'YANK' TIPTON IS DEAD IN FRANCE, LETTERS REPORT

Young Member of Engineers Killed by Falling Timber;
No Official Word

Walter A. Tipton, affectionately known to hundreds of friends in Muskogee as "YANK" Tipton, has been killed in France according to several letters received today by relatives of boys in the service.

"YANK" was a brother of Marvin D. Tipton, of the American Tire Jobbers, and a son of Mrs. Caroline Tipton, 415 East Broadway, was a member of the Sixty-Sixth engineers under Major J. F. Hickey of Muskogee. He enlisted about four months ago when Major Hickey was here recruiting.

No details of the death of young Tipton were received today further than the statement in one letter that he was accidentally killed by a piece of falling timber. This indicates that he met death behind the firing line and not at the actual front. No official confirmation has been received from Washington, although Marvin telegraphed Adjutant General McCain asking for news. Tipton's name has not yet been in the casualty list.

The first news of Tipton's death was given Marvin by Mrs. Leo Herrick whose husband is in France. Herrick merely said: "I suppose you've heard all about the death of "Yank" Tipton by this time. He was killed July 30."

Young Tipton was exceedingly well known in Muskogee. For several years he was connected with the Cotton Compress Company.

Another son of Mrs. Tipton is in the service, J. C. Tipton who has been in the marines for a year and a half. He is in Galveston now.

This is the second war bereavement for the Tipton family George Morris, brother of Mrs. Marvin D. Tipton was killed in an airplane accident off Long Island in August of 1917. He was the first Oklahoma aviator to meet death. His home was in western Oklahoma.

HOW 'YANK' TIPTON WAS KILLED
IS TOLD IN SOLDIER'S LETTER

A 50-FOOT LENGTH OF LUMBER FELL ON HIM AND
HE DIED THAT SAME NIGHT 'DICK' ODON WRITES

How 'Yank' Tipton, brother of Marvin Tipton, met his death in France is told in a letter received yesterday by W. H. Pritchett from Richard H. Odon a well known Muskogee boy who went into the Army about six months ago.

"Tip, was down on the ground helping unload fifty-foot pine lumber," writes Odon. "One of them slipped off and caught 'Tip' under it. He died that night in base hospital number 101 at St. Nazaire."

Many another Muskogean is mentioned in Odon's letter. He seems to be enjoying himself quite a bit. "There certainly are a bunch of Muskogee boys over here," Odon writes, "and most of them are at Camp Gron, this side of St. Nazaire. Our old friends, Gene Doyle and Clifford Bennett are along. Bennett was in my camp today and had dinner with me."

According to Odon, "the eats are fairly good, but I would like to have some of those tomatoes of yours."

Sergeant Odon writes that he expects to get his first service stripe this month.

'Yank' Tipton's Grave Covered With
Flowers by Soldier Pals

Photograph Received by Relatives Shows How
French Care for American Dead.

The picture shows the grave of Walter A. 'Yank' Tipton, son of Mrs. W. W. Tipton, who was killed while doing construction work with the 66th engineers during the war. The view is of the American dedicated cemetery outside the city of Paris in which many of the American soldiers who died in France during the war are being buried.

There are two such cemeteries for the American soldiers, the other being in the Meuse-Argonne region. The graves

are kept in a seemly condition throughout the year by the French people, who, according to a letter from one of young Tipton's comrades, evidence uncommon gratitude in their care for the American cemeteries.

The comrade who wrote to Mrs. Tipton recently, and who also sent her the picture of her son's grave, is Lyle W. Patterson of Kansas City, Mo. member of the 66th engineers. He explained that soldiers while awaiting return to the United States spent considerable time decorating graves of their countrymen.

The flowers on the grave in the picture were placed by Patterson and other comrades of young Tipton last Decoration day. Other flowers are placed liberally throughout the cemetery by American soldiers and by the French people.

Young Tipton was 27 years old when he was killed in an accident, by the collapsing of a huge structure of timber. One of the pieces was hurled against Tipton and threw him some distance causing his immediate death. The 66th engineers was the train formed in Muskogee by Major Hickey.

