a builder and mason, and Lucy operated a millinery shop. He was baptized at the Tucumcari Baptist Church on Jan. 4, 1904, and dismissed on Jan. 24, 1909 to the First Baptist Church of Seattle, WA, where the family moved in 1908. The LAWSONS returned to Muscogee, OK in 1916, and lived there for five years. They were back in Seattle in 1922, and James and Lucy separated in 1923, when she remained in Seattle while he moved to Los Angeles, CA to re-establish his trade as a mason. Child of Lucy and James GRAY: Clyde Fentless LAWSON. Children of James and Lucy LAWSON: James Cyrus married first Phyllis, second Virginia, and third Betty DILLON; Carrie Malinda died in infancy; Monagene married first and fourth Lawrence ROYCE, married second Walter REEVES, married third Bert WILLIAMS; George Oliver married first Bonnie NICHOLS, second Grace Lillian WASSER; Eugene died in infancy; Thomas Wendell married first Adeline BUCKNER, second Pat PATRICK; Charles Freeman did not marry; Donald Van Hoosier married Iva Melvina FREEMAN; and Ruth Marian married Thomas J. KURACK.

John M. - b. Aug. 7, 1871, TN; d. Dec. 26, 1906, Tucumcari, NM. John was in Tecumseh, OK at the time of the 1900 census, single, living in a boarding house, and employed as a town marshal (occupation difficult to read). John became Marshal of Tucumcari in 1906, and was killed by the candidate he defeated, as reported in the Tucumcari News, Dec. 29, 1906. Mortuary records indicate he was buried on Dec. 27, 1906 in a 5' 9" casket, the expenses of \$70 paid for by brother James on Jan. 14, 1907. J. M. LAWSON is listed in the 1907 Proceedings (page 771) of the OK I.O.O.F. as having died in 1906, being until death a member of Tecumseh Lodge No. 24. A niece reports his wife's name as Velma (married about 1900). Velma LAWSON joined the Tucumcari Baptist Church by letter on Sep. 30, 1906. Children: 'one baby and the other five years old', December, 1906. The 1912 Muscogee City Directory lists Mrs. Velma LAWSON, saleslady at Patterson Mercantile Company, as rooming at 18 W S S Boulevard.

Willie Josephene - b. Oct. 31, 1874, TN. Willie remained a dependent daughter of her mother, apparently caused by an early childhood injury. The 1900 census reports she could not read, write or speak English. She may be the third LAWSON sister in the photograph taken about 1905 in Tucumcari, NM - based on internal evidence. Perhaps she was the W. LAWSON, age 43 (sic), who died of TB at Tucumcari, NM on Dec. 15, 1915, and was buried the same day.

Sarah Ione - b. Oct. 1876, TN. Sarah perhaps married Harry HODGES, as one family source indicates that a sister of James Martin married him.

Martha T. 'Mattie' - b. Dec. 1878, Grayson Co., TX. Reportedly, she married a Mr. WILCOX, and had four

daughters.

Lola B. - b. Jan. 22, 1880, Grayson Co., TX. Since Lola does not appear in 1880 Census, her birth year may be 1881, instead of 1880. She was photographed in Tucumcari, NM, about 1905. Lola married Louis HARKEY.

Oliver D. 'Ollie' - b. Mar. 23, 1882, AR; d. Dec. 30, 1965. Ollie was photographed in Tucumcari, NM, about 1905, and was still there in Mar. 1909. He married Gertrude. One family source indicates Ollie moved to Sacramento, CA, and became successful, Lawson Boulevard there being named for him.

Mary Adelle 'Della' - b. Aug. 27, 1884, Siloam Springs, Benton Co., AR; d. 1965, Glendale, CA. Della was baptized Dec. 8, 1909 at Tucumcari Baptist Church. She was photographed in Tucumcari, NM, about 1905. Adel, single and living at Tecumseh, OK, was the informant for the information on the death certificate of her mother. Married Oct.-Dec. 1914 Tracey Benjamin JOHNSON (b. 1881, Sweden; d. about 1966, Oklahoma City, OK). The JOHNSONS lived for a time at Bombarton, TX. Children: Leonard Doyell married Evelyn Frances TOWER; Tracy Wanda Wanette married first Sidney Paul BRAMLETT, and second Lewis Wayne MARTIN; Mona Adelle married first Andrew W. DOYEL, and second Rocca DELURGIO; and Mary Lois married first John Jacup TOWER, and second Thomas Wilvur BRYANT.

