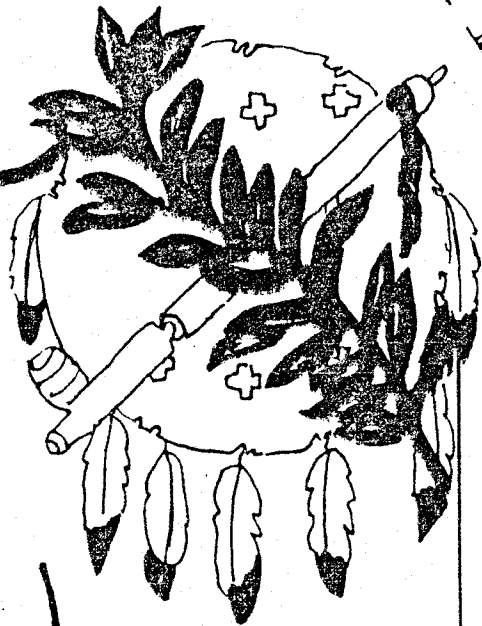
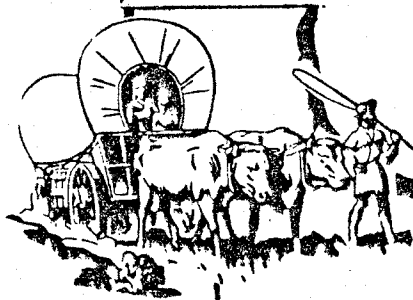

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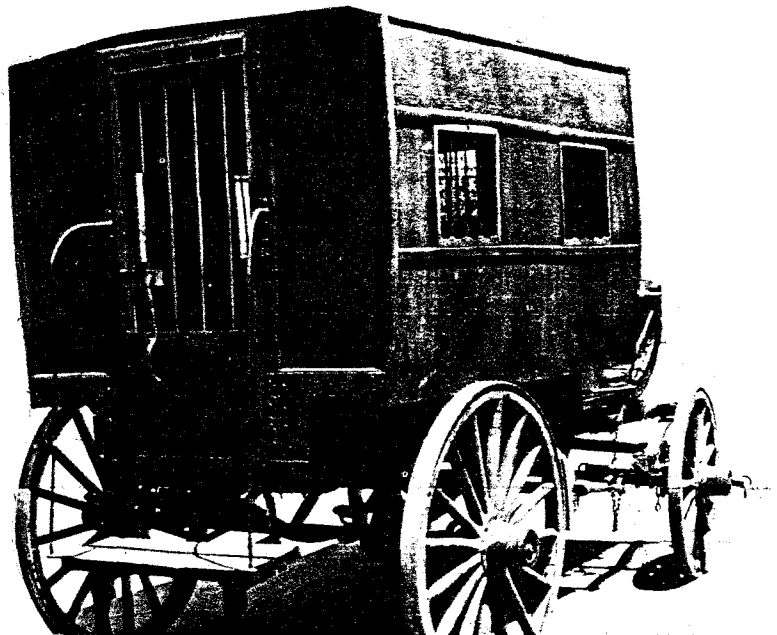
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19th Century Prison Van. Wagons like this were used to transport prisoners by U.S. Marshals of yesteryear.

Marshals Service Has Starring Role In State History

It's been 100 years since a shot from a U.S. marshal's gun started the Oklahoma Land Rush.

The same year that shot was fired, the U.S. Marshals Service - the oldest law enforcement agency in the nation - was celebrating its 100th birthday.

When the service's 200th birthday was commemorated this year, it was in Oklahoma that a national memorial to the agency was unveiled.

The memorial, adjacent to the Cowboy Hall of Fame, was dedicated earlier this month in Oklahoma City.

The historic link between Oklahoma and the service is a major reason the state was selected for the memorial said marshals service historian Frederick Calhoun.

Of about 400 marshals and deputies killed in the line of duty, 103 died enforcing the law in Oklahoma's Indian Territory during about 25 years at the end of the 19th century.

"We looked at a number of states for the memorial. Indian Territory and the marshals' role there are unique in American history," Calhoun said.

Although the near-mythical image of the U.S. marshal may have emerged from the Old West, it was in the Old East that the oldest federal law enforcement agency in the nation was born.

The service was created by the First Congress in the Judiciary Act of 1789 - the same legislation, Calhoun said, that established the federal judicial system.

