## THE DAMME SURNAME

Through the efforts of society members who worked long tedious hours to record and compile information so that it may be available to the public, we have extracted the following:

From the "BOYTON INDEX" the Boynton, Oklahoma newspaper for the dates April 8, 1921 - November 26, 1926 extracted by Lillie WIEDEL, the articles with the surname DAMME are duplicated here.

June 24, 1921

Obituary - Paul F. DAMME was born December 17, 1898 at Winside, Nebraska and died at his family home in Boynton June 18, 1921. Burial was at Haskell. He is survived by a father, one sister and five brothers. The family had resided in this city but a short time. Expression of gratitude from F.H. DAMME and children.

September 22, 1922

Miss Bertha DAMME died Sunday evening, September 10 at the Baptist hospital in Muskogee, aged 26 years 11 months and 12 days, the only daughter of Fritz DAMME. The mother and three other members of the family have preceded Miss Bertha. A father and five brothers survive to mourn. The funeral was Tuesday afternoon and interment in Haskell Cemetery. (Sept. 29 Expression of gratitude from F.H. DAMME).

April 10, 1925

The funeral of Fritz DAMME was held in Haskell last Sunday afternoon. Besides his aged father he leaves one brother, Leo, to mourn his loss.

JAIL FOR KICKING WIFE OUT OF BED

From the Muskogee Daily Phoenix  
July 10, 1909

James Ross, a Constable, Must Spend Five Days in County Bastile

Abused Daughter, Girl Swears, Because She Wouldn't Give Him Whiskey.

James Ross, Constable in the township a little over a mile east of Muskogee, yesterday in Justice Bailey's court was fined five dollars and sentenced to five days in jail for kicking his wife out of bed and driving her from his home.

Ross stated that he did not remember the assault and stated that if he did it he must have been intoxicated. His wife testified that she was afraid he would kill her.

Jenny Ross, his sixteen year old daughter swore that one day recently he came to the Ramsey farm to which she had fled and because she would not give him his coat which contained two bottles of whiskey and a revolver, dragged her around the yard, and finally compelling her to mount his horse, ordered her to ride away with him.

Ross had always born a good reputation and was considered a good officer.

TESTIMONY REGARDING KATY LIMITED NO. 9 HOLD-UP

The following is edited testimony of witnesses taken from the transcript of a trial in the District Court of the United States of the Eastern District of Oklahoma at Muskogee. The allocation of Indian land by the Dawes Commission and building of railroads across the Territory was not welcomed by the Indians. There was deep resentment of the railroads. The Davis brothers (Sam, Cicero, Jack and Bob) were Cherokees, only one generation away from their removal from Georgia. Their parents were John Davis and Jane Saphronia Tate. John Davis' parents were Daniel Davis and Rachel Martin. According to Dr. Emmet Starr's "Old Cherokee Families", Rachel Martin's genealogy is as follows:

- Ludovic Grant - Cherokee wife (some list her name as "Eughioote")
- Mary Grant - William Emory
- Susannah Emory - Joseph Martin
- Rachel Martin - Daniel Davis

The Davis brothers owned ranches around Porum, Briartown and Warner. Joe Davis, son of Jack Davis was only 23 years old at the time of this trial

It is interesting to note that Joe Davis and his companions were tried earlier at Eufaula, Oklahoma for robbing the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Train No. 9 and were acquitted. The charge against the defendants here was "delaying the mail". No attempt was made to enter the mail car, but the train carrying the mail was delayed due to the hold-up the morning of October 29, 1912. The date was clear in the memory of the witnesses as the Honorable William Jennings Bryan spoke in Eufaula on that day.

BILL OF EXCEPTIONS

Now on this 15th day of February, 1915, at Muskogee, Oklahoma, within the Eastern District of Oklahoma, came on for trial the above entitled and numbered cause, before the Honorable Ralph E. Campbell, Judge, presiding, and a jury; and thereupon appeared for the United States, D. H. Linebaugh, Esq., United States Attorney, George Miller, Jr., Esq., Assistant United States Attorney and W. P. McGinnis, Esq., Special Assistant to the United States Attorney; and there appeared on behalf of the defendants, F. M. Rutherford, Esq.

