CIVIL WAR VETERAN IS AWARDED CANE AS OLDEST MAN IN COUNTY Muskogee Daily Phoenix, Sunday December 10, 1933

To James L. MITCHELL, 91 years old, of 706 South 22nd street, one of the few surviving members of that army of gray who battled in the war between the states, goes the gold-headed Muskogee Daily Phoenix cane for being the oldest man in Muskogee County.

Mitchell is the fifth man to receive the cane. The practice of officially recognizing Muskogee county's oldest, started in 1923 when John Wesley DRUMMOND was awarded the cane when he established his age as the highest. Later in the year it was given to James FREEMAN. In 1928 it was awarded to James MOATS, and three years later to J.R. SMITH.

Peculiarly enough Mitchell is the third "James" to hold the cane and so far every holder has had a given name beginning with "J".

Mitchell has been a resident of the "Indian country" several times during his life. Born in Camden county, Missouri, near Linn creek, on October 26, 1842, he came here with his missionary father to a point near what is now Eufaula. This was in 1849, as Mitchell recalls, the covered wagons passing through the community, bound for the California gold fields. His father was of the South Methodist faith.

Schools were few in this section and 1854 or thereabouts, when Mitchell was 12, he was sent to Van Buren, Ark., to school. Later the family returned to Missouri.

When the Civil war broke out, Mitchell was of the age just ripe for enlist ment. He favored the southern cause and marched away in gray for four years of war.

He was in the battle of Wilson's creek, fought southwest of Springfield in 1861, but says because of a shortage of arms he took no active part in the engagement. The thrills of war were reserved for him further north.

After this battle, in which the Confederates were victorious, Mitchell's company was moved into Tennessee and faced the union forces of the west. At Baker's creek, a battle prior to the Confederates falling back upon Vicksburg, Mitchell received two wounds, one in the right leg and another in the cheek. That on his cheek still shows its effects by a scar near the right corner of the mouth.

"I quess I had my mouth open that day," he explains, "for the bullet went in it and came out on the other side."

What most of us knew only through history, Mitchell has experienced. He was one of the gallant band which gave way to Grant at Vicksburg on July 4, 1863, after famine and pestilence had invaded the besieged city.

He battled futily against Sherman on the northern general's march to the sea through Georgia and eventually was captured, spending some days in a prison camp.

At the end of the war he settled in Mississippi, then left for Texas, where he stayed for years. In 1879 he again came to Oklahoma, living in Bryan County and later near Okmulgee. But he stayed here for only a short time. After four years of war and 14 of living in a country then wild, he returned to his native Missouri, taking to a farm near Springfield.


In contrast to his former exciting career, the former Confederate, who incidentally came from the war a second lieutenant, spent 50 years on his quiet farm retreat with his wife.

His wife died in 1929 and he again came to Oklahoma, this time to Muskogee where he lives with his daughter, Mrs. E.M. REDDICK. He has a son living in Springfield and two daughters near that city.

Mitchell shows his army training even to this date. He stands surprisingly erect for a man of his years.

Politics? Mitchell is a democrat, a life long democrat, but did not vote in 1932, because he could not favor repeal.

CONFEDERATE SOURCE INFORMATION

"Legislation enacted on 5 January 1915, enabled any Confederate Veteran who had been an Oklahoma resident for at least one year to receive a pension if he had served in a Confederate unit for a period of at least three months. To be eligible he had to show that he was indigent and incapacitated for manual labor because of wounds received during duty or because of his age, accident, or disease. The Oklahoma Genealogical Society published an index of the applications and it has been microfilmed. It is also available at the Oklahoma Historical Society Library.

"The Civil War is represented by indexes for Union volunteers from Alabama, Florida, Georgia, and Tennessee, by indexes for Confederate volunteers from the eight Southeastern states, and by other records such as Confederate casualty lists, correspondence relating to the work of the Southern Claims Commission, and amnesty papers from former Confederates in every Southern state except Virginia."

While our Indian-related holdings are not as voluminous as those found in the western branches of the National Archives, they do include Cherokee Agency Records from 1801 to 1835....

Of special interest: World War I Draft Records: The Branch currently holds some 24 million draft registration cards, filled out in 1917 and 1918 throughout the United States by men born between 1873 and 1900, whether they were actually drafted or not. Each card provides information on the registrant's birthdate and birthplace, citizenship, race, address, occupation/employer, and name of person to be notified. To locate a registration card a researcher must be able to identify the registrant, usually by full name and probable birthdate, and specify his residence in 1917 and 1918 (for rural areas the county name is sufficient, for metropolitan residents a street address is necessary--New York City had 198 draft boards, as an example). Researchers interested in the World War I draft registration cards should contact the Atlanta Branch for a supply of forms on which the request copies of the cards. There is a \$5.00 fee for copies. "I was out from Wauhillau the other day," said Col. Needles, "and saw a tombstone colored with the stain of age. On this tombstone was chiseled the legend "Polly Snaketail lies buried here...she died in the 110th year of her age." A few Cherokees remember Polly. She was born in 1794 in Georgia...she was a descendant of the first chief of the Cherokees, and it is remembered how she told the story that was told to her of the Revolutionary days. She came with the Cherokees and was honored by them.