George Washington appointed the first 13 marshals. For the next 150 years, the marshals service was the only federal agency authorized to make arrests and enforce federal law.

The marshals took the census until 1870, guarded the British prisoners of war during the War of 1812, and through the years registered enemy aliens in time of war, delivered presidential proclamations and performed a variety of chores for all three branches of government.

Stanley E. Morris, who headed the service until his recent appointment as deputy

to drug czar William Bennett, says the bicentennial publicity and a touring exhibit entitled "America's Star: U.S. Marshals 1789-1989" have helped bring the agency's past and present roles into focus.

Oklahoma City was one of the first sites to receive the exhibit last spring.

Modern marshals aren't one-eyed fatmen like the John Wayne character Rooster Cogburn in the film "True Grit," who was based, in part, on Indian Territory Marshal Heck Thomas. And they're not, as one official observed, just "guys in size 48 Short coats from Sears" serving process or making sure jurors don't doze off watching the slow wheels of justice grind.

Last year, marshals arrested 14,000 federal fugitives, more than all other federal law enforcement agencies combined.

They protected 505 judicial facilities and 1,611 judges and magistrates. Their Court Security Officers detected 55,970 weapons at courthouse checkpoints.

They administered the Witness Security Program with its 5,500 protected witnesses and 6,000 witness family members. Not a single participant who followed the program rules was harmed.

The National Prisoner Transportation Network - including "Con-Air," a fleet of marshal service-owned aircraft representing a 'flying prison at 37,000 feet -' transported 92,000 defendants, including one 600-pound prisoner, to 333,987 court appearances.

Con-Air's hub and maintenance facility is in Oklahoma City.

Marshals last year managed almost \$1 billion of property seized from alleged lawbreakers in its National Asset Seizure and Forfeiture Program.



Samuel M. Rutherford



The State of Arkansas has furnished the Indian Territory a good many substantial citizens, not a few of her native sons now being prosperous and loyal residents of the Territory. In this class can be placed Samuel Morton Rutherford, of the Muskogee Bar.

Mr. Rutherford was born at Louisville, Arkansas, in the year 1859. While quite a lad his parents moved to Cane Hill, Ark., and here young Rutherford spent his boyhood attending the public schools and occasionally varying his occupation by working out for a season. After graduating from the high schools of the home town with the class honors,

he entered Emory-Henry College, Virginia, from which institution he graduated with the class of '83 as its valedictorian, having stood first in a class of many bright students. After completing his college course Mr. Rutherford went to Fort Smith, Arkansas, and entered upon the study of law in the office of Wm. M. Cravens. In due time he was admitted to the bar and entered upon the practice of the profession.

While quite a young man he was selected as under sheriff of Sebastian County. Upon the inauguration of Mr. Cleveland in 1893, Mr. Rutherford was given the appointment as United States Commissioner at Atoka, Indian Territory. When after two years the Territory was divided into three districts, he was appointed United States Marshal for the Northern District, Indian Territory. He proved to be a most competent, proficient and popular official.

When his term expired he associated himself with the well known law firm of Stuart, Lewis & Gordon. They opened an office in Muskogee, where he was in charge.

Mr. Rutherford was married in 1891 to Miss Sallie R. Dillard, of Fort Smith, Arkansas. Four bright, interesting children have blessed the union. Both Mr. and Mrs. Rutherford are favorites in Muskogee society and contribute much to the local society.

DID YOU KNOW ALLOTMENTS WERE MADE TO CHEROKEE CITIZENS ON LANDS KNOWN AS THE "CHEROKEE OUTLET?"

The agreement for the cession of the lands known as the Cherokee Outlet, which agreement was ratified by Act of Congress approved March 3rd, 1893 (27 Statutes 612), provided in the fourth paragraph of Article Two as follows:

That any citizen of the Cherokee Nation who, prior to the first day of November, 1891, was a bona fide resident upon and further had, as a farmer and for farming purposes, made permanent and valuable improvements upon any part of the land herein ceded and who has not disposed of the same, but desires to occupy the particular lands so improved as a homestead and for farming purposes, shall have the right to select one-eighth of a section of land, to conform, however, to the United States surveys; such selection to embrace, as far as the above limitation will admit, such improvements. The wife and children of any such citizen shall have the same right of selection that is above given to the citizen, and they shall have the preference in making selections to take any lands improved by the husband and father that he can not take until all of his improved land shall be taken.