The third witness called on behalf of the United States was John H. Dolan, conductor of the M.K. & T. Train No. 9.

Q Mr. Dolan state whether or not your railroad has a passenger train which they call train No. 9? A It has.

Q Also called the Katy Limited? A It is.

Q State whether or not - in what direction it runs?

A No. 9 runs north to south, St. Louis to Galveston and San Antonio.

Q In running from St. Louis to Galveston it runs through Parsons, Kansas, to Denison, Texas? A Yes sir.

Q State whether or not you were in charge of that train in October - October 29th, 1912? A Yes sir.

Q During that night at any time was that train stopped?

A It was stopped at 2:25 A. M. the morning of the 29th, five miles south of Canadian at a place called Worth.

Q How far from Canadian River is it?

A About a half a mile from Canadian River where we were stopped.

Q North of the River? A North of the river.

Q You say the train was stopped at 2:25? A 2:25 A. M.

Q Do you know what stopped it? A A burning bridge.

Q Where was that bridge, how far from the River bridge?

A About a half a mile or little over, probably just about a mile.

Q Where on the train were you riding when it was stopped?

A The fourth car from the engine; third car from the engine.

Q What did you do when the train stopped, if anything?

A I looked out to see what the trouble was and myself and porter ran out. I instructed the porter to get buckets.

Q What was your porter's name? A Henderson, A. J. Henderson.

Q So ahead and tell what you did? A, I dropped down on the west side of the train and the porter on the east to go to the baggage car to get the buckets and I ran forward and saw the fireman out there with a bucket in his hand in the act of throwing it on the fire; about that time three men came up from the west with Winchesters and called on me - one of them called on me, to throw up my hands which I did. The engineer came around the engine from the front and they called on him and he didn't seem to pay any attention to them until they called on him the third time and he turned around and saw me with my hands up and he immediately put his hands up and they marched he and I and

the fireman back to the express car, about the express car, and about that time the express messenger opened his door, for some cause or another; he was commanded to come down, which he did. The porter in the meantime crossed over to the side where we were and they lined the bunch of us up facing the car and searched us.

Q Did they get anything off of you, Mr. Dolan?

A They took my pocket-book out of my hip pocket and one of them remarked: "I guess I will take charge of this and he did so". After the search they marched us back to the rear end of the combination or mail car, and ordered the nigger porter to uncouple the train.

Q That is Henderson?

A Henderson. He got under the train to uncouple it and the steam hose coupling was very hot and it was<sup>a</sup> difficult matter for him to uncouple them with his bare hand; however, he accomplished the trick after one of them patted him in the back with a Winchester and told him he would cut him in two, or shoot him in two; and the vestibule curtains, I suggested that they uncouple them, and one of them said: "Let them go to Hell", or words to that effect; and he uncoupled everything but the draw bars and they thought they had our train uncoupled and they ordered us to the express car and we all loaded in there.

Q All of you loaded into the express car?

A All of us but the fireman; the fireman was taken up by one of the clan to the engine and they told him to go ahead; well, he tried to go ahead but he couldn't; those brakes when they are uncoupled, they are automatic and they apply automatically and the train, not being uncoupled, and the air apparatus being uncoupled, set these brakes on the rear part of the train; seven cars, I think it was. And it was impossible for the fireman to start. He slacked his train back several times and was

~~unable to do so; and I remarked that the fireman couldn't start that train - I got uneasy, I thought maybe they might shoot him -~~  
and I said: "It ain't uncoupled", and one of them said: "You come on back", and when the fireman was jerking back I took the lever and uncoupled, and he ordered me to proceed forward and we went across the burning bridge and stopped over there and came back with the engine right in the Canadian River bridge; right close to it, not on the bridge, but right close. There they took the men in the baggage car out and had all of us

