We would like for you to feel free to call a society member to come to the library and assist you in your search. That is our purpose, to help when needed.

Do you have a family Bible which shows your Muskogee County births, deaths, or marriages? If so, we would appreciate photocopies. When sending those great records, be sure to include the title page of the Bible, the year it was published, and the name of the original and the present owner of the Bible.

A very helpful publication has hit the press in the past few months. The newspaper, "Twin Territories", published "in honor of those individuals who settled Indian and Oklahoma Territories" is published monthly. One of our society members contributes articles to the paper.

Debra Shamblin, our new editor, and Virginia Perry, assistant editor, are doing a fine job of gathering information for our quarterly. We are still asking for contributions from our members. Your stories on your Muskogee County ancestors, your ancestor charts, and your queries are very welcome.

We are hoping to serve our membership as they would hope to be served. "Sharing" is the watchword for genealogists. Our way of sharing is including your information in our quarterly. And I quote from the famous old philosopher who said, "And we thank you for your support."

Genealogy in her blood

This is a portion of an article written about Mickey Hagan by the Muskogee Daily Phoenix, June 18, 1988. Mickey is a charter member of the Muskogee County Genealogical Society, and is currently Vice-President. She has introduced many people to genealogy by conducting "Beginner's Workshops" and has given many programs at society meetings.

It took seven years, but Mickey Hagan finally found her great grandfather, William M. Hooper, who was a Choctaw on the Cherokee rolls. During the search, she discovered a fascinating hobby -- genealogy.

"It's like gambling or anything else, once you get the bug, you're hooked." Her interest began with a curiosity about her Indian heritage. Her great grandfather came to Muskogee in 1879 and tried to get on the Dawes Rolls for Cherokees. He was not successful, and his number was stricken from the list. "I did not know the number," Hagan said, so she began with the best source available, the family grapevine.

Eventually Hagan found the information at the Northeastern State University Library on the Guion-Miller rolls. He was a Choctaw, not a Cherokee. Eleven other family members were also on the list.

"That just started it," Hagan said, pointing to a wall display of old family photos. Since then she has traced two lines of ancestors to the 1700's, and has traced her husband's lineage to the 1600's.

Genealogy has brought history to life for Hagan. She learned of her grandfather's unsuccessful court battles to be recognized as a native American. That would have made him eligible for land or cash from the government but "by the time he had proven it, it was too late."

She also learned that Lewis Masquerier, her fifth great-grandfather's son, invented the Homestead Act and the phonics system. "His family came to America for religious purposes," she said.

The Hagan family tree also includes cowboys, a photographer, a family that lived in a covered wagon for 16 years and one former prostitute who died a wealthy woman.

"If you're afraid of finding skeletons, do not start a family tree," she said.

FROM GEORGIA TO OKLAHOMA

My roots through my mother are some where in the South, namely Georgia, the Carolinas, VA, and Miss. Some research has been done in these areas but before 1800 the names of the children were not written out in the census, therefore, research is put to the test of deciding which family is yours by the ages of the children. So it is imperative that you learn the siblings and lateral lines as well as your own direct line. This is especially true when all siblings name their sons the same names.

Fabius A. Martin, called Bill, cousin to mother wrote to her youngest sister giving family history as he knew it. Their grandfather Franklin Alford Martin had been in the Civil War (War between the states) and had been at the Battle of Orleans. There is supposed to be Cherokee blood in the lineage, a connection to Omar Bradley. I knew Franklin could not have fought at Orleans—wrong time period. However, as I wrote the Georgia Archives and also Washington D.C. for military records, I found he had been on a ship, The Agamenticus at Mobile, Alabama in 1864. He had a pension file. He had been a confederate cavalryman until captured and sent to Rock Island prison, where there was little to keep him from freezing or dying from starvation. I'm sure that is one reason he signed up to go on the ship as a carpenter and fireman. His file gave the names of all his children, written two different ways. Two of the names were different from what mother knew as the names for her aunts. Even her own mothers name was not the same. She had always been called Dixie Elmer, the name was Dixie Elmanda. Franklin married Malinda McAfee (McHaffey) Bradley on Dec. 24, 1865. The pension file gave all his children's names and where he was born, his physical description and where he had lived after discharge. When I wrote Texas for the death records, his parents names were given on those. So writing back to GA, the

marriage records were found for he and Malinda as well as for his parents.

