NOTICE TO NEW MEMBERS: Those who join during any month of the year after the membership month of May, will receive all Quarterlies that have been published that year.



LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Our January meeting was exceptionally well attended because of the interesting program presented by Jack Gayer on "Presentation Swords." Jack has been collecting swords for 30 years and his collection ranks among the top seven or eight collections in the United States. He brought eight of his favorite Civil War swords to our meeting and related the history of the person to whom the sword was originally presented. He researches the history in much the same way a genealogist researches a family — using information from the National Archives, Regimental Histories, biographies and other writings. We are still receiving comments and praise on this program.

Since we have a number of new members, our February meeting will be a workshop conducted by Deone Penquite, Maxine Harris and Mickey Hagan. Subjects to be covered will be census records, wills and probates, immigration trails, etc., with a question and answer period following.

Our March program is scheduled to be presented by Brad Agnew, Professor of History, Northeastern State University. It will be an especially interesting program. Mr. Agnew is much in demand as a speaker and we are very fortunate to have him on our agenda.



TWIN TERRITORIES.



Recently, in my rambles over the Cherokee Nation, I tarried a few days at Briartown, in Canadian district, and visited, while in that vicinity, the old Walker Carey school house and other spots fraught with historical interest.

This old school house was built sometime between 1840 and 1850, and in it was taught a Cherokee National primary school up to the breaking out of the war. It was again so occupied after the war until it became too dilapidated and a new log house was built nearby the old one.

An old neighborhood cemetery was a place of considerable interest. It has been in use for more than twenty-five years, and contains some fine tombstones marking the last resting places of many of the old-time leading citizens and residents of Canadian district.

One bears the name of Capt. W. G. Russell, who led the first mining company to Pike's Peak. Another is a most singular monument, such as I never saw before. A pile of rough-dressed native sandstone is built upon the grave, and on that lies a perfect, solid coffin cut from the nearby sandstone, with an inscription in Cherokee characters—the name, age and date of death of a remarkable Cherokee, who lived near here. It was the resting

place of "Spring Frog," "Doostoo"—100 years old.

Another noticeable grave is that of Mrs. Eliza Perdue, wife of Ethan Allen, a well-known cattle speculator. On a prepared and cemented foundation lies a highly polished, beautiful marble slab, 10x6 feet, and at the head a handsome stone. All is inclosed by a neat iron fence, and the grave is protected by a good shed built over all. The cost of all was perhaps \$1000.

I was told that Rev. Walker Carey's grave was there, too, but I did not verify the fact.

From the old Walker Carey cometery, with my guide—an old citizen, who could point out every spot of interest for miles around—I visited the Tom Starr home, about a mile and a half distant, one of the most interesting spots in the Cherokee Nation.

I went through the very house in which Tom Starr lived and died. I will not here attempt to give an extended sketch of this remarkable man, who for years was branded as an outlaw, with a price upon his head—"dead or alive."

For a long time the Cherokee government kept a standing advertisement in the National paper, the CHEROKEE ADVOCATE, in which was offered a reward of \$500 for the arrest of Tom Starr.

I well remember Tom, as do many of the old Cherokees and residents of Indian Territory—remember his bold daring, his recklessness and the deeds that made him an outlaw, hunted, feared, and yet, withal, admired by some for his very cunning.

One incident I recalled as I visited his old home, which will prove to the reader who may not have heard of him, what manner of man he was.

It was during the time that the \$500 reward was offered by the government for his capture. There was a big barbecue and a great number of people were gathered together for a good time. I was there. In the midst of the fun, Tom Starr and a single companion rode up and got off their horses, which they tied nearby. With his long, muzzle-loading rifle in his hand, Tom Starr deliberately walked about among the people. He was not disguised-everybody there knew perfectly well that it was Tom Starr who walked so quietly among them-knew, too, that \$500 was due the man who affected his arrest. Yet not a man moved toward him. No motion was made to arrest him. A sudden hush fell on the crowd, until Tom Starr, the bold, the fearless, mounted his horse, beckoned to his companion and rode slowly away.

The house he lived in is a double log house, with a wide, open hall between, and a long porch on each side, extending the whole length of both houses. Each room has a door opening from the center

of the hallway, and each has one small window with a wooden shutter. Neither ever had any glass. In each room is an old-fashioned fireplace, with rock chimneys. Both houses are ceiled overhead with sawed lumber, and the floors were of the same, which was most remarkable for a house built at that time.

The arch rocks of both fireplaces have various devices cut into them. The one in Tom's own room has a long bow—some call it a rainbow—and under it in the center is the sun, surrounded by stars. Under the sun is a horse. To the right is an ax or a hatchet. To the left the device is so blurred that we could not make it out.

In the other room there are two bows on the rock, with a large diamond between them, besides other cuttings, which are clouded with smoke. The kitchen, a log house, a short distance from the other, is much dilapidated, as well as the old smokehouse nearby.

The apple orchard, which twenty or thirty years ago was one of the best in the country, is fast dying out. I went through it and plucked a fine, mellow apple from an aged tree, under which Tom Starr has doubtless stood many times.

The rail fence around the place is falling down. About two hundred yards to the west of the house is the family burying ground. Passing in through a half-tumbled down gate, we found about thirty graves of the immediate family connections, and as many more of neighbors and friends. Half of the

graves have stones with inscriptions on them. The most imposing of all, as befitting the old patriarch of the family or clan, is that of Tom Starr himself. Simply a plain, square, massive column, eight or ten feet high. The inscription is very simple and of few words. A clover leaf at the top, with a large old English "S." Below this a hand, the index finger pointing upward, "Tom Starr, Aged 77 years," then two or three lines, and that is all. The cost of the stone was \$700. On one side of the grave the ground is sunken considerably, and the tall, heavy stone is leaning over, as though it had half a mind to lie down awhile.

Leaving the silent dead to their eternal rest, we visited the spring, a couple of hundred yards to the east, which has furnished water to the family all these years, and drank at the same fountain at which Tom Starr himself so often quenched his thirst. Near the spring stands probably the largest red oak tree in the Cherokee Nation—truly a giant among the trees of the forest. At two feet from the ground it is about ten feet in diameter, or thirty feet in circumference. I stepped around it as near to the roots as I could walk, and found it forty-five feet.

Such, today, are the old home and surroundings of the notorious, much dreaded, and doubtless much misrepresented Tom Starr, the Cherokee outlaw.

EDITOR'S NOTE.—Readers of Twin Territories will remember Mr. Hitch-cock as one who has contributed to this magazine many Cherokee legends and bits of Cherokee history. He was born in the old Cherokee Nation in and is quite familiar with the affairs, historical and legendary, of his people.

It was reported that immediately after the act, so many people took advantage of the opportunity to catch up with the formality of marriage, that in the first three years in Muskogee 1324 licenses were granted, an average of nearly forty a month."