Martha Jane Lawson

Martha Jane LAWSON - b. 1844, Itawamba Co., MS; lived in Muskogee, OK. Martha did not marry. She is found in the Census records for 1850, 1860 and 1880 living in the same household as her mother. Since her death date is not known, she may have been the M.J. LAWSON who joined the Tucumcari, NM Baptist Church May 27, 1906. The Muskogee, OK City Directories lists a Miss Matie LAWSON boarding at 1019 W Broadway in 1916, Miss Mattie LAWSON at 321 N 13th in 1917, and at 225 S. 12th in 1922 - possibly Martha Jane.

Amos M. and Margaret C. (Sisk) Lawson

Amos M. LAWSON - b. 1846, Itawamba Co., MS; d. Jan. 9, 1891, Muskogee, OK. Occupation 1880: making shoes. Amos was married Nov. 10, 1865 in Wayne Co., TN, to Margaret C. SISK (b. Mar. 1847, TN) by A.P. PHILIPS, J.P. The 1880 Census of the suburbs of Bells, Grayson Co., TX enumerates the A. M. LAWSON family, including his sister and mother, living next door to his brother Mordecai. Amos' death date is from his obituary in the Muskogee, OK Weekly Phoenix, Jan. 15, 1891.

Known children of Amos and Margaret (1900 Census: 6 children, 2 living):

Joseph M. - b. Feb. 1873, TN. Joseph married about 1895 Hattie 'Tennie' D--E (b. May 1877, TN). The 1900 Census of Muskogee, IT shows that his mother Margaret, brother Fred, and sister-in-law Nora B. D--E (b. Apr. 1884, TN), were living with him. Occupation: Cab Driver. Joseph and Tennie are found in the 1903 Muskogee City Directory at 119 Spaulding Avenue, his mother and brother boarding with them. Children: William M. and Joseph.

John R. - b. 1876, TN; d. by 1900, perhaps by 1891.

Samuel W. - b. 1879, TX; d. by 1900, perhaps by 1891.

Fred - b. Apr. 1884, Indian Territory. Fred was living with brother Joseph in 1900 and in 1903. Occupation: Day Laborer 1900, salesman 1903.

FREEMAN

Cyrus Scott and Malinda Margrett (Sears) Freeman

Cyrus Scott FREEMAN - b. Feb. 23, 1848, Pike Co., IL; d. Mar. 21, 1920, Muskogee, Muskogee Co., OK; bur. there. Scott, as he is known in most later records, was born to James Howell and Lucy Jane (HAZELRIGB) FREEMAN. A record of his marriage has not been found, but it probably occurred in late 1870 or early 1871, in Pike Co., IL. Scott and Malinda were living at Nevada, Vernon Co., MO by 1872 with daughter Lucy Jane, where Scott worked as a carpenter. A notice in the Nevada Daily Mail, Jul. 14, 1897 indicates the family left there to live at Neosho, Newton Co., MO, having rented a hotel there. By the time of the 1900 Census of Muskogee, Indian Territory, they had moved there, being enumerated as the household of Scott C. Freeman, Commercial Traveler, wife Malinda M., and children Anna, Leland, Pansy, Ollie, Nellie, and Melvin. Perhaps the Scott and Malinda moved to CA for a short term around 1908, as is suggested in a postcard written by their daughter (see below). In various locations, he is known as Cyrus S., S. Cyrus, Scott C., S. C., and Silas FREEMAN.

Malinda Margaret SEARS - b. Dec. 13, 1853, La Plata, Macon Co., MO; d. Jan. 31, 1948, Chouteau, Mayes Co., OK; bur. Feb. 4, 1948, Muskogee, Muskogee Co., OK. Her birth date is given as noted on her death certificate, but the 1900 Census indicates she was born in Oct. 1852. The same Census states she was the mother of 10 children, 8 then living - probably this should have been 10 living children, 2 deceased. She was living in Chouteau on Dec. 13, 1937, ('84 years old') with son Richard. Malinda was the daughter of Chesly and Elizabeth C. (McCLANAHAN) SEARS, who were married in Macon Co., MO, and celebrated their golden anniversary at Nevada, Vernon Co., MO on Sep. 12, 1898.