F. A. Martin married Lucinda Bates on Sept. 9, 1830 in Henry Co. GA. A record was found where a F. A. Martin sold his inheritance from a Thomas C. Martin to another Martin. Also Thomas O. Martin's will lists Francis A. Martin as a son. Many men of the name Francis changed the name to Frank or Franklin, so we may conclude this to be the same person. Thomas O. Martin had wife #2 Rebecca King. He had 5 children before their marriage, 3 after.

Franklin had 2 children in GA and moved to Tenn around 1870. Seven children were born in Tenn. About 1890 the family left Tenn. and moved to Texas. The Tenn Census listed Franklin as a distiller in 1880. He worked at making Whiskey in the Hollows at Lynchburg where Jack Daniels Whiskey is still made. Mother & I visited the Brewery in Lynchburg. We were served what was called "Yellow Label" (Lemonade) One girl was born in Texas. Donnie. Franklin A. died April 1, 1919; and Malinda died April 10, 1919. They are buried at Alvarado, Texas.

Dixie Elmanda Martin married the second of January, 1910, At Cleburn Johnson Co. Texas. Five children, including Bonnie Sarah Davis was born to Dixie and Alta D. Davis. The family left Texas by Wagon and Shipped furniture by train and arrived near Sallisaw at Redland, Oklahoma in late 1919 or early 1920. Four children were born in Okla. They moved to Claremore after the twins were born in 1926.

Bonnie Sarah Davis married Paul E. Ogle at Claremore on January 3, 1929. One child was born at Claremore before they moved to Texas, Johnson Co. She was about 7 when she left there and this was the first time back. A son was born in Texas in

July, 1931. A move brought them back to Claremore, Okla. December 1, 1932, the oldest child died of dyptheria. On Dec. 3, 1932, I, Bonnie Delores Ogle was born. Since Paul's parents lived at DeQueen, Ark, the family made a move there after another trip to Tex. In 1940 another son was born in Ark. After many moves which included Kan., Arizona twice, Calif. and Oregon the family moved to Missouri. There a 20 acre farm was purchased with the money from the sale of the Oregon home. Then Paul wanted to move back to Ark., but Bonnie would not hear of that, but the Mo. home was sold to a newly married Menonite couple and the family settled on a 40 acre farm in Atoka Co., Okla. There, I, Delores graduated from High School, afterward going to Claremore where Grandmother Ogle now lived with a sister.

I married Bobby D. Nickerson on Jan. 27, 1951, in Claremore where my only child, Nila Denise Nickerson was born June 5, 1952. Divorced on May 5, 1954, I went to Texas where my parents were living temporarily. Returning to Oklahoma, I worked, making a home for my daughter and myself in Claremore. With some encouragement I returned to college at OST, Okmulgee working at night and taking classes during the day. When a Civil Service test was passed and I was called to come to Muskogee and work for the Veteran's Hospital, I was advised to take the position. So, September, 1966 I came to Muskogee and set about buying a home and making a place to bring my daughter. She is the mother of 4, 2 boys and 2 girls. The girls are married. The oldest now a mother. I am now a Great-grandmother to Jerreth Andrew Mooneyham of Lexington, Okla.

From Thomas O. Martin of GA. to Jerreth, we are nine generations.

Territorial City Charter Granted By Arkansas Law

Nine Years After Incorporation
Indian Territory Became Part
Of 46th State

GREAT NEED IS REALIZED

Public Schools and Fire Protec-
tion Prospects Spurred Citi-
zens to Action

Forty-one years ago today a new town—Muskogee—officially came into being in the Indian Territory, a rugged semi-wilderness that nine years later was to become the 46th state to be admitted to the union.

Although actually born a quarter-century before, the struggling community within the borders of the Creek Indian nation was not granted a charter until the year 1893, less than a month after congress had enacted the Curtis bill which provided authority for incorporating cities and towns within the confines of a territory.

City Started in: 1872

Incorporation of the city was a momentous event for its proud populace, who looked forward to the time when Muskogee would be the hub of a thriving area in the fertile Arkansas river valley.

But New Year's day, 1872, saw the real birth of Muskogee. On that day the first train crossed a newly-constructed bridge which spanned the Arkansas. It was the first train to cross the Arkansas into this immediate locality.

First structure of note to be erected in what later was to become Muskogee was a rail terminus situated approximately a mile north of what is now Broadway.

However, due to the uneven character of the land which made it unsuitable for a yard and station, it was moved a short distance south, forming a nucleus for the rest of the town.