go up along side of the engine, tender of the engine, and there was a place along there a couple of feet, I think it had been built up, there were chats and one thing and another and it made a very nice place to sit down and he said: "Sit down there", and got us all in line and the one that was guarding us got at the head end of the line and got us in line so he could guard us and one man went in the car and the other one stood guard at the rear end of the car, and this man that went in the car stayed there probably seven, eight or ten minutes, probably a little more and came out and there was an explosion, not very strong; he went in the car again and stayed a little while and came out and about the same length of time there was another explosion. Well that explosion kind of loosened up the steam pipes a little bit, good deal of steam was coming out and I remarked to the man guarding us, I said: "Is that car on fire", and he said: "I guess not"; and in the meanwhile sitting there I got to talking to this guarding us, and I said: "You've got that old pocket-book of mine there and there is nothing in it but a few cards and stuff of no interest to anybody but me", and I said: "take that out", - there was a note in there - "take that out and give me my pocket-book" and he said: "All right, Cap, I will do it", and he did so. About the third explosion, I think it was, it might have been after the fourth - no, after the third explosion, this man came out of the car and went to the engine and got the shaker bar - that is an iron bar about four foot long, probably three inches wide at the heavy end, and maybe two inches at the other, and probably an inch in thickness; and the coal pick and came back and as he passed this man guarding us he said something

to us, and this man stepped over to me and handed me my ten dollar note and said: "Cap, we don't want any of your money", and I said: "Thank you, you are a gentleman". And directly he came out of the car with a couple of packages or three on his arm; I can't tell exactly how many, and came on to this fellow guarding us and said: "Let's go". They passed on around the front of the engine and he had a pistol of some sort, an automatic I think it was, and fired three shots into the head-light and called for the fireman to put it out. The fireman had put the light out about that time. Those shots all hit the head-light but they didn't effect the vital part; didn't interfere with the use of it, and after the men left we turned the head-light on and went ahead. In the meantime ~~XXXXXX~~ we were sitting there talking and I had been taking some medicine and my bowels were rather loose, and I asked the gentleman if he had any objection to my stepping down the bank there and relieving the situation, and he said no, go ahead; and I did so. There was also a bird dog in the car, sat right close to the safe that was blown, and, wonderful to relate, the bird dog wasn't, in my opinion, injured any; didn't seem to exhibit any signs of it afterwards.

Q Mr. Dolan how long did it take them to rob the train?

A Well we were there about fifty minutes.

Q About fifty minutes to do the robbing. How long, if you know, was your train delayed by this robbery and the burning bridge? A It was delayed from 2:25 A.M. until 1:05 P.M.; that is the time that we finally got away from there after they



made the repairs to the bridge.

Q About eleven hours, is that right? A Yes sir.

Q Was traffic delayed on that railroad at that place that length of time? A Yes sir.

Q Did the bridge burn? A Entirely.

The fourth witness for the government was William Kelm, locomotive fireman.

Q State your name. A William Kelm.

Q Where do you live? A Oklahoma City.

Q Where did you live in October, 1912? A Denison, Texas.

Q What was your business or occupation at that time?

A Locomotive fireman.

Q On what railroad? A M. K. and T.

Q State whether or not you were the locomotive fireman on train No. 9, known as the Katy Limited, on the night of October 28th, 1912? A I was.

Q Which direction was that train running? A South.

Q Were you in the hold-up at Worth? A Yes sir.

Q Were you the fireman on the engine at Worth in the hold-up? A I was.

Q Just tell the jury what time it was, if you remember, that the train was stopped?

A Why the train was stopped about 2:25 A. M. on the morning of the 29th.

Q What stopped it? A Why as we were going south on No. 9 we rounded the curve there south of Eufaula going into Worth

I see a big fire down the track and the engineer brought his train down under control and we see the fire was quite a ways on down the track yet and he released the air and drifted on down to where the fire was and we rode up pretty close to this burning bridge. After we discovered it was a bridge we rolled right up close where we could have the engine handy to get water to put out the bridge and while we were rolling up to the bridge why I got the bucket and had a bucket of water drawn by the time the engine stopped and I went over to the fire and throwed this water on the fire and I looked out there for a little bit to see where would be the best place to commence on it to save the bridge and I reckon I stood there a second or so and as I turned around to go to get another bucket of water there was a man standing there with a Winchester in my face.

Q What did he tell you to do, if anything?

A He told me to throw up my hands; well I didn't realize what was taking place -- couldn't realize it was a hold-up and for some reason or other I told him to go to the baggage car and get a bucket and save the bridge and he said: "To Hell with the bridge, up with your hands." Of course I throwed them up. I found out then what was the trouble. By that time the other crew was there, the rest of the crew. They had then covered with their guns so they lined us up there and searched us. one of the men says to me: "You are the engineer aren't you?" and I told him: "No, I am the fireman", and he says: "You will do. Come go with me".