Children of Cyrus Scott and Malinda Margaret Freeman

Lucy Jane - b. Sep. 12, 1871, Eldara, Pike Co., IL; d. May 13, 1951, Seattle, WA; buried there in Lake View Cemetery. A notice in the Nov. 10, 1894 issue of the Muskogee, OK Weekly Phoenix reports, "Mrs. Lucy Gray is a saleslady at The Rackett Store." For her children of her second marriage refer to the Lawson line. Lucy married first Apr. 10, 1890, Nevada, Vernon Co., MO, James T. GRAY, at the home of her parents. They were divorced Dec. 6, 1893, Nevada, Vernon Co., MO. Lucy married second Oct. 22, 1895, James Martin LAWSON. James T. GRAY lived at Parsons, Labette Co., KS before and after marriage. A family source reports he was a railroad worker, and was divorced after a violent argument. The Nevada Daily Mail of Aug. 14, 1893 gives the following (abstracted) information regarding the divorce: "James T. Gray vs Lucy Gray - before marriage was Miss Lucy Freeman, she is now living with her father, Silas Freeman at Muskogee, Indian Territory. Petition alleges desertion: they were married in 1890 and in Nov. 1891, while husband was away from home, she sent word for him not to come home. When he did return, she refused to let him see their child and refused to live with him." The uncontested divorce was granted to James T. GRAY on the grounds of desertion. James and Lucy GRAY had one child, Clyde Fentless, known throughout his life as Clyde Fentless LAWSON.

Elizabeth 'Lizzie' Belle - b. 1873, MO; d. about 1908. Lizzie married Benjamin B. MARSHALL, and they were living at Clarkesville, IT in May 1897. Their daughter Miss Ruth MARSHALL, a student, was living at the home of Benjamin and his second wife in 1916 (Muskogee City Directory). Children: Beauregard married; George; Ruth; Elizabeth married Mr. HOLSEY; Gertrude; Benjamin, Jr. married; and Haskell. After the death of Lizzie, Benjamin married her sister Anna.

A child - prob. born about 1875, MO; d. by 1880 Census.

Charles A. - b. 1876, MO. The Polk's Business Directory of 1901-2 for Muskogee, OK, lists the Roessler-Freeman Shoe Co., Julius ROESSLER, president, and Charles A. FREEMAN, treasurer. The 1903 Muskogee City Directory lists him as: Chas (w/ Augusta B), mgr Roessler-Freeman Shoe Co, res 509 W Court. The only other Freemans in the 1903 directory are his parents, sister Anna, and brother Leland.

Anna May - b. Sep. 1878, MO. Anna is listed in the 1903 Muskogee City Directory as a saleslady at W. H. Woodward, residing with her parents. She is listed in the 1916 Muskogee City Directory as wife of Benjamin B. MARSHALL, oil leases, residing at 516 North E. Refer to sister Lizzie for children of Benjamin MARSHALL. Anna married Oct. 21, 1908, Benjamin B. MARSHALL after death of Lizzie.

Richard - b. about 1880, MO. Dick married Sally, and they lived at Chateau, OK. He was living in OK in May 1951. He was the informant for the information on the Death Certificates of both parents.

A child - prob. born about 1883, MO; d. by 1900 Census. Possibly Orville (family sources).

Leland C. - b. Jan. 1885, MO. Leland is listed in 1900 Census as a Grocery Salesman, and in in the 1903 Muskogee City Directory as cashier at Knight's, boarding at 515 Callahan, the home of his parents.

Pansy - b. Feb. 1887, MO.

Ollie - b. Jun. 1890, MO. The 1916 Muskogee City Directory lists: Schindleman, Max (Ollie) clk Kirschner's, rms 605 E Broadway (home of Ollie's parents). Ollie married Max SCHINDLEMAN. Children: Bill, Jack, Nell.

Nellie - b. Jun. 1893, Indian Territory.

Melvin C. - b. Mar. 1895, Indian Territory. Melvin is listed in the Muskogee, OK City Directories of 1916 through 1918 as unmarried, and residing at 605 E Broadway, the home of his parents. He is listed in the 1936 Directory as unmarried, a pharmacist, residing at 221 1/2 N 2nd, and was still living in OK in May 1951.

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MORE "Family " Books

Postcard invitations to purchase a limited edition book about YOUR family genealogy have been circulating throughout the country. The approach is similar to the Beatrice Bayley and Sharon Taylor offers of past years, each presentation signed by a female name and mailed from a different area in Pennsylvania.