Statutes Lacking

For 25 years Muskogee was in the process of maturing. In fact, by 1890 its citizenry regarded it as a full-fledged city and began agitation for a charter. However, there was no federal statute at that time which provided for the incorporation of towns within a territory.

The fact Muskogee had existed so long without any form of municipal government "speaks well for the thousands of all sorts and conditions which comprised her population," read a newspaper account of the event several years later.

Less than a month after enactment of the Curtis bill Muskogee proud received her charter, probably the first community in the territory to take such a step.

Petition for the charter was filed in federal court here, under laws of the state of Arkansas which extended this far into the territory.

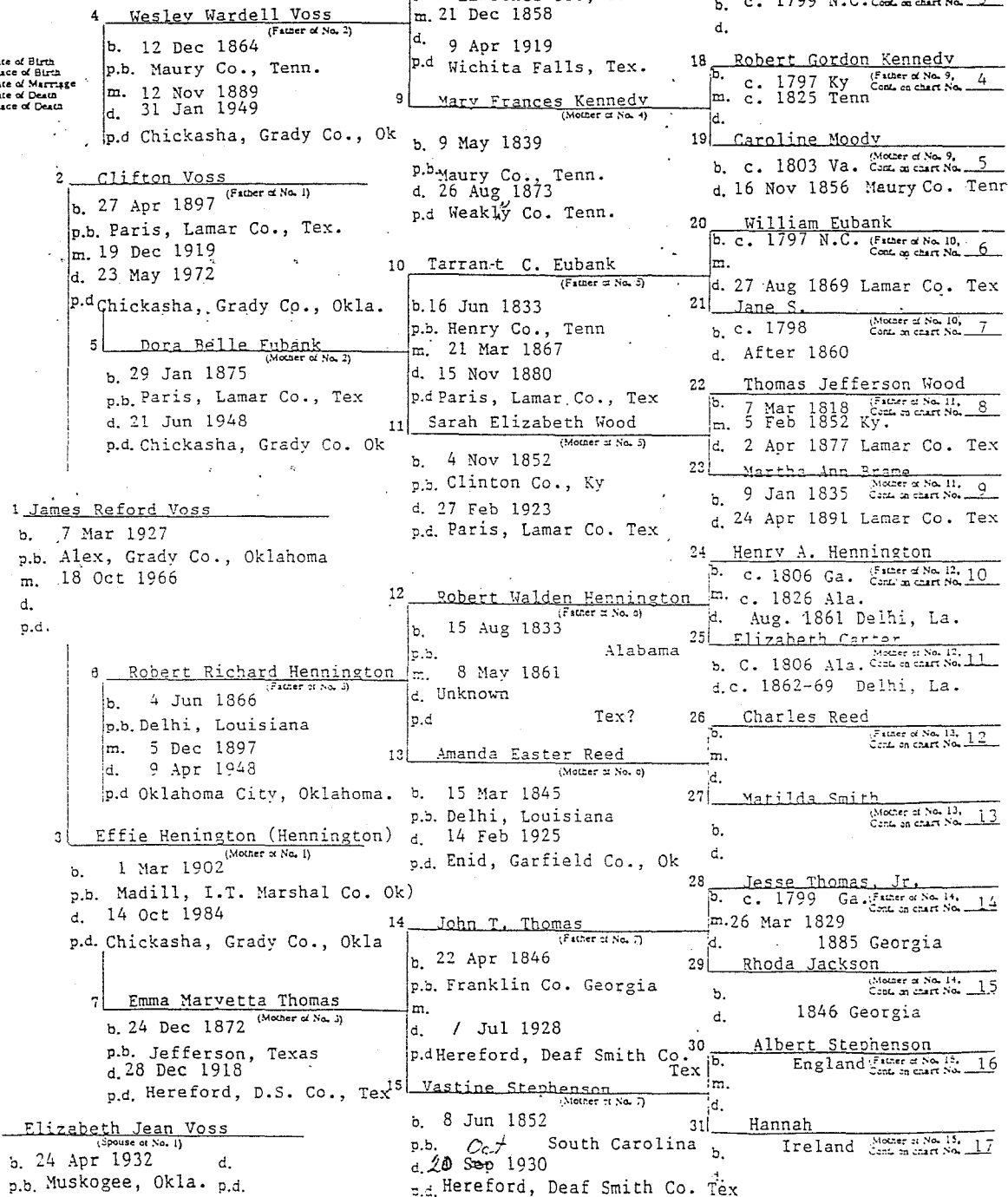