That any citizen of the Cherokee Nation not a resident within the land herein ceded, who, prior to the first day of November, 1891, had for farming purposes made valuable and permanent improvements upon any of the land herein ceded, shall have the right to select one-eighth of a section of land to conform to the United States surveys; such selection to embrace, as far as the above limitation will admit, such improvements.

It is further agreed and understood that the number of such allotments shall not exceed seventy (70) in number; and the land allotted shall not exceed five thousand and six hundred (5,600) acres; that such allotments shall be made and confirmed under such rules and regulations as shall be prescribed by the Secretary of the Interior, and when so made and confirmed shall be conveyed to the allottees, respectively, by the United States in fee simple.

It is further agreed that from the price to be paid to the Cherokee Nation for the cession herein provided for there shall be deducted the sum of one dollar and forty cents (\$1.40) for each acre so taken in allotment.

The following is transcribed from Book 1 Deeds, Page 20 - Kay County Clerk's Office, Newkirk, Oklahoma:

Schedule of allotments made and confirmed to certain citizens of the Cherokee Nation under the provisions of the fourth paragraph of Article Two of the agreement for the cession of the lands known as the Cherokee Outlet which agreement was ratified by Act of Congress approved March 3rd, 1893 <27 Statutes 612>.

McLain Was At One Time Very Lively

This is a story of a long ago event from a small town called McLain, located about twenty miles southeast of Muskogee. At one time it was a very lively place and there was an old landmark building that housed an Odd Fellow Lodge and also the Knights of Pythias, who met regularly. The K.P.'s didn't stay too long and moved away to some other place and the Odd Fellows stayed for many years. A wind storm damaged the old building and was soon remodeled and was used for a long time.

The Odd Fellows had a decoration every year to decorate the graves of the brothers who had passed away and they marched from the town to the McLain Cemetery. This time in particular they met down south of town to the Dirty Creek Bridge.

I was a young lad at the time and got a picture of the members. It was 1919, just after World War I was concluded and everyone seemed to be in good spirits and it was always a solemn occasion.

These men were all good outstanding citizens and none are with us now. The little town of McLain is almost a ghost town now compared to then. At that time there was about four stores and a post office and a doctor's office - Dr. J.M. Coon spent many years there, tending the sick.

