EXIT INDIAN TERRITORY, ENTER OKLAHOMA

STATEHOOD DAY!

With a few strokes of the pen plucked from an Oklahoma eagle, President Theodore Roosevelt will at ten o'clock this morning (nine o'clock in Oklahoma) place his name on the proclamation that will make Indian Territory and Oklahoma the forty sixth state of the union.

No ceremony will attend the signing. It will be simple business like procedure. But the moment that the act is flashed across the country the machinery of a new state government will be put in motion.

Every whistle in Muskogee, every bell, the firing of guns, will herald to the people of the city the news that the long desired has at last come to pass.

Vexing Problem of Swearing in Officers-Elect

If the affairs in the Indian Territory were ever in a chaotic condition, it will be today upon the signing of the proclamation for a little while at least.

In every county in the Indian Territory, part of the new state, there is a complete set of officers who will be anxious to be sworn into office. This will be impossible for some time on account of a provision in the constitution which provides that no notary public now holding a commission in the proposed state of Oklahoma, shall be permitted to take an acknowledgment, or administer an oath, until he has first filed his commission with the county clerk in the county where he lives and in the district as formally laid out by the government where his commission was originally issued. There are no county clerks, nor will there be, until the officers-elect shall take their oath of office and it will be impossible for them to take the oath until a notary public can get sworn in over there and return here and do the work.

Briefly, there is no one in the eastern half of the state that can administer an oath from the time the proclamation is signed until someone can get here from the western part of the state now known as Oklahoma.

In this county (Muskogee) there are two sets of officers, both of which are going to try and get possession of the offices. Claiming irregularities, the democrats threw out five republican precincts in the canvass of the returns thereby electing every man on their ticket and they were issued election certificates by Porter Spaulding, county clerk, appointed according to the constitution. Under a mandamus, the republicans secured the returns and proceeded to count every precinct which elected every republican by handsome majorities and they in turn were issued election certificates by Frank R. Applegate, county clerk appointed by Chas. Filson, acting governor for Oklahoma.

All the public records are in the possession of republican federal officers. According to the constitution, they will turn these records over to the district court, which will be Judge John H. King. He in turn will turn over the records of the various offices to the officers entitled to them and with the exception of the little delay in the officers getting into office, there will be no hitch in the transition from an Indian reservation to a full fledged state and county government.

58 GOVERNMENT OFFICE - HOLDERS STEP OUT TODAY

Fifty-eight federal office holders, clerks, deputies and assistants in the Western district, the majority of whom live in Muskogee, will step down and out today when the president signs the proclamation making Oklahoma a state. These officials may not walk out of the court house or leave their places of business, but their pay will stop. Whatever work is done in cleaning up their records and straightening the affairs of office will be done without compensation.

Many of the officials have served for years. In the United States marshal's office, U.S. Marshal Bennett has served for eight years. The oldest deputy in the service is Bass Reeves, a giant of a negro who has been in the government service in this capacity for more than thirty years. He is now 70 years of age. In Judge Parker's palmiest days in Ft. Smith, Reeves was a deputy marshal. He is quiet, unassuming, and when he meets a superior officer, removes his hat. He is a negro of the old days but has the tenacity of a bull dog in a fight and has been a terror to the negro outlaws for a quarter of a century. In the early days in Ft. Smith he was often sent to Indian Territory with a pocket full of warrants. His trip would require three or four weeks time. He would herd his prisoners to the border city like so many cattle. Often his fees would amount to over \$500 a trip. While the old man made considerable money in those days, he was required to spend it to save his own life. He shot several negroes and was tried on a charge of murder. The small fortune which he had accumulated was spent with lawyers to save his own neck. After a long drawn out trial, he was acquitted and sent to Muskogee where he was employed by Marshal Bennett.

