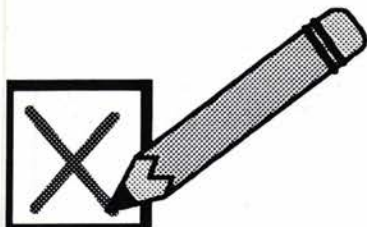

OBITUARIES

William H. Davidson Dies

Resident of Muskogee for Quarter of Century Expires at Home at Age 76

William Henderson Davidson, pioneer Muskogean, died at 9 o'clock last night at the home of his daughter, Mrs. R.E. Cook, 507 Dayton street. He was 76 years old. Mr. Davidson had been in ill health for some time and death was due to the complications of old age.

A Confederate veteran who won honors during his service with the south, Mr. Davidson at the time of his death was brigadier general of the Creek-Seminole brigade of the Confederate survivors. His military career was earned in Company A. Twenty-second Virginia cavalry.

Mr. Davidson was born in Mercer county, Virginia, on December 30, 1845. He came to Muskogee with his family in 1898 from Greenville, Texas. After a business association with the mercantile firm of Harsha and Spaulding, whose general store was on South Main street he engaged in several other lines until his retirement.

Mrs. Davidson survives with her daughter, Mrs. Cook, and two sons, Albert H., assistant cashier of the Commercial National Bank, and Phil, connected with the Chestenutt-Gibbons grocery company. Also surviving are four brothers, George P. of Sand Springs, Okla., and R.L., J.C., and C.D. of Greenville and one sister, Mrs. C.J. Melton, also of Greenville.

The funeral services will be held this afternoon at the home of Mrs. Cook at 3 o'clock and the burial will be in Greenhill cemetery.

Confederate Veteran to be Buried Today

The funeral services for A.B. Davis, a veteran of the Confederate army and well known member of the I.O.O.F. lodge who died early Monday morning at his residence 245 South K. street, will be held at the Eaton-Bacon undertaking rooms on West Okmulgee avenue at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Special services will be conducted by the Odd Fellows at the Greenhill cemetery.

Mr. Davis was a resident of Muskogee county for more than 35 years. For several years he conducted a grocery store in the Midland Valley addition. He is survived by a son, James A. Davis, and three daughters, Mrs. T.C. Harris, Mrs. C. Cheney and Mrs. W.F. Shewey, and grandson, Robert Harris.

Mr. Davis belonged to the 34th Alabama regiment of the Confederate army. Local members of the Confederate post will attend the funeral.

Killing of Ike Rogers

Tuesday morning, at the arrival of the east-bound Valley passenger train, about 10 o'clock, Clarence Goldsby shot and killed Ike Rogers on the depot platform at Fort Gibson. This tragedy is not in any way connected with the present payment, but is the outcome, of violent deeds during other years.

Rogers was the man who effected Cherokee Bill's capture, which it will be remembered was accomplished by betrayal of Bill's confidence. This has rankled in the breasts of Cherokee Bill's kinsmen and friends, and Clarence Goldsby, a younger brother of Cherokee, declared he would kill Rogers. At the payment at Hayden, Rogers is said to have questioned young Goldsby about this threat, even presenting a gun at his head and otherwise abusing him. The youngster was at that time unarmed, but informed Rogers that if he ever came to Ft. Gibson the killing would certainly be done. So the matter rested until Tuesday morning. It is said the wife of Rogers telegraphed him not to go to Ft. Gibson but his confidence was supreme.

Tuesday morning Rogers alighted from the train and was in the act of shaking hands with Attorney Osborne, of Muskogee, when Goldsby advanced upon the back and right side of Rogers and shot him through the neck with a large revolver. Rogers gave but a groan as he fell and Goldsby continued to advance and fire until five shots were fired. It is thought the first shot broke the man's neck, the bullet passing onward and inflicting a very serious wound in the mouth and jaw of Tolly Elliott, porter at Hotel Trent. Two other bullets entered the prostrate body of Rogers, one in the cheek and the other in the right eye. Two shots missed. As Rogers fell his Winchester dropped from his right hand and was seized by Goldsby, who dodged under a passenger car, across the tracks and under a freight car and passed up one of the main streets of the town. A shower of bullets followed him from the pistols of several deputies: some times answered back by shots from Rogers' gun in Goldsby's hand. Probably the last shot fired was by Commissioner McCombs who fired as he turned a corner.

Deputy Bill Taylor and Policeman Ran Lee followed the fugitive until he was hemmed in a thicket and they were forced to dismount. They hoped for the arrival of reinforcements, but finally began reconnoitering with out their horses. While this was going on, Goldsby stole a march on Policeman Lee, seized his horse, a good one, and was off at full speed. Pursuit was abandoned for a time, but is being systematically carried on at the present time.