Q How was that man dressed who told you that you would do to come and go with him?

A Why he had on a big white hat and white handkerchief over his mouth and a light coat on.

Q What kind of handkerchief did the others have?

A I hardly remember now what kind of handkerchiefs they did have.

Q Did you go with this fellow? A I went with this fellow to the engine cab, yes sir.

Q What did you do when you got up there?

A When we got there he told me to go up the track until he told me to stop and I tried to start the engine up and couldn't move and I discovered that they hadn't pulled the pins back where they parted the hose and we had seven cars and I couldn't move the train and I told him they never pulled the pins and I couldn't move and he said, try it again. He said, some one might be back there and pull the pins and we might go ahead and I pulled the slack several times and he got pretty angry and told me: "damn it, hurry up", and I kept reasoning with him and told him that the pin would have to be pulled before I could get away from there and he said: "Let's go and pull the pin", and we got down on the ground and started back to pull the pin and I seen some one coming out of the baggage car and I told him I thought they were going to pull that pin now. They were getting out of the baggage car. I could see two men get out of the car and I said: "Yes, they will pull the pin now", and he said: "Go back on the engine", and I got back on the engine and as I went up on the steps he punched me with a six-shooter.

Q He had a six-shooter, did you? A Yes sir.

Q What kind of a six-shooter? A I don't know. It was a pistol.

Q Go ahead? A After I got back on the engine he followed me and he stood right in the gang-way of the engine and I told him that I didn't know whether the bridge would hold that big engine up or not and he said: "Damn that, you go until I tell you to stop", and I asked him where he wanted to go and he said: "Anywhere this side of the big bridge", and I said: "We are close to the big bridge now", and he said: "That will do", and said: "Get down", and I got down on the ground and went back to the baggage car and they had the other members of the crew and they got out on the ground then and so there was another man taking charge of us there then and brought us up back side of the engine and we all stood there lined up facing the engine and so we stayed there and had our hands up for quite a while and he says: "Let your hands down, boys, that is kind o' tiresome", and we let our hands down and stood there a few minutes and he said: "Sit down on the ground there", and said it might take a good while to do this little job, and we all sat down on the ground and in some few minutes an explosion occurred in the baggage car.

Q How many explosions? A It was four; and the third explosion, why this man that carried me on the engine came walking over and wanted to know if there was a coal pick on the engine and I told him there was and he got up on the

engine and got the coal pick and I suppose he got the shaker bar because I found the shaker bar after we got up to Eufaula. I didn't know at the time that he had gotten the shaker bar.

Q Did you find the shaker bar, where?

A In the baggage car. It was there some little bit. Then before the next explosion, the fourth explosion, a few minutes or so they came out with a package in their arm and says: "Let's go boys" and says: "You fellows all get in the baggage car", and I started walking toward the baggage car and he said: "No, you stay here", and when they got in the baggage car he said: "You get on that engine and cut that headlight out", and I got on the engine and just as I reached up to get hold of the switch to cut the headlight out he commenced shooting, and I cut the switch out as quick as I could and jumped down on to the boiler head and he quit shooting -- some three or four or five shots in that headlight -- and when he quit shooting I stuck my head out of the cab and seen him go across the tracks ~~xxxx~~ east <sup>the</sup> direction that the other men went and I started <sup>to</sup> back up and backed up a little ways and the engineer came out of the baggage car and got on the engine, and we backed up to the bridge and see the bridge all done fell in -- burnt out -- and we left then for Canadian and got into the depot up there and notified them of our trouble.