BRIEF HISTORY OF YANK TIPTON POST 474 VETERANS OF FOREIGN WARS.

The post was chartered September 3, 1920. Named after/for Walter A. "Yank" Tipton. He enlisted April, 1918. He was in the 66th Engineers, under command of Major J. F. Hickey.

Post 474 is the oldest known continuous V.F.W. post in OKLAHOMA.

The original meeting place was Room 10, located in the Muskogee City Hall. May 10th, 1950 it became incorporated.

November 1956, bingo was started on a Saturday night. Games were five cents per card per game. The Saturday night game is still in progress-making it the oldest bingo game in Muskogee.

On April 14, 1976, A perpetual charter was issued to Post 474; because of an argument over putting in a bar, thirty-five members out of one hundred twenty-two members walked out of a meeting held in March 1957. On May 14, 1957, VFW Post 4977 was chartered.

**MARY D. DOCKED
AWAITING A CREW:
RIVER WAR NOW ON**

The crew of the Mary D. Muskogee's steamboat, which plies between this city and Fort Smith, are still out on strike but a new templement of officers and men are on their way from Little Rock Arkansas, to man the craft.

Back of the fact that the crew balked and refused to work longer there seems to be a story. It is rumored that the railroad companies and Ft. Smith business men have pooled their interests to down Muskogee in her just fight for water rates.

The men of affairs in this city are not so easily downed and there is nothing they enjoy more than a good straight fight.

It is said that the Arkansas River Navigation company blame the railroads and the Fort Smith business houses for subsidizing the crew of the Mary D. in order to stop navigation of the Arkansas river. The Ft. Smith men are jealous and greatly fear the establishment of water rates for Muskogee.

The railroads do not desire to cut their freight rates to Muskogee for it would necessitate a great money loss. In addition it is averred that Capt. Blaksley who resigned as master for the local navigation company has been getting in some hard knocks and he may have influenced the crew to quit.

Blaksley was employed by the year to look after the affairs of the Arkansas River Navigation company. He also sold the local shipping company his steamer, the Mary D.. Soon after the ownership of the boat had

changed hands Blaksley is said to have lost interest in the enterprise. The pilot lives in Ft. Smith and from a reliable source it is learned that he is about to purchase a new boat to ply between Fort Smith and Webbers Falls, as Fort Smith is at present without a home grown boat. At least two citizens of Muskogee have been found who are licensed government pilots and they have volunteered their services if needed while the shipping war is on.

These two men are John Chandler and Mr. Cook, connected with the Turner Hardware Co.

Muskogee will get the water rates.

MILITARY CAMPS AND FORTS IN OKLAHOMA

BOGGY DEPOT, FORTIFIED IN 1863. Was founded in 1838 on Clear Boggy Creek on the old "Texas Road". Approximately 12 miles SW of Atoka.

CAMP HOLMES, 1834. Near Atwood at the mouth of the Little River, Sh 12.

CAMP MASON, 1835. On the north bank of the South Canadian River on Chouteau's Creek near Lexington, US 77. This is also sometimes called Camp Holmes.

CAMP McINTOSH, 1862 17 miles East of Fort Cobb.

CAMP NAPOLEON, 1865. Near Verden on US 62.

CAMP RADZIMINSKI, 1858-1859. Near Tipton on the lower reaches of Otter Creek where the stream comes out of the Wichita Mountains near Mountain Park.

CAMP WASHITA, 1834. One & $\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the Washita River & 3 miles from the Red River near Durant, US 70.

CANTONMENT, 1879-1885. On the North Canadian River South of Canton on SH 51.

CANTONMENT DAVIS, 1861-1862. 1 mile North of Bacone College, Muskogee, OK.

FORT ARBUCKLE, 1850-1870. 1 mile South of the Canadian River near Byars on SH 59.

FORT BLUNT, 1863. On site of Old Fort Gibson, US 62.