Another unique character who will retire to private life, is Deputy Marshal Bud Ledbetter. For thirty years, Bud has been a peace officer. He was a sheriff in Arkansas, city marshal at Vinita and then a field deputy for Marshal Bennett. Several years ago he was given a commission as special deputy for the department of Justice, the only office of the kind ever created. Ledbetter has perhaps run to earth more criminals and spilled more booze than any other man in the state. He was a booze buster of fame before "Whiskey" Johnson was heard of. Ledbetter has battled with outlaws, train robbers, the lawless gangs that infested this country in the early days, such as the Daltons, Cook brothers, Cherokee Bill and his followers and many others. His life has been like that of the proverbial cat. Hundreds of times death stared him in the face but he always pulled through. His last fight with outlaws was several months ago when a band of negro fanatics shot and wounded John Cofield, a local policeman, and defied the law. In the north part of this city the negroes were barricaded in an old

house. The marshal's force in the city and a squad of police surrounded the house. The negroes opened fire. When the battle was in progress, Ledbetter stood coolly in front of the building pumping bullets from a Winchester and then from a revolver. Bud shot altogether from the hip. When the smoke cleared away, three negroes were dead, one shot through the neck. Two more were wounded and it is said the dead body of another was carried off by members of the gang. Ledbetter was credited with getting the majority of them. The veteran deputy is a quiet and thoughtful man, as tender-hearted as a woman. He never speaks of his battles except in a general way.

There are other deputies on the force who have won reputations for daring and bravery. O'Brian, Cordell, Cowen, Webb and Tilly have all handled some very bad men.

Save a few envelopes of the letters you get before 9 a.m. today. In a few years they will be a curiosity. For after the clock in the post office building strikes nine, the post mark, "Muskogee, Ind. T" will never again be used. Yesterday the postmaster received from the government the new mail stamp, and hereafter, all letters cancelled will bear the imprint "Muskogee, Oklahoma."

REJOICING GREET NEWS THAT STATEHOOD IS WON

"I, Theodore Roosevelt, president of the United States of America, in accordance with the enabling act of congress and by the authority thereof, announce the result of the election, to be as certified and do hereby declare and proclaim that the terms and conditions described by congress to entitle the state of Oklahoma to admission to the Union on equal footing with the original thirteen states, are now accomplished.

"OKLAHOMA'

This was the sacred word on every lip a few minutes after nine o'clock (Muskogee time) yesterday morning when the whistles began to shriek, the bells to clang and the news spread throughout the city of the president signing the statehood proclamation at 10:16, Washington time.

A flash over the wires of the local telegraph companies who held the lines open and had direct connection with Washington, a rush to the telephone and the signal was given. Simultaneously all the whistles in the city began to blow. The manner of spreading the glorious news was prearranged by John Templeton, Chief of the fire department.

The Merchants' band, in full dress, stood at the corner of two of the busy downtown streets. While the air was vent with shrieks and with the band playing national songs, cheer after cheer went up from immense crowds which thronged the streets.

The day was the fairest in November. The air was bright and a smiling sun shone down upon a new-born state. The city was gaily decorated. Flags were flung to the breezes from every building and from many of the suburban house tops. Bunting draped the walls of the big business blocks.

While business ran along in its usual channels there was good feeling and good cheer. The spirit of an American with full citizens rights was evident everywhere.

Contrary to expectations, there was no lawlessness, no rowdiness, and the day passed with little demand for more than the regular police force. Joints which had been closed for months were thrown wide open, but cases of drunkenness were rare. Those who predicted that the citizens of Oklahoma when given their full liberty, would abuse it, were wrong.

The glad news was knowing Muskogee at 9:15, three seconds after the president laid down the eagle feather with which he signed the proclamation, The forty-sixth star was added to the flag. A dispatch to the Phoenix says little formality attended the ceremony which meant so much to the people of the two territories. The pen will be deposited with the Oklahoma Historical Society.

LAWRENCE HONORED
Bar Association of Muskogee and Wagoner Pay Tribute

It was an impressive farewell the members of the Muskogee and Wagoner bar gave Hon. William R. Lawrence, U.S. judge, yesterday afternoon, while the judge was holding the last day of court under the federal regime.

C.L. Thomas on behalf of the bar association of Wagoner and Muskogee in open court presented to Judge Lawrence resolutions passed by those bodies and asked that they be spread upon the records. The resolutions commended Judge Lawrence for his fairness as a judge and his courteous treatment to the bar.