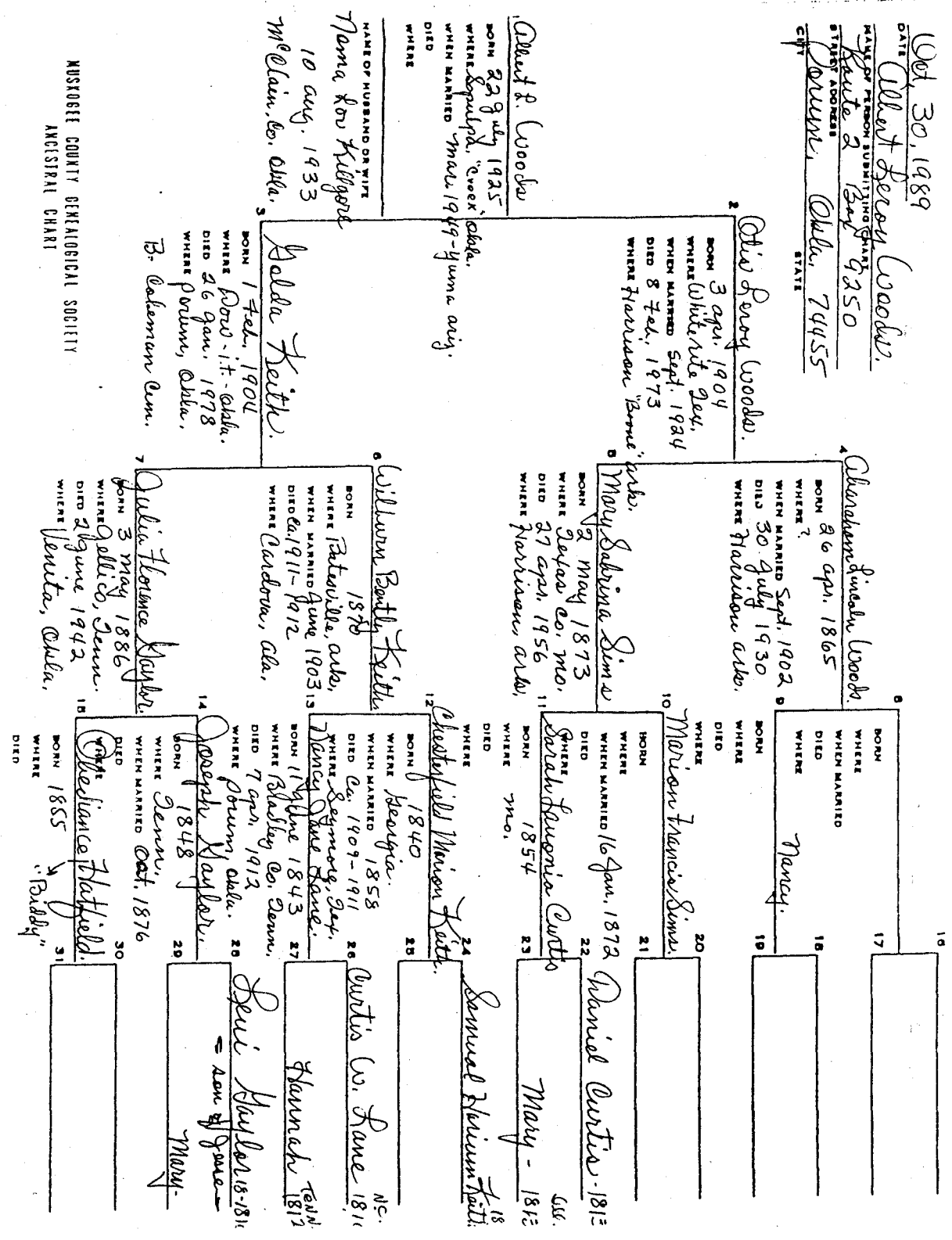

LEVI GAYLOR, son of Jesse, was born 1800-1810 in VA. He is listed in the 1830 Whitley Co KY census as head of household, with 1 male under 5 (b. 1825-1830) 1 male 15-20 (b. 1810-1815), 1 male 20-30 (b. 1800-1810), and 1 female 20-30 (1800-1810). He is in Campbell Co TN in the 1840 census, but I don't have the stats. In the 1850 census, wife Mary is listed alone with JAMES, HANNAH, JOSEPH. His date of death is unknown.

HATMAKER

It has been very hard to get complete background on Levi, since he must have died before the 1850 census, which first began listing family names; but it is reasonably sure that the following are the children of Levi. The name of his wife is also unknown.

James and Grizzy Ann / Chrissy Ann were married in Etowah Co AL ca 1858. Their son Levi was b. 14 Feb 1859 in AL.