FORT COBB, 1859-1869. 1 mile East of the town of Fort Cobb, OK on SH 9.

FORT COFFEE, 1834-1863. North of US 271 near Braden on South bank of the Arkansas River.

FORT GIBSON, 1824-1899. US 62 North of Muskogee.

FORT McCULLOCH, 1861-1862, On the Blue River near Nail's Bridge, 10 miles North of Durant, OK.

FORT NICHOLS, 1865. Near Boise City. Founded by Kit CARSON who thought he was establishing a fort in New Mexico.

FORT RENO, 1874-1908, 1908-1955. West of EL Reno on US 66.

FORT SILL, 1868. Founded at Medicine Bluff as Camp Wichita, North of Lawton on US 62.

FORT SUPPLY, 1868-1893. Near the town of the same name on US 183 & 270.

FORT TOWSON, 1824-1829, 1831-1854. 15 miles East of Hugo on US 70. Also known as Cantonment Towson.

FORT WASHITA, 1842-1868. 13 miles NW of Durant on SH 299.

FORT WAYNE, 1839-1842. East of US 59 & Southeast of Grove.

PERRYVILLE, 1863. Near Savanna on US 69, a supply depot.

Lester is buried Greenhill Cemetery, Muskogee, Oklahoma.

Wayman Crow Jackson was one of the pioneers of Muskogee who will long be remembered by his many friends. He was born in 1855 and reared on an Arkansas farm. He acquired a common school education and attended the State University at Fayetteville and studied law in that city, later taking a course of study in a law college at St. Louis. Upon returning to his home he was admitted to the bar and was elected Mayor of Fayetteville. For five years following 1885, he was associated with E. C. Boudinot, the famous Cherokee lawyer, in Fort Smith, Ark.

He located in Muskogee in 1890 to practice law and in 1893 was appointed United States Commissioner for this judicial district, which position he held for about seven years. He then resumed the practice of law and immediately after statehood was elected as the first county judge of Muskogee County. At the expiration of his term as county judge, he served one term in the State Legislature. He was appointed on the new State Industrial Commission, where he served three years as a member and three years as chairman of the commission. During his six years' service on this commission he adjusted several hundred disputes between employers and employes, very few of which were appealed to the courts. He possessed a jolly, good-natured disposition, had a host of friends and but few enemies. He died on April 25, 1920, leaving a widow, one of the leading musicians of the city, a son and a daughter, all of whom are still residents of Muskogee.

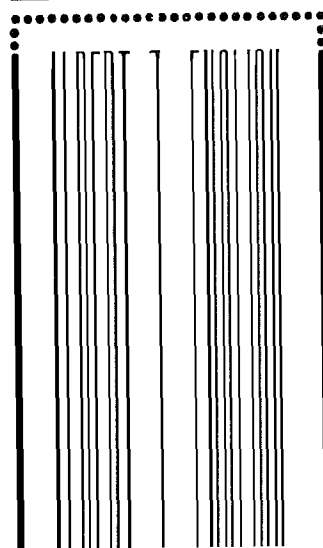
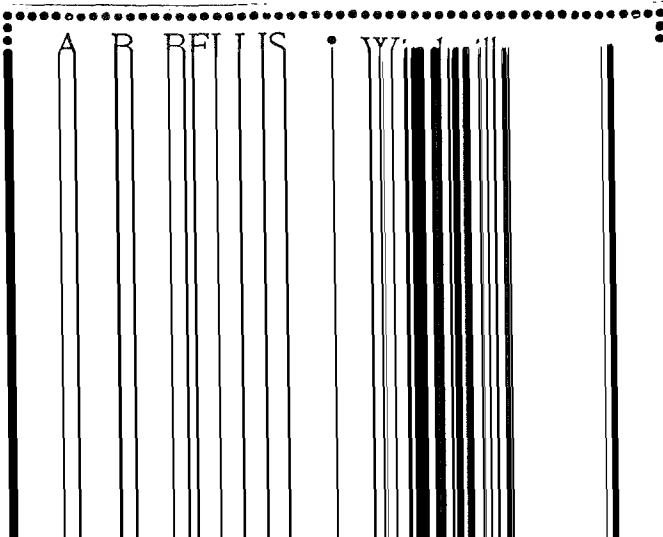