N.A. Gibson, Z.T. Walrond, N.B. Maxes, W.J. Sullivan and others made addresses, setting forth the appreciation of the lawyers. Sullivan, on behalf of the city and as a private citizen thanked the judge. It developed into a regular love feast. Verbal flowers were showered upon the judge by the people whom he met in the walks of every day life. Words of love, esteem and appreciation, His honor was deeply affected.

Judge Lawrence made a reply. He said he deeply felt the compliment bestowed upon him by these able legal lights. When he first came to Muskogee, Judge Lawrence declared, he was given an ovation. Now to have his efforts and his work crowned by such a send off was indeed that which should be appreciated by any man.

The resolutions will be the last pen strokes on the docket of the federal court in the western district during the Lawrence administration. The resolution follow:

"Whereas, Hon. William R. Lawrence, will on the sixteenth day of November, 1907, retire as judge of the United States court for the Western Judicial district of the Indian Territory, and,

"Whereas, We desire to express our recognition of his excellence as a judge:

"Therefore, Be it resolved, That we, the members of the bar of Wagoner and Muskogee, this 12th day of November, 1907, give this expression of our appreciation of his ability and fairness, his patient and untiring devotion to duty, his uniform courtesy and consideration to the members of the bar, and his proper care and preservation of the rights of all litigants,

"And Be it Further Resolved, That the president of the Muskogee Bar association, be authorized and instructed to sign these resolutions on behalf of the bars of Muskogee and Wagoner, and present the same in open court, and move that they be spread upon the records.

"Signed on behalf of the bar of Wagoner and the bar of Muskogee.