Reports of the following are known: from Elizabeth Ross in Scranton, The (NAME) Album; Mary Whitney's (NAME) Across America; Vicki Lee Karr and Anne Louise Baker, both of Lansdale, advertise The (NAME) Family Genealogy. The books sell for about \$29.95 and are said to represent names that were found in records that represent more than 200 million persons.

In this regard, the Sept. 25, 1985 Postal Bulletin has the following listing under " DOMESTIC ORDERS..... False Representation. Enforced by Postmasters at cities listed:

"PA, Sterling 18463-0055...Beatrice Bayley, In c., Post Office Box 55... The sale of family heritage books."

The controversial Bayley operation dates back several years, but through consumers' complaints and the investigations of them, plus at least one court case. The U.S. Postal Service has taken the above action.

JOBE'S PLACE
Interview with Nero Nevins - Cherokee Freedman

When peace was declared after the Civil War, a man by the name of JOBE started a trading post about forty-two (42) miles east of Okmulgee, and mail was carried on horseback between the two points. At Jobe's place the store and post office was run by Jim PARKINSON. Later another station was put in at Wellington, just half way between Jobe's place and Okmulgee, and four (4) miles west of Lee post office. When the railroad was built, the store at Wellington was moved to the Lee post office, which is now known as Boynton.

Jobe had plenty of money, hogs and cattle, and his place, which was a good sized settlement, was equipped with the things that Indians would buy, such as Indian shawls, moccasins, riddles, fanners, big wooden spoons used in making sofke; groceries and calico. When the M.K.&T. Railroad came through west of Jobe's place, a man by the name of "DRESBACK" bought Jobe's stock of goods and moved it to Muskogee, but left the buildings. At the time of the Cherokee payment there were to be seen a few old hewed log houses and chimneys still standing.

Indians trading at Jobe's place forded the Arkansas river at the Leecher and the Nevins Ferries, and at one other rock crossing between the Leecher and the Nevins ferries.

NOTE: Jobe's trading post was between Bacone Indian College and the Arkansas river or between old Fort Davis which mounted the ancient Indian Lookout Mound and the Arkansas river - Thomas F. Meagher, Supervisor

The Jobe and Sells families came to Indian Territory with the Creeks in 1825 settling first on the east side of the Arkansas River until a survey revealed that they were residing on Cherokee land; prompting them to move to the west side of the river onto Creek Nation land. The 1860 Census shows Leroy JOB and John SELLS in the same area. From T.F. Meagher's map of Three Forks: "Louis Job, Creek, Job's Store, 1870-72.

Milly Francis (the Creek Pocahontas) - On T.F. Meagher's Map of Three Forks shows Milly Frances at the settlement of Muscogee, dated 1843. She died May 1848. Said also to be buried at the Bacone College cemetery, but more likely the Jobe land since she lived close to it. The Jobe sisters also said they have always heard that Milly Frances was buried on Jobe land.

Other Notes on the Jobe Family

Mary & Gertrude Jobe attended the Nazareth Institute (Catholic school) in 1903. Their father, Louis, attended Asbury Mission at old North Fork Town/ The 1907 Directory shows that Eliz. MURPHY and Eliz. M. JOBE both owned unplatted lands inside corporate limits.

?? OWNING LAND IN INDIAN TERRITORY ??

When a white man who was not a citizen of the tribe wanted to build a home or erect a business house, he simply rented or bought the right of possession to a lot from the Indian who was in possession of it. If a white man desired to sell or trade his home or store building, he could not execute a deed to his lot, but could only execute a bill of sale for his improvements, which carried with it the right to occupy the lot upon which the improvements were located.

Visitors and prospectors from the states, accustomed to warranty deeds and abstracts of title were puzzled at this condition of affairs and were naturally slow to invest their money, either in buildings or lots. Old timers, however, who had invested their fortunes here, seemed to have implicit confidence in the Government and the tribe, hoping that at some time, in some manner they would be able to secure complete title to the lots which they had improved and their confidence was not misplaced.

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A Recent Reunion

The Adairs of eastern Oklahoma will unite with many other Adairs, friends and related families (the Bigbys, Sanders, Starrs, Mayes, Riders, and others), for a day of reunion Aug. 3. The site for the gathering will be at Pine Creek Cove on Lake Tenkiller, south of Tahlequah, where in a cool building memorabilia and a potluck meal will be shared, as well as other activities. Prizes will be awarded and other recognition, such as for the elderly attending and distance traveled.