THE ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS

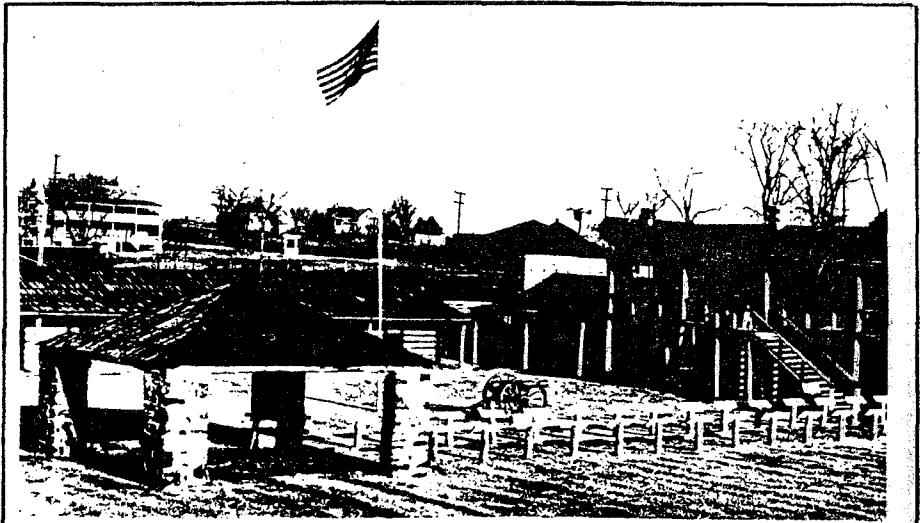
SEVENTH INFANTRY 1824

Fort Gibson owed its establishment to the Osage Indians. They claimed the country and exclusive rights to the game. They challenged the Cherokee hunters and were constantly engaging in battle with them.

The end of the war of 1812 brought Americans to the banks of the Mississippi and beyond in less than a decade. The government believed relocation of the Eastern Indians beyond white settlement would allow them time to adjust to the culture and technology of the white man. The government hoped to persuade them of the benefits of the removal. The task was difficult due to the strife in the

area where the government planned to settle the eastern tribes.

President James Monroe's secretary of War, John C. Calhoun sent a single company of riflemen up the Arkansas in 1817 to Belle Point (Fort Smith Arkansas). The troops did remove friction but was incapable of stopping it entirely. The garrison was reinforced in 1824 and moved to Fort Gibson.

The Army maintained peace for two decades.

During the emotionally charged years of Indian removal there were no clashes between the Indians and soldiers. The Army arranged truces between the feuding tribes and restrained the anger and bitterness of 50,000 immigrants and prevented uprisings that could have set the entire frontier aflame.

The U.S. Dragoons 1833

The United States Dragoons arrived at Fort Gibson in 1833. Some of the men who served this post were Jefferson Davis, Philip St. George Cooke, Stephen W. Kearny, Col. Dodge, Brigadier General Henry Leavenworth and Captain Nathan Boone.

The Dragoon Units learned the hard lessons of life. They became frontiersmen with spit and polish. They learned the skills and ways of the prairies and wilderness. They learned how to construct boats from available materials and how to track men and animals and even determine the age of the tracks. They hunted buffalo, dried its meat and used their hides for protection from the elements. They learned to find water in dry country and even to dig for it. Their life was hard but productive. They were the most respected and most useful regiments in the Army. The Dragoons garrisoned forts and kept the peace. They escorted traders, scientists, artists and other im-

portant people. They built and maintained roads, explored and mapped the region and helped accumulate scientific samples of minerals, soils and woods.