Clarence Goldsby is but 19 years of age, unmarried, well known and well liked in Ft. Gibson. He was very steady and quiet and was often employed by firms in draying business and the like. Even now, with the blood of this man on his hands, kind words are spoken and sympathy for him freely expressed.

Rogers gained his reputation by the capture of Cherokee Bill, and it probably also added to his recklessness. Having been an officer of the United States at one time, though he and Goldsby both belonged to the Cherokees, the case becomes one for United States jurisdiction.

NORTH CAROLINA VOLUNTEERS PARTICIPATING IN THE INDIAN REMOVAL

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I

In 1835, North Carolina was divided into military districts. In the counties, with some exceptions, all male citizens to the age of fifty-five were required to be a member of a militia company. Normally these companies met quarterly for drill, muster, inspection, etc. Officers were elected by ballot. In the case of volunteer companies, age, equipment, willingness to serve the officers who formed the company, were the chief criteria for the composition of a company. Volunteer companies were formed as the need arose.

On 7 April 1838, General Winfield Scott informed his superiors:

... I shall probably call for the following detachments of Militia to rendezvous at the places mentioned. Two regiments or 1840 Georgians to rendezvous at New Echota; one regiment of 740 Alabamians to rendezvous at Belfont; one regiment of 740 North Carolinians to rendezvous at Franklin, N. C. One regiment of 740 Tennesseans to rendezvous at Ross' Landing -- 3700 plus 2200 regulars ... Subsistence for the foregoing troops at the places mentioned, will be required for at least 90 days, commencing about the middle of May ...

On 3 May 1838, the Governor of North Carolina wrote:

... The adjutant General has this morning reported to the Department, that the regiment of detached Militia for the service of the United States is composed of all Volunteers as follows, from Rutherford three companies, Wilkes two, Yancey one, Burke three, and Buncombe one, makes ten. You will learn by my letter of the 28th that a company has already been received by Col. Lindsay, and a company has also been offered from Ashe, from whence none were asked or ordered ... Col. Lindsay was positive in his exception to receiving troops from counties contiguous to the Cherokee district, consequently the order was placed to the next adjoining and most convenient counties to reduce the distance to march ...

In the end, North Carolina furnished thirteen volunteer companies, composed of approximately 824 men and 173 officers. The indexed list of participating soldiers which follows is keyed to the following companies, listed in the name of the commanding officers, who were all captains:

Above thirty of the soldiers whose names appear on the roster can be identified as participants in the 1838 land sale at Franklin; of the approximate 600 family names represented, about half appear in the Cherokee County records in during the period 1838-1860.

Indian Ancestors? Ask Your Dentist!

Now there are two easy ways (and one a bit harder) to find out whether you have Indian ancestry before you spend 20 years looking for Minne-ha-ha. Do you have a Carrabelli cusp on your maxillary first molar? The cusp is present on those of strictly western European ancestry, but missing on those of Asian or American Indian heritage. Counting from the center front of your upper teeth, the maxillary first molar is the 6th tooth on the back on each side. Next time you have your teeth cleaned ask your dentist!

Your optometrist can also use his light to determine whether the retina of your eyes contains a certain melanin or pigmentation that is present only in American Indians and blacks.

There is also an extremely rare mutation of the "Y" chromosome which seems to be unique to the population who migrated to the American continents around 30,000 years ago. Stamford University researchers say, "In only one chromosome in all the world was there this change and all Native Americans may be able to trace their heritage back to that genetic change."

LAWS OF GENEALOGY

The document containing evidence of the missing link in your research invariably will be lost due to fire, flood or war.

The keeper of the vital records you need will just have been insulted by another genealogist.

Your great, great, grandfather's obituary states that he died leaving no issue of record.

The town clerk you wrote to in desperation, and finally convinced to give you the information you need, can't write legibly and doesn't have a copy machine.

The spelling of your European ancestor's name bears no relationship to its current spelling or pronunciation.

That ancient photograph of four relatives, one of them whom is your progenitor, carries the names of the other three.

Copies of old newspapers have holes which occur only on last names.

No one in your family tree ever did anything noteworthy, always rented property, was never sued, and was never named in wills.

You learned that great Aunt Matilda's executor just sold her life's collection of family genealogical materials to a flea market dealer "somewhere in New York City."

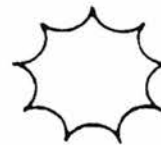

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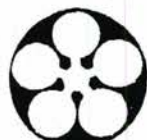