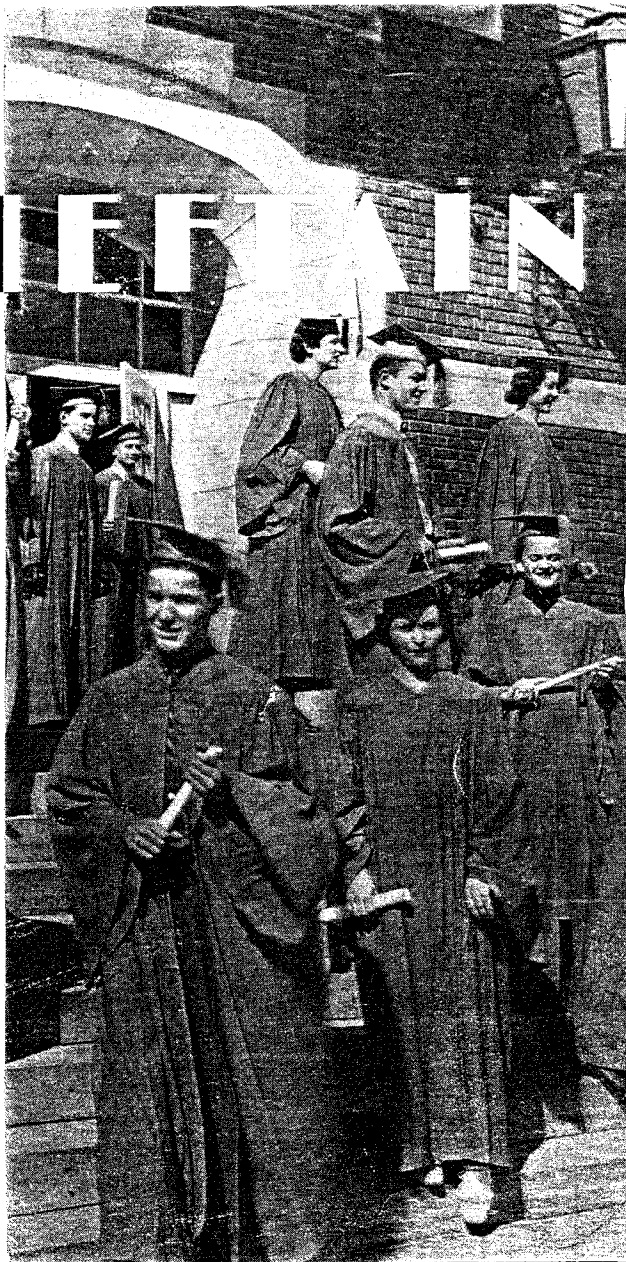

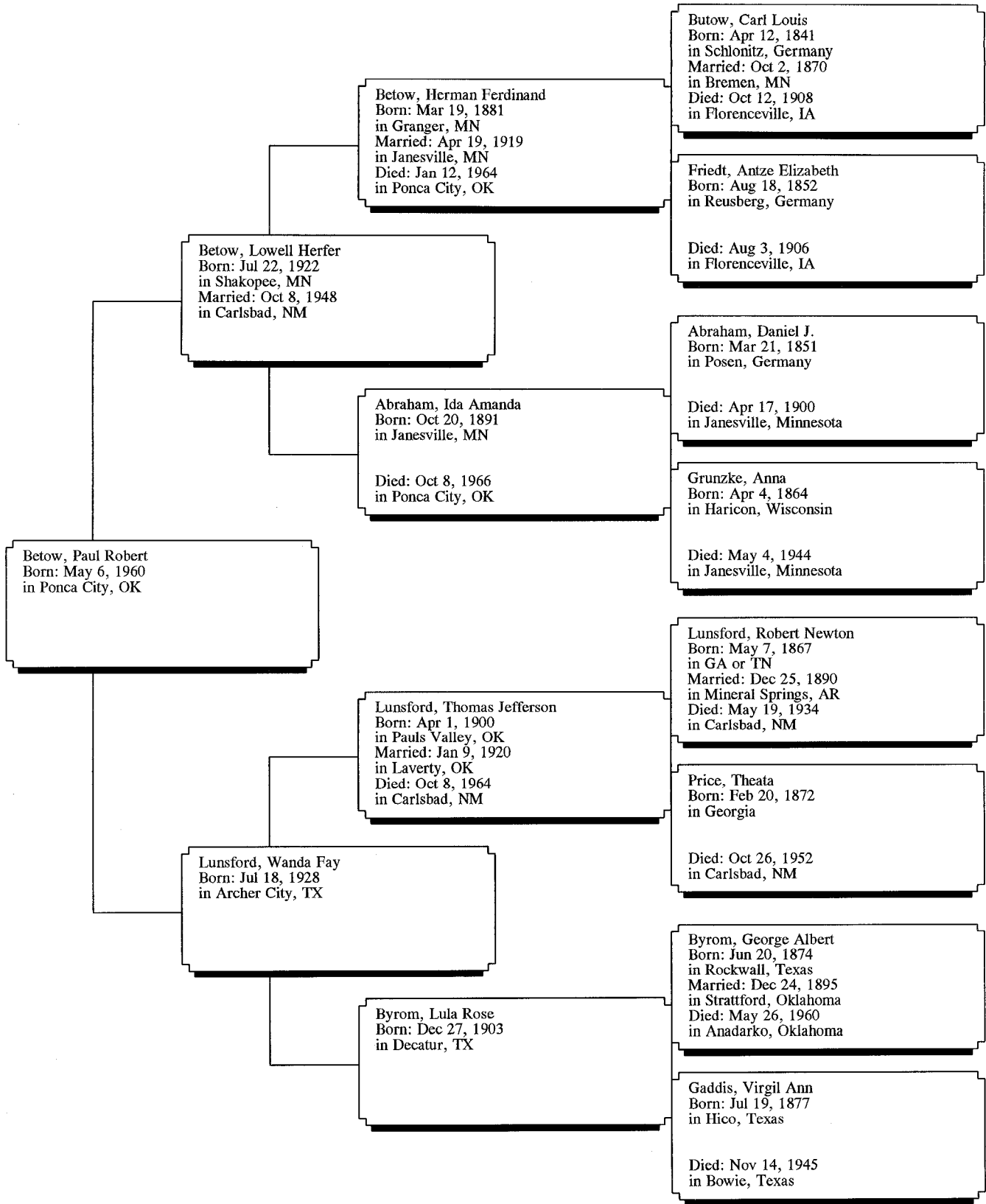