They died in great numbers from heat, cold, disease and accidents. The name "Grave Yard of the Army" and the "Charnel House on the Frontier" was used to describe Fort Gibson. These troopers who saw the harsh cruelty of nature with its floods, storms, searing heat, bitter cold and blinding sun also saw its spectacular beauty. They saw the grassy rolling hills and forest and winding streams. They had an abundance of game and saw the great herds of buffalo and wild horses. They saw the Indians' strange ways and saw the mighty warriors and great chiefs. They lived a life that stimulated all of their senses.

They were the vanguard of a coming civilization; they stood of the frontier of the Republic and served her well. ♦

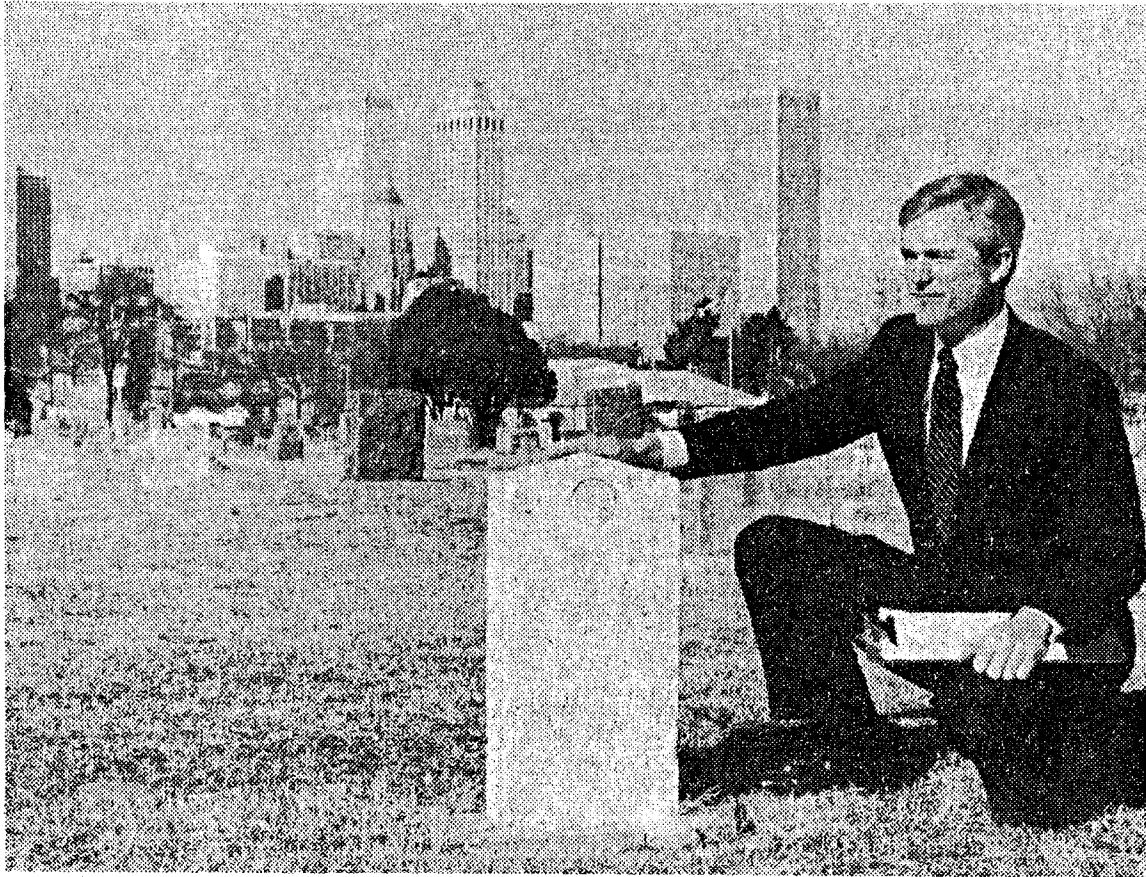
SEARCH FOR CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS' GRAVES

Moore would like to see the graves of Confederate soldiers buried in Oklahoma labeled with federal markers.

Most Confederate soldiers buried in Oklahoma are Indians, according to two Civil War buffs.