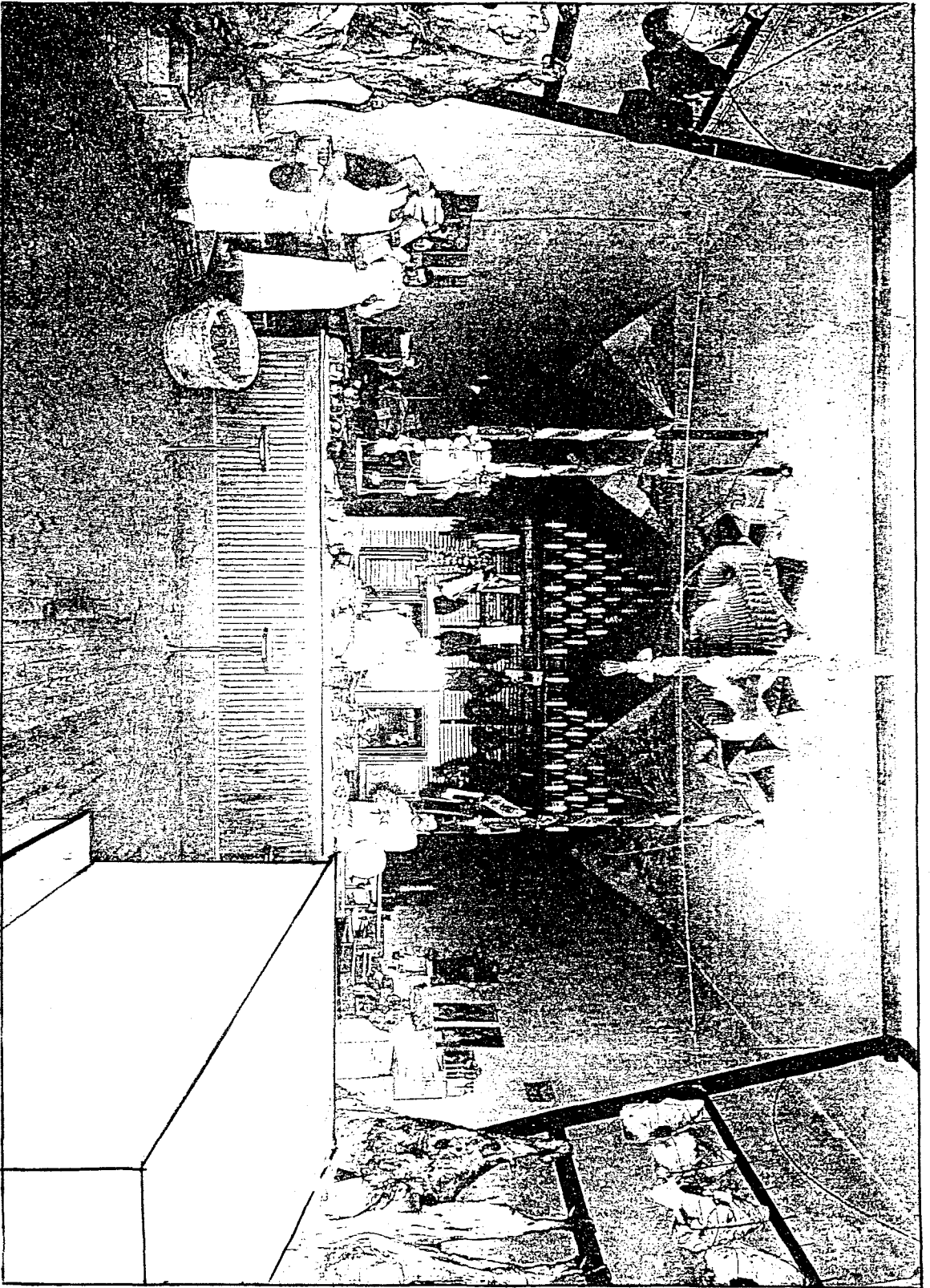
JUDGE RYAN COMES TO HIS NEW HOME

WILLIAM NOAH SCOTT

William Noah Scott was born to Francis Marion Scott and Mary Emeline McLain Scott on February 17, 1874 in Cherokee Nation, Illinois District, Indian Territory. William attended the Cherokee Male Seminary at Tahlequah, Oklahoma. He worked for the Staplers who had a grocery. That is where he met his first wife, Julia Anne Johnson. They were married May 27, 1894. They had two sons, Francis Marion born December 3, 1890 and James Stapler Scott who was born November 9, 1892. Julia Ann died during childbirth, when baby girl, Myrtle May was born. Myrtle died March 3, 1899.

They lived with William's mother, Mary Emeline. On September 1, 1907, William married my grandmother, Leanah Gertrude Stout. When Leanah first came to see them, the little boys would run and hide in the barn, but very soon, she was their Mom. After their marriage, William and Leanah moved to Muskogee where he worked in Eastside Meat Market located on South Cherokee. Their residence was 328 Cherokee at that time.

Hazel Ida was born June 12, 1902 and Theodore Alton was born April 12, 1904. Then my dear mother, Virginia Elizabeth was born February 4, 1907. Roberta was born November 2, 1909 and died December 4, 1910. Yvonne Evelyn was born on December 12, 1912.

William was a farmer and business man, who was well respected in the community. He assisted at A&M Agriculture College in Agriculture Conservation Study. He was chairman of the Muskogee County War Board, which was an organization encouraging the farmers to turn in old tires and any rubber product, to be used in making tires for the soldiers overseas. William was a Mason and belonged to the Royal Arch and Anti-Horse Theft at McLain. He worked in the Muskogee County Court House, ran for County Commissioner, and was active in church work, having organized the Sunday School class at McLain. Throughout his life, he was active in promoting the welfare of farmers in this area.

I am the granddaughter of William Noah Scott, born to Andrew Jackson and Virginia Elizabeth Reese. His grandson, my brother, Gilbert Allen Reese, was born 2 years after my birth. My grandfather spent his life spoiling me. I only wish he had lived longer and I could have had more years with him. William Noah Scott died June 28, 1942. Out of respect for his services the AAA offices were closed the day of his funeral.

DESCENDANTS ASKED TO HELP LOCATE GRAVES OF THOSE WHO CAME ON THE TRAIL OF TEARS

The Oklahoma Trail of Tears Association is seeking help in determining the names and burial sites of all those who came to Cherokee Nation on The Trail of Tears. Jack Baker, President of the Oklahoma Chapter, appointed Virginia Vann Perry, Chairman of the committee. Marcia Elliott, Rose Guthrie, and Virgie Starr volunteered to help. They have only the heads of the families on the 13 payment rolls, four muster rolls and the number of emigrants turned over to each conductor at departure, kept by Captain Page of the United States Army. They do not have the names of the other members of the family. To add to the difficulty, many names are in Cherokee.