The Adair name originated from the village of Adare in Ireland and family ties were later established in Scotland. Thomas Adair and sons James, Joseph and William immigrated to America from Ireland in 1730, and traveled from Pennsylvania to the eastern Cherokee Nation, where they built a large trading business with the Cherokee and Chicksaw nations.

They settled on Duncan's Creek, the Wateree and Catawba Rivers in the Carolinas. James Adair (Dr. Robert James Adair) later wrote the book, "History of the American Indians," published in England in 1775. Another book, Dr. Emmett Starr's "History of the Cherokees," notes two Adair brothers, John and Edward, traders in the Cherokee Nation in the late 1700s and early 1800s, who both had Cherokee wives.

Their children were numerous, and began a long line of descendants. John Adair's will, recorded in Pendleton District of South Carolina in November 1815, indicated his intention, after a portion to be sold to settle debts, to leave various land areas, household items and other belongings to each member of his family.

In Georgia, the town of Adairsville was named for members of these families, and in Oklahoma the town of Adair and Adair County, as well as other locations. Several descendants of the Adair brothers married descendants of Nanyehi (Nancy Ward), an early Cherokee woman of tribal influence and leadership. Many of their descendants live in Oklahoma within the present area of the Cherokee Nation, and a number are in other states.

Turning Curiosity Into Facts

Researching is really fun! A few years back while tripping around Ft. Gibson, I noticed an old hotel, which was empty, alongside the once bustling railroad tracks in town. Out of curiosity, we asked the neighbors about the old place and graciously, they informed us that it had been a hotel, but was the residence of an elderly lady, who was in a Tulsa nursing home. Dropping the matter there, I never went through Ft. Gibson without thinking about that hotel. It sat there year-after-year, through all kinds of weather, with the paint slowly fading off of the boards exposing the lettering, "Trent Hotel".

Once again my curiosity was aroused and I decided to investigate, genealogically speaking, the Trent Family.

In a pamphlet titled "Historic Ft. Gibson", prepared by the Ft. Gibson Historical Preservation and Landmark Commission, it mentions that the "hotel was built about 1888 soon after the Iron Mountain Railroad was built into Ft. Gibson to accomodate travelers using the railroad, and was built by Dr. R.O. TRENT, a physician residing at Ft. Gibson at the time."

The Federal Census always turns names into people for me, so in checking the 1900 Indian Territory Census I found the following:

In checking the Ft. Gibson Cemeteries, I found: Dr. Richard TRENT, 1854-1888, Section E of the Civilian Cemetery. Apparently the good doctor died the same year that the hotel was built.

From the census we know Dr. Richard Trent was born in Georgia, as all of his children said their father was born in Georgia, as well as naming his first born daughter, Georgia. Mollie, his wife, was born in Indian Territory, as well as her father, but her mother was born in Georgia.

More research could be done, but even with this information I feel closer to that old hotel, knowing the people who built it and lived in it a little better.

Today the hotel has been repainted and folks are, once again, living in those rooms. I wonder if they know that Senator M.C. Butler, of South Carolina and his nephew, Hon. S.M. Rutherford, U.S. Marshall for the Northern District were visitors to the Trent Hotel in 1896? And how many other notable and not-so notable people spent their nights there while visiting historic Fort Gibson?? Only more research might tell!!

3. Lane City to Garnett, Kan., owned by Geo. WASSON and driven by John HANWAY and Geo. LIEBER.
4. Lane City, through Osawatomie, Kan. to Paola, Kan. driven by DUBY, an Irishman, and Geo. BAKER. Mr. Baker's grandsons live in Dawson, Oklahoma.

The National Cemetery is located here. The name of Fort Gibson is very familiar, having been headquarters for a military reservation years ago; the barracks and some of the old buildings are standing there today. Grand River nearby affords unlimited water power; a rich agricultural country surrounds the town; has a good public school; Methodist, Presbyterian and Baptist churches, and a bank. A weekly newspaper, The Post, is issued. Ships cotton, hay, corn and potatoes.. Mail, daily. Stage to Muskogee twice a day; fare, 75 cents; to Tahlequah, once a day; fare \$2.50 round trip. Tel., W.U. Exp., Pacific. Hubbard Ross, postmaster.