"They were trying to keep the Yankees from Arkansas, Kansas and Missouri from getting to Texas," said Jack Westbrook, whose grandfather served with the 19th Alabama Infantry Regiment from 1861 to 1865.

Westbrook, 67 and Greg Moore, 35, want to see the graves of Confederate soldiers in Oklahoma cataloged and labeled with federal markers.

They are looking both for the graves of soldiers who died during the war, and those of veterans who survived the war.

About six months ago, the pair began mailing information forms to various groups in an effort to locate and catalog sites where Confederate soldiers are buried.

Moore and Westbrook belong to the Col. Daniel N. McIntosh Camp No. 1378 of the Sons of the Confederate Veterans which has about 40 local members and 5,000 national members.

The Sons of the Confederate Veterans, based in Hattiesburg, Mississippi, was formed in 1896 with 24 camps from five states.

Information returned to the group is verified with the National Archives. The federal office will mail information for a fee.

The Department of Veterans Affairs provides the markers. The information sheets request the soldier's name, rank, regiment, company, state, birth date and place, death date and place and other facts.

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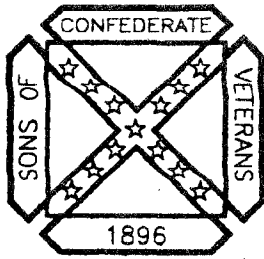

TWENTY MUSKOGEE BOYS JOIN NAVY IN 5 MONTHS

Taken from the Muskogee Times Democrat
January 23, 1914

Life on the ocean wave as members of Uncle Same's great sea-fighting forces appeals to Muskogee boys with an unusual attraction.

During the past five months 140 men applied for enlistment in the navy. Fifty of these were accepted, and of this number, twenty were Muskogeeans. These twenty were young, healthy, robust youths, to whom life in the navy appealed as a training school, and as a fitting preparation for a business career on land. Eighteen of the twenty are now in the United States navy training school at San Francisco.

The twenty Muskogeeans who have enlisted in the navy in the past five months are as follows: William H. Stewart, Noel J. Farley, Nuel J. Farley, (twins), Hugh R. Murchison, Frank G. McFarland, Bruce D. Gilmore, Ward B. Harris, Nathan Watson, Huston Drew, Adolphus C. Whitewater, Russell E. Milnes, Harold Blessing, William M. Stoner, Tony A. Saunches, Gray E. Kirksey, John T. O'Neill, Lynn B. Carter, Stevens Williams, Leland Wood and Charles E. McCoy. They are all still at the training station, with the exception of Stewart, who has been assigned to the battleship South Dakota. McFarland is playing cornet in the naval station band, and the others are rapidly completing their course of study.

The fact that there is often not enough water in Oklahoma to float even a houseboat, and that the sea thus is a source of wonder and delight to her island sons, probably accounts for the large number of enlistments in the Navy from Muskogee.

ORPHAN TRAIN SOCIETY

Orphan Train Heritage Society of America, Inc., 4912 Trout Farm Road, Springdale, AR 72764 was organized to draw together surviving Orphan Train riders and their descendants. Between 1854 and 1929 some over 150,000 homeless children were placed in rural America, most from New York and Boston origins, through the train programs. Descendants number in the millions. OTHSA now has documentation on more than 2,000 of the placed-out children, and is eager to add to files of information.

The Society has three OTHSA reunions/gathering set for this summer: June 14-15 at Normal, Ill; July 13 at Opelousas, La; and August 3 at Greenville, TX. The annual reunion (overall) will be October 25-26 in Fayetteville, AR. An outline of the gatherings may be requested with large SASE from the above address. (There are deadlines to meet.)

OTHSA also publishes CROSSROADS, a quarterly that carries stories about the placement of children and searches for kin. A yearly subscription is \$15; single copy \$4. Membership in the society is \$10 for Train Riders and \$20 for descendants or other individuals. Members may request research aid in records of the society and the printing in CROSSROADS of a search (with permission form completed)