Cherokees in the California Gold Fields

When the call went out that there was gold and wealth in California, men and women came from all over the known states to find their "fair share; and in Indian Territory that same call lured many Cherokees out west. The following is a letter written by John Nivens, who with his brother, Jefferson Niven and two slaves, Charley and Jack went to California. Other Cherokees who were mentioned in his letters: Arch Wilson, Sacramento; Miss Susan Coody, Sacramento; Bet Terril, Sacramento; Margaret Merril, Margaret Scott, Bill and James Colston, Tom Taylor & wife, Wm. Elders, Bill & Tomm Woodard, Arch Timberley, Wilit and Geo. Genings, Sam Mays & boys, Josiah Fields (died of smallpox, Dec. 1852), Brewer Boys, Bill Looney.*

Dear Sister,

California Dec. 7, 1850

After a long and tedious trip I arrived safe and sound in California and halve had tolerable good health but halve with regret to write to you the loss of our beloved brother, Jefferson he is dead it is verry tring matter with me to tell you about his death but I shall try to let you know the particulars of his onfortonate death in this most miserable land of misery. He was sick on the road but after laying by several days at the Grat Salt lake City he got so he could travel but never recovered in tireerly his desease was mountain fever so called by the doctor and after we arrived in George town California he traveled about in this country for three weakes and was taken down sick again with a diarrhae and lay a long time buit I was allwais with him and got a house and a good doctor to tend him and he again partley recovered but never got sound when he got so he could get about he said he wanted to gow to the city of Sacimento and wanted me to gow with him so I went and staid ten days with him and I left him in the city. I returned to the mines but I could not hear of him enny more until he sent for me the Cholera had made its apearance in the city the day after I left and he was atacted with that terable destructor of mankind the Cholera, and he recovered again from that but it seemed that he was destined to die in this distant land far from home and among strangers. So he was taken sick again with a disenterry that last five weeks, he could not indure the pain enny longer. He sufered a thousand deaths but what gratafies me is he died with a hope of future hapiness. His death has left me in a distressed situation hear my expenses has ben very high I never halve had much chance to make enny money and indeed thier is not much money to be made in this country and I halve to settle Jeferson bisness here and as soon as I can do so I want to gow home so you may look for me in the Spring if I can make money enough to take me home it has cost me a grat deal sinse I halve bin in this country, evry meal that I eate costs one dollar and loding in a house 50¢, so you can judge whither I halve made enny thing or not. Jefferson bord and doctor bill was well on to a thousand dollars and I don't now wither I will be able to settle all of his dets or not before I leve this country he gave Charley his freedom and Jack has run away and I don't know wether I will be able to find him or not but if I find him I will take him home with me if he wants to gow and if he is desposed to be contrary I can't do nothing with him in this country so I halve writin this letter to let you know of the great loss most beloved brother but tell Mother not to grive for it is the workes of the Allmity God for what he does is write and it must be done.

Well I will try to let you now somthing about the <u>Bayounard</u> and <u>Green lief</u> people thay all got here safe but old Palmer he died on the Road but thay all scattered over the country in every direction, all dissatisfied and thay all want to git home again there is none of them made enny money and I don't think thay ever will make money in California. tell all of my friends to stay at home and let California be if thay dont wanter see the Elephant tell my friend Bean to stay at home with Fanny and the children. nother more but remain your affectionate brother, John Nivens

I am Glad to Say to you I am in better health and then I have ben in long time Thauker & Wilson Elisabeth are all well at present and all are with me on Jefferson place ----are all anxious to see you Come home John & Moses and other Children they are all well and growing fast.

Jane married E. Butler about eighteen months ago but she is yet with us. She will leve us this fall she has ben in bad health for the last ten months.

First Jane receive letter from you date Calafornia Dect. 7 1850 which we find our self in mournfully with sorrowfully to hear the last of Dear Jefferson we can no more promise to see him in this world only by the mercy fully God we may promise to meet him in the Kindom of God where the Sorry never Reach.

Jane Receive the letter date Calafornia Dect. 21 1850 which you State you thought of starting home and if not you would write to some of us months and we have not wrote you think you would be home every months when we could not get any letter from you we thought you was on way all the time the last letter we have from you the Dect. 5 1851 before this was address to me which you also state of think Starting home in Short time so you see we have been labour un dis point think you was on the way for home all the time.

Dear Son please come home money no money you know you are now only Son I have live your Company would be Greate saisfaction to me for what time I may live this is time you ought to be with us now and your little Family.
